🕼 So, what's happening at Hiawatha Music Co-op? 👩

The past year has been a time for reflection, a time of reevaluation, reorganization and the setting of goals to carry Hiawatha into what we hope will be an expanding future.

The Hiawatha 'year' is different from the calendar year. It begins just after the Music Festival and closes with the following festival. Once festival business was pretty much closed this past year (excluding the music committee whose efforts demand yearlong attention), it was time for the yearly membership meeting and election of Board Members. This event was held in October at Marquette Mountain. Food was plentiful and excellent, music was provided by Foreign Born Irish and again, plentiful and excellent. Two new board members were nominated and voted to three year terms: congratulations to Tammy Wills (Tammy was also voted in as Vice-President), and Joe Heribacka (Joe was voted in as Treasurer). The only down side to the event was attendance, we barely hit 50 people and that included several kids and the band (who we paid to be there). We realized something was wrong and it was time to do some soul searching. A bright note this year was the orchestration of the Hiawatha/NMU event series. This monthly offering of workshops was organized by board member Dan Mahoney. Dan has shown himself to be a driving force in bringing Hiawatha back into the community.

With the start of the New Year, we hit the ground running. The search for a new, affordable and more visible office location as well as accommodating storage areas continued but as of this writing has not become reality. A decision was finally made to hire a Festival Coordinator, as the position has become too demanding for our volunteer force. After interviewing several very qualified individuals, Steve Sleight was selected and has coordinated the event you are attending this weekend. Your congratulations, thanks and suggestions should be directed to Steve. In March we hosted a weekend seminar at the Landmark Inn for festival coordinators. Our guest speaker was Mrs. Nancy McRay from the Michigan Association of Community Arts Agencies (MAACA). We talked of Hiawatha past and looked into the potential futures. Concepts that stood out were improved communications, a functioning committee structure and an expanded active group of volunteers. To improve communications, we've purchased a new computer system and mail software. Our web page is expanding to keep you updated with Hiawatha news; you can find us at **www.portup.com/~hiawatha**. You can also find committee information here and ways to contact organizers.

A final thing we need to mention is volunteers. They are Hiawatha- Hiawatha the Music Festival and Hiawatha the Music Co-op. We usually find Festival volunteers ready and waiting each year; our thanks to those of you who have pitched in to be a part of this years festival. What we need now are folks who would like to help us as we try to expand our activities throughout the year. The only limits we have are your ideas and your presence. 

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In the world of acoustic music, Norman Blake is one of the recognized elder-statesmen of traditional music who appears on nearly everyone's list. He is a powerful singer/songwriter and a red hot flat picker who was born in Chattanooga, Tennessee, and who, over the years, has toured and recorded with Joan Baez, Kris Kristofferson, Hylo Brown, and the Carter Family. He was a member of John Hartford's ground-breaking Aeorplane Band. As a Nashville session player, he worked with Bob Dylan on the Nashville Skyline album and with the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band on their now legendary *Will the Circle Be Unbroken* boxed set.




To put it bluntly, Norman Blake is an amazing, though understated, performer with more credentials than a Rhodes Scholar. He has twenty-eight CDs and albums of his own recordings, and five Grammy nominations. The Hiawatha gang has wanted to have him at the festival for years, and we are proud to finally have the opportunity to do so. Please be sure to fit one of his sets into your festival schedule.





Pat Donohue is the guitar player's guitar player. Like he never needs a back-up band when he's playing lead, because he is both the lead and the back-up band, including the brass, and if you don't know what we mean, you'll see. You can hardly keep up with watching his fingers. His guitar and voice are a winning combo of both envy and delight, a merging of jazz, folk, blues, swing, ragtime, and what else...maybe a gut-tickling fuse box. Pat's awards for his style of finger picking and his sweet, original songs and covers, along with his frequent appearances on A Prairie Home Companion, are legendary, so we'll spare you a lot of story. As Greg Brown has said about Pat: "His music will take you and be your friend ... with the sunlight on the water, with the cool water over the stones, through the jazz joint, and down the dusty ragtime road."

GENERAL

- Chairs are NOT permitted in the "Blankets Only" area at the Main Stage. If you are asked to move your chair from this area please do so.
- No Frisbees, volleyballs, or other outdoor ball games are allowed in any Stage or Workshop area.
- Absolutely no bicycles, skateboards, or roller blades are allowed in the Concession area or on the adjacent road.

CAMPING

- Camping is allowed only in designated areas to which you have registered.
- Camping registration tags must be attached to the camping shelter in a conspicuous place.
- Ground fires outside of fire rings are prohibited. Do not move established fire rings.
- Campers must maintain at least 4 feet between camping shelters.

This year Hiawatha will be presenting the newest incarnation of one of our old friends, Rhythm in Shoes; and if you are a fan of the popular swing music revival, you will undoubtedly want to see what our happy hoofers are up to these days. For the last year, their band has been

singing and playing to packed houses at Gilly's Jazz Club in Dayton, Ohio, as the Rhythmeanies. Many of their tunes come from the great American jazz repertoire, but just as many are original songs composed by Rhythm in Shoes Music Director, Rick Good. His songs are always well crafted and filled with memorable phrases that seem as if they were written long ago by someone named Duke or Hoagy.

