- * EVERYONE MUST WEAR WRISTBANDS ON HIS/HER WRIST IN PLAIN SIGHT AT ALL TIMES - PEOPLE ON FESTIVAL GROUNDS WITHOUT A WRISTBAND MAY BE TICKETED!
- * NO TRESPASSING AROUND FLOOD BARRIERS VIOLATORS WILL BE TICKETED!
- * NO ABOVE GROUND FIRES! ALL FIRES MUST BE IN THE TOURIST PARK FIRE RINGS
- * ABSOLUTELY NO PETS ALLOWED
- * CAMPING IS ONLY ALLOWED IN DESIGNATED AREAS YOU MUST HAVE A TAG FOR EACH CAMPING UNIT

(We know our festival brings many benefits to the city and surrounding counties having public input helps with that.) Together we can continue a tradition of great traditional music at a great venue and affordable prices.

For most of us this is a weekend we look forward to all year. Time stands still as we gather with friends old and new taking in the music and making memories to hold us until next year.


Should you wish to attend the festival and not have the money for a ticket, volunteer opportunities are available both prior to, and during the festival. By simply working



RHYTHM BILLIES

he Rhythm Billies play in the style of Old Time string bands of yesteryear. Music that harkens back to a slower pace of life: days of weekly community dances, schoolhouse socials, frolics, hoe-downs, medicine shows, buckboards, and no street lights. It's interesting that, with so many styles of music on the menu, the Rhythm Billies continue to enjoy the sounds of pioneer country artists such as Charlie Poole, Uncle Dave Macon, the Skillet Lickers, Fiddlin' John Carson, and the Carter Family. Sentimental or humorous, sad or silly, their songs are easy to understand. Most important though, the music is fun and heartfelt. The simple joy of hearing The Rhythm Billies play old time tunes and songs provided an audience with time to recall the days when musicians performed a community

service, like the application of a balm to a farmer's aching back.

The Rhythm Billies are from Michigan and led by fiddler Bruce Bauman. Bruce learned to play fiddle after many years listening and directing the Wheatland Music Organization and also relies on tunes heard as a youth on Detroit's WJR radio broadcasts of Renfro Valley's "Sunday Morning Gatherin'." The most experienced (eldest) member of the band is mandolin virtuoso Bruce Gartner. He was once quoted as saying, "There ain't no melody I don't play and no rhythm I don't perform." John Hatton, steeped in the poi of Hawaiian ukulele and early country guitar, keeps the dancers movin'. And John Cotton dazzles on the bass fiddle and occasionally displays talents of his early grooming as a pianist.

The Rhythm Billies have played contra and square dances throughout Michigan. The groups sponsoring dances also sponsor concerts, which allow the Rhythm Billies to perpetuate the oldtime songs, heard on records in the 1920's and 30's, which became household standards a full generation before the recording industry 'discovered' old-time country music.

Prepare for a trip back in time with the Rhythm Billies, a trip to remember. A Rhythm Billies performance leaves you feeling good and satisfied, just like when the family was gathered around Grandma's old piano for some family singing from the golden songbook.... and barn dances were really held in barns.

Living in the past is the best way to stay young!

Mollie O'Brien & Jive at Five

ollie grew up in Wheeling, WV, sowed some oats in New York, NY, and has spent most of her adult life in Denver, CO. These three different places are mirrored in her repertoire and tonal palette. From Wheeling, we get the old-time country songs that she performs with her brother, Tim O'Brien, with a pureness of tone and a directness of feeling. From New York come the jazz chestnuts and obscure R&B gems, along with a sassiness, strength and an improvisational ability that makes every performance unique. And from the once-wild west come pop and folk ballads and a feeling that

anything is possible, that the skies are wide open and waiting for Mollie's voice to fill them.

Mollie O'Brien has emerged as one of the top interpretive singers of her generation. Though she is often associated with the folk and bluegrass worlds because of her frequent collaboration with her brother Tim

O'Brien, Mollie is just as comfortable in the worlds of jazz, blues and pop. "I don't think of myself as a blues singer or a folk singer or a bluegrass singer," Mollie confesses. "I think of myself as an interpreter. I've done lots of acting, and it's only when you've learned your lines and your blocking that you can go out of the envelope. That's how I learn tunes. I learn them backwards and forwards and try them in all different keys, so I can learn how far I can stretch them. You can't take chances until you really know where you are, and taking chances is what's fun."

