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My very dear wife and children:

Friday morning I was made very happy by your telegram - after I knew what was in it - telling me of your reunion in Cambridge, once more, after years of wandering, in that dearest of places, home. I think it must be e, so I'll strike out the dot.) For the past week we have had very balmy weather; the gutters have been overflowed, and now scarcely a patch of snow is visible. To-day is beautiful and warm. The boys have given up marbles, and tops are now the rage. I don't know what comes next in their calendar, but perhaps it is kites.

I have just come from church, where we had an earnest sermon on reverence, and the clergyman took occasion to berate some of his parishioners that never kneel.