Good and RIS Artistic Director Sharon Leahy have been collaborating, both on and off stage, for years. Hiawatha audiences are familiar with her choreography, but this year's performance will also feature her ballad singing. Leahy and Good also sing duets, and when they do, their voices fit together like nicely dovetailed furniture.

In addition to Good and Leahy, the band this year includes Marko Packard on sax, Ben Cooper on bass, Malkum Gibson on harmonica, and Kevin Anderson on percussion. The dancers are Beth Butler, Nate Cooper, Emma Leahy-Good, and Daniella D'Addesa. We welcome all of the RIS gang to this year's festival, and we look forward to hearing something from Rick's Novatown disk.






In Memory of David In Honor of Reese





Don't let the name fool you: these guys are not cheesy quackers. They're a hot young Winnipeg band that has rocked the international folk scene with their distinctive blend of Celtic and Old Time music. The band features the versatile vocals of Ruth Moody, the pulsating banjo of Leonard Podolak, the fluid fiddling of Jeremy Penner, and the rocksolid percussion of Christian Dugas--all expertly backed by Jeremy Walsh on guitar and Oliver Swain on bass. They're an old time Celtic crossover cafe with a menu of musical treats ranging from soft and sweet to snappy and sizzling: the perfect fusion of two powerful traditions. So bring a big plate--and dig this duhk.







Whether blues music is or isn't the truth doesn't matter, according to Malkum Gibson. What matters is that you play the blues period. And Malkum, along with east-coaster Chris Kleeman (who's played with the likes of Taj Mahal and John Hammond) play the blues as true as any two blues players can do. Malkum does the harmonica (a.k.a. harp) and Chris does the guitar (a.k.a. electricity), and what kinda blues they do is Piedmont and Delta. If you don't know what Piedmont and Delta blues is, let them show you. And if you do know, let them show you. If you think you've seen Malkum before, the truth is you have; for the past ten years he's been a road warrior with perennial Hiawatha favorite *Rhythm In Shoes*. Only this time around he's just Malkum, with Chris, together doin' the blues same as they been doin' it for a long long time, the truth being more than thirty years. Even more truth is that B.B. King produced their first album, *Just the Blues*, and we all know B.B. King only produces albums that tell the truth and only the truth, whether or not it matters.


These guys manifest the Hiawatha credo of "Let's get up and have FUN with this music!" and kick old-time music into overdrive.



Les Ross, Sr. 🎢

If you are a fan of great harmonica players, you won't want to miss veteran of the instrument. His music has been described by aficionados as "joyous," "uninhibited," and "energetic." We definitely agree. Using skills and technique rarely heard these days, Les employs a distinctive

Finish-Scandinavian style, sometimes called the "lumber jack style," and old time method in which melody and a pronounced rhythmic chording, and/or bass notes are played--simultaneously! Paulding Light

Paulding Light is a "Jam" band formed in Marquette, Michigan in 1999 with the outlook of bringing high-energy improvisational music to the people. With an eclectic mix of sounds, ranging from Reggae, Funk, folk, Jazz, and Bluegrass, Paulding Light allows for free-form jams to let the music go wherever it wants. The 4 piece line-up includes Tom Laverty on keyboards, Skip Warnke on electric bass, Paul Neumann on drums, and Jeff Mace on guitar. Some of their influences include Santana, Phish, Gerry Garcia, and local heroes Dave Ziegener and Jerry Kipela.

Barefoot n' Mukluked

This group has made its way around Marquette, Michigan, volunteering their talents to places such as Young Authors, the UP Children's Museum, the Marquette Co-op Preschool, Superior Hills School, and the Holistic Health Fair. They also performed the children's area at the 21st Annual Hiawatha Music Festival in 1999. The four Womyn in the group - Wendy Johnson, Jennifer Olsen-Pickard, Susie McBride, and Leanne Hatfield - throw their own little magical twist on a variety of traditional children's songs (young and old). Accompanying musical instruments include, but are not limited to, Ashiko and Djembe drums, guitar, sweet stick, dulcimer, flute, penny whistle and other percussion doodads.



Fisheree Cajun Band

Fisheree Cajun Band plays a lively mix of old-time, traditional Cajun music (two-steps and waltzes), sung in Cajun French, in the spirit of the music played across the prairie lands of southwest Louisiana. Fisheree Cajun evolved from a family-style Cajun dance band, Grand Chien Cajun band, organized by Jim Smith in 1993, after he bought button accordion and taught himself to play the music of Louisiana. Jim also plays guitar, fiddle, mandolin, bass, piano, and in the past, trombone. The other Fisheree Cajun Band members are Terri Smith and Bob Jadzewski. Terri began playing and performing music when Grand Chien began, first playing the t' fer and later learning rhythm guitar. A college background n French helped her learn Cajun song words. Bob is the grandson of a Wisconsin folk fiddler, who played in the lumber camps of central Wisconsin. Bob inherited his grandpa's fiddle and was introduced to Cajun music while living in California, where he played in a Cajun band for several years. Joining the Fisheree Cajun Band at the Hiawatha Music Festival will be Judith Hein who will be adding rhythm on t' fer and piano. Their love for this infectious joyful Cajun music keeps them tuned up and ready to "pass a good time!"



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
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