She has appeared at every major acoustic music festival and venue in the United States and has toured Europe, the United Kingdom and South America.

Inspired by the small combo traditions of Nat King Cole, the Mills Brothers, Louis Jordan, Count Basie, and other legends of swing and jazz, this Michigan based group will have you swingin' from the first note. Add a healthy sense of humor to a diverse repertoire of swing dance tunes, jazz and blues, and you have a recipe for a good time!

Jive At Five came together as group in 1992. Founding members are Tom T.

Ball on upright bass, David Raffenaud on piano and organ, Mark Schrock on electric guitar and vocals,



and Frank Youngman on trumpet, archtop acoustic guitar and vocals. In the spring of 2000, tenor sax veteran Gene Harris joined the group, followed shortly thereafter by Dan Giacobassi playing saxophone and

flute. Drummer Bob Tedlock rounds out the current line up.


While staying true to their swing and jazz musical mission, Jive at Five is known to be versatile and adaptable. Often credited with "bringing the event alive," Jive at Five has performed at hundreds of concerts, dances, receptions, clubs, parties and festivals over the years.


Roy Book Binder is a Blues Singing, guitar picking, song writing raconteur, and has been for the past 30 years! They say that the stories are as good as the songs, and appearances as a "featured teller" at The National Storytelling Festival in Jonesborough can attest to that! The Sydney Morning Herald said, "behind the humor lurks a musical master." "With his laidback vocals and strong guitar playing, Roy Book



Binder sometimes evokes J.J. Cale or Dire Straits' early acoustic songs. But Book Binder's inspirations go way back. Having worked closely in the '60s with blues masters Rev. Gary Davis and Pink Anderson, and having toured constantly for decades, Book Binder is a seasoned, mature bluesman with a sound of his own. He is a genuine example of the traveling bluesman tradition that began in the '20s, was revived in the '60s and continues today" (Living Blues Magazine). Along with his mentors, you can read about 'The Book' in such volumes as The Big Book of Blues, The Blues Who's Who and The Rolling Stone's guide to Blues and Jazz albums.

Book Binder has been interviewed by Terry Gross on NPR's Fresh Air, has appeared on TNN's Nashville Now show more than 30 times, and was recently featured on the PBS television show EGG (Arts in America).

This year, in addition to appearing at Hiawatha, Roy has been invited to be a featured storyteller at the National Storytelling Festival in Jonesborough, Tennessee! Another new audience awaits the tales of "The Book".



RACHAEL DAVIS

Rachael Davis has been singing on-stage since she was two years old. Being born to parents who never intended to keep her very far from music for very long seems to have made all the difference in the world. Before she was mobile, Rachael would be set in a car seat and placed in the middle of a song circle, and with silver bells on her ankles she would shake her feet to the rhythm. At one-and-a-half

Rachael was singing "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" to anyone who asked, and at two she started performing with her parents on stage.

When Rachael was eight she was singing on second stage at Wheatland Music Festival. The Irish singer Maura O'Connell was just backstage. When Rachael walked off stage Maura went up to her, grasped Rachael's face with both hands and said, "Never stop doing it for the love of it!"

Rachael has spent most of her life involved with music in one way or another - whether as the lead in three of her high school's musicals, singing with her family-based group Lake Effect, or performing solo with a few friends as special guests. In lieu of her fourth year of high school, she attended Interlochen Arts Academy in Michigan -- which also counts among its alumni, Peter Yarrow, Anne Hills and Jewel (Kilcher).

In September of 2001, Rachael moved from Michigan to Boston and within the span of seven months was awarded a Boston Music Award for Best New Singer-Songwriter. In 2002, Rachael contributed "Lonely When You're Gone" to the Respond II compilation, which also includes such luminaries as Joan Baez, Dolly Parton, Ani DiFranco, and Eryka Badu.

Her influences range from the jazz stylings of Ella Fitzgerald to the soulful pop vocals of Patty Griffin -- with many more in between. She is a contemporary songwriter but is equally at home singing anything from traditional ballads to Cole Porter to Joe Henry. In April 2001, she released her debut CD, Minor League Deities, a collection of original songs featuring performances by many of the people whose musical and personal paths she has crossed throughout her life, including Claudia Schmidt.

There is something refreshing about a band that can stare in the face of "flavour of the moment" pop music, smile disarmingly, then proceed to deliver their distinctive style of Cape Breton-tinged Celtic artistry. For the Barra MacNeils, it's not about being "au courant;" it's about the tradition they hold close to their souls.

The siblings grew up in the heart of Celtic tradition in Sydney Mines on Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia. Along with all the extracurricular activities of any normal family, the MacNeil kids learned Celtic dancing from their Mother, and took the music lessons that formed the basis of their renown. Whether it be at church dances or other public outings, the music of the MacNeils, sometimes alone, sometimes together, was certain to be the focal point of the evening.

In 1986, Sheumas, Kyle, Stewart and Lucy recorded their eponymous debut album while still attending Mount Allison University, working towards their degrees in music. Two more independent releases followed: "ROCK IN THE STREAM" in 1989 and "TIMEFRAME" in 1991. By this point, the group had solidified their standing as one of Canada's premier Celtic acts.

They have been called "The greatest band you've never heard of" by US Air's Attaché. We have heard them and they are back! Hiawatha is very proud to have Eddie From Ohio back in Upper Michigan!

ÉFO is too energetic to be labeled just "folk" and not angry enough to be pegged "alternative". Eddie From Ohio continues to defy description with their unique blend of vocals and acoustic instrumentation. EFO has drawn comparisons like the Grateful Dead meets Peter, Paul, and Mary or like Jewel fronts the Bare Naked Ladies, EFO fuses a multitude of musical influences to create their own trademark sound. EFO has produced seven CDs, Plus a few solo albums by various members of the band. (Most of which are available at the T-shirt tent.) In addition to Hiawatha's main stage and the Park View Gym, EFO has played some pretty prestigious gigs like Wolf Trap and Mountain Stage.

Morikeba Kouyate was born and 3:00-4:00 Area 2 raised into a family of Griots, or Jalis, in Bounkiling Senegal. He began his training at the age of eight and was performing professionally by the age of fourteen. He became successful and well known for his expert storytelling and Kora playing. As a result of his success, Morikeba was given the opportunity to have his own radio program in Dakar. His show was aired throughout Senegal and several other African countries. He also made

numerous appearances on Senegalese television. Morikeba Kouyate has played before African royalty and the Presidents of several countries, including Senegal and Gambia.

Morikeba Kouyate is a recipient of a 2002 Illinois Arts Council grant for the Master-Apprentice Program; a 2003-2005 Illinois Arts Council Artstour artist; and a recipient of a 2003 City of Chicago, Department of Cultural Affairs Community Arts Assistance Program grant. Mady recently performed at NMU and is planning an upcoming trip to his native Senegal and nearby Mali for research on the oral histories and musical traditions of the Manding peoples. Morikeba Kouyate performs year-round throughout the United States. Since 1991, Morikeba has resided in Chicago, Illinois and has become known as, "Chicago's Griot".

VIRGINIA CROSS TIES



Virginia Cross Ties Appalachian Mountain Gospel, was formed in May of 1995, and hold to the rich sound of Mountain Bluegrass Gospel, in which the area of Southwest Virginia is well known for. The tight harmonies of the Virginia Cross Ties have that Appalachian Mountain sound described by some as "High Lonesome"

Cecil Lawson of Coeburn, Virginia adds to the harmony a deep, strong but yet smooth bass voice, which has thrilled the hearts of listeners every time the group performs. He has been singing Gospel music in the choir and several groups since 1971. Due to a back injury Cecil won't be playing the upright bass. However, in the past hardly a show goes by that someone doesn't request the bass to be spotlighted. Cecil is a Founding Member and the only Bass / Singer the Virginia Cross Ties has ever had.

Millard Edwards of Coeburn, Virginia plays the 5-string banjo for the group. Millard also adds the high

lonesome tenor to the harmony that is a good as it gets. He is the soundman, bus driver, booking agent, and public relations man. It is safe to say he is the work force behind the group. He was a member of a Regional group, The Brickey Brothers for 17 years, and worked with local bands for 3 years before helping to form the Virginia Cross Ties. Millard is the host of a bluegrass radio show on 50,000-Watt WAXM-FM in Norton, Virginia every Wednesday from 6:00 PM until Midnight.

Jarrod Church of Haysi, VA. Plays lead guitar for the group and sings a good solid baritone harmony. He is also a very proficient banjo picker and sometimes does so on stage. He was formerly a member of the group Riverview. Jarrod formed the band, Teenage Grass, when he was 16 and knows the entire history of Bluegrass. He also has a bluegrass radio show on WNVA-FM in Wise VA, every Thursday evening from 5:00 to 8:00 PM

Josh Jessee of Wise, VA is the newest and youngest member at age 17 and plays mandolin. This is the first bank experience, but he has very good timing and an excellent ear for the music. Josh shows promise of becoming a great musician (he also plays guitar and banjo).

Rex Brickey of VA is one of the best bass players in the business and a great blue grass picker. Rex and his brother Darrell formed the regional band the Brickey Brothers in 1974 and played up until a few years ago. They won many contest when the band played. Teremy Kittel is rapidly earning a reputation as one of the nation's top young traditional musicians. Winner of the US National Scottish Fiddle Championship in 2000, Jeremy won the Junior National Scottish Fiddle Championship the previous two years and also qualified for the All-Ireland in Irish fiddling four consecutive years. He managed this while performing in two classical orchestras, a bluegrass group and an Irish



band, and graduating from high school with highest honors at age 16. Now twenty and a graduate of the University of Michigan jazz program, Jeremy won the Alfred Improvisation Award, Mark O'Connor Award of Merit, and International Association for Jazz Education Award for Best Jazz Performance at the American String Teacher Association/National Band and Orchestra Association Alternative Styles Competition in 2003. Last fall he was awarded the Daniel Pearl Memorial Violin for exceptional musicianship and performed with the Turtle Island String Quartet. This spring Jeremy was named Outstanding Acoustic/Folk Instrumentalist at the Detroit Music Awards, and at college graduation was awarded the School of Music's highest honor, the Stanley Medal.

Jeremy has performed at hundreds of concerts and festivals over the past five years including the Millennium Stage of the Kennedy Center, "A Prairie Home Companion," Chicago Celtic Fest, Bethlehem Musikfest, Detroit Festival of the Arts & Milwaukee Irish Fest. His first CD, Celtic Fiddle, was called "one of the top 20 Celtic albums of 2000, and certainly the best by a new young artist," by the syndicated radio show Celtic Connections. Jeremy's second release, Roaming, received praise from a broad range of publications including Sing Out, Dirty Linen and Fiddler Magazine. As one reviewer commented, "It's a much over-used cliché, but I really believe this is what genius sounds like."

John Behling (Guitar): Originally from Milwaukee, John has performed throughout the Midwest since 1986. He draws upon years of experience in jazz, folk, and popular music to forge his unique and progressive style of guitar accompaniment. He has appeared with artists such as Claude "Fiddler" Williams, Pattie Page, Sam Pilafian, and Mike Metheny. John holds a master's degree in guitar performance from the University of Arkansas and is a PhD candidate in Ethnomusicology at the University of Michigan.

Andrew Kratzat (Bass): In high school in Fort Wayne, Indiana, Andrew was in a jazz trio, recorded a CD, and was awarded Best Student Jazz Instrumentalist by Downbeat Magazine. Now a junior at the University of Michigan, he won first prize in 2003 at the International Society of Bassists jazz competition.



Hiawatha welcomes Wanda Degen, a veteran performer who calls the Lansing area home. Wanda has performed extensively all around Michigan and well beyond. She has


graced the stages of Hiawatha for as long as I can remember. She is a very versatile performer who is easygoing, personal and passionate about her music.






