- * EVERYONE MUST WEAR WRISTBANDS ON HIS/HER WRIST IN PLAIN SIGHT AT ALL TIMES - PEOPLE ON FESTIVAL GROUNDS WITHOUT A WRISTBAND MAY BE TICKETED!
- * NO TRESPASSING AROUND FLOOD BARRIERS VIOLATORS WILL BE TICKETED!
- * NO ABOVE GROUND FIRES! ALL FIRES MUST BE IN THE TOURIST PARK FIRE RINGS
- * ABSOLUTELY NO PETS ALLOWED
- * CAMPING IS ONLY ALLOWED IN DESIGNATED AREAS YOU MUST HAVE A TAG FOR EACH CAMPING UNIT (Tent, Trailer, Screen house, etc..)

The President's Message

Welcome to our 27th Annual Hiawatha Festival!

We know you will enjoy another great weekend of traditional music. Hiawatha Music Co-op remains committed to bringing you a top rated Festival, and in doing so, keeping our prices as low as possible, so that everyone can enjoy it. Unfortunately, we are finding it increasingly difficult to maintain our low weekend ticket price with the reality of some of the expenses associated with the festival, especially those expenses over which we have no control.

We are in the last year of our Tourist Park contract with the city of Marquette and have just renewed for another 3 years. Our rent of tourist park has gone from \$2,815. in 2000, to \$7,440. in 2005 and will increase each year of the next 3 years. Our cost for a temporary camp permit through the Mqt. City Health Dept. rose from 40 dollars in 2004 to \$2,215. dollars in 2005. We also pay the city for all staffing costs and for police coverage. Our festival budget for 2005 is \$154,000. dollars.

Because of the size of Tourist Park and the strict limitations of the number of camping units allowed we are not able to fully compensate for increased expenses with the growth in attendance. We strive every year to cut all possible possible costs so as to be able to keep our ticket prices family friendly. We realize we are most likely approaching the limit of what some people may be willing or, able to pay, in ticket price.

In order to keep the Festival economically sound, this leaves us with several options.....

We continue to look at other local venues which would allow us to have more camping; and this increase in attendance would perhaps lower the cost of rent, or, we continue to decrease expenses in all areas where possible and /or we increase ticket prices, charge for camping, increase parking passes. We do expect that we will need to begin to charge a camping fee. We are one of the only festivals that do not charge for camping and hope that a nominal camping fee will assist us in maintaining expenses and a lower ticket price.

What can you do to help?

Become a member of the Hiawatha Music Organization

*Contact the Marquette City Commissioners and let them know you would like to see more support from them for this yearly event! The city commissioners set the fee for the campground permit ~ this could be lowered.

*Let your city commission know you'd like Tourist Park to remain "A Park", and not be sold to a Private Developer.

* Give us your suggestions on ways to raise money to support the Festival throughout the year.

We welcome your input during the coming year. We will continue to put our energies toward putting on a festival that is regarded as" One the BEST in the Country" and one of the the most affordable. We hope you'll all continue to support us in that goal.


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


production of the musical "Haywire" at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C.



Seth Bernard

Seth Bernard was raised by northern Michigan's music scene. Maybe this is why he is so at home on stage, or why his songs seem to be stories of his life, his growth and his work. His song writing didn't stop here in the Michigan folk scene, however. Seth has traversed the many worlds of music collecting hints of jazz, blues, traditional folk, straight up rock and even old spirituals carving a unique place for himself in the Americana music of today. His lyrics are compassionate, truthful, loving and hilarious, touching on everything from the beauty and irony of living on earth as humans, to the troubles of the world and the journeys we take through time and understanding. His sound is rusty and refined, his playing thoughtful and powerful, sung with potent heart-felt honesty that leaves you with a feeling of hope.



Daisy May

Born into a family of musicians (her dad was a blues musician in the 60's, her uncle is a guitar maker, etc.), May Erlewine has been playing music all her life. She learned to sing and play piano at an early age, and her acoustic guitar is seldom far from her side. Erlewine, who was home schooled, paid her singer-songwriter dues in her late teens with several years of hitchhiking back and forth across the U.S., even riding freight trains, and always writing songs and playing her music. Daisy May has worked a variety of rooms, mostly on the East Coast and in the Midwest, everything from the Fez, in NYC, Club Passim, in Boston, to a string of venues and festivals in her home state of Michigan, stretching from the Ark in Ann Arbor to the Calumet Theatre in the Upper Peninsula. Her inspired songs and powerful clear voice have a sweetness that keeps audiences calling for more. Now, with two CDs under her belt, Daisy May lives and has her studio in Big Rapids, MI.

Irish music's accordion virtuoso Jimmy Keane along with fiddler extraordinaire, Sean Cleland, the remarkable bouzar player and singer Pat Broaders, and the lovely singer and guitanst, Kat Eggleston, compose bohola, Irish music's newest "supergroup" as penned by The Irish Herald. bohola play a driving, muscular, and yet very emotive style of Irish music with deep roots in the 'pure



bohola

drop' tradition, which has been forged with the raw and gritty urbanized musical vernacular of the Irish-American_


"Though most of the tunes bohola plays are well over 150 years old, the music comes across more vibrant than the moribund sounds of much of today's alternative rock. Their sound comes from the Irish version of jam sessions, but bohola puts the noodling of many current jam bands (Dave Matthews, among others) to shame."

Born in London of Irish-speaking parents, Jimmy Keane is All Ireland accordion champion for five consecutive years. Many regard Keane as the premier exponent of Irish music on the piano accordion.

Sean Cleland began playing Irish music in Chicago during the 1970's. Over the years, he has won numerous Midwest and North American Fleadh Cheoil (Irish music competitions) titles on the fiddle. In the 1980's, he ventured out from playing straight traditional music and founded the altemative Irish/Celtic rock group The Drovers.

Pat Broaders is a real veteran of the Irish music scene both here and abroad, playing, recording, and perfomming with many artists and bands over the years. "Pat has this acute sense of music and rhythm that enables him to "lock in" his dordan (bass bouzouki) playing to whatever I might do musically and rhythmically," says Keane.

Kat Eggleston is an established and well-respected singer and guitarist. Kat has this lovely, sweet voice and does some pretty brilliant guitar work. With Kat joining bohola, it adds a completely new dimension, both musically and vocally.

"They just have so much energy!"

This often-heard quote accurately follows a performance by Kansas City's unique hillbilly stringband, The Wilders. This talented group, formed in 1996, is regularly regarded as "the band to see" wherever they go. Led by singer, guitarist and country wisecracker, Ike Sheldon, the band grounds itself firmly in the early formative years of recorded country music. Featured in each performance are the hard driving old time fiddle tunes presided over by multi award winning fiddler, Betse Ellis. Her infectious fiddling is often the cause of spontaneous dancing by both the audience and the band! The Wilders' playlist also includes many of the classic country tunes heard in the early days of the Grand Ol' Opry radio show. Songs by Hall of Famers Jimmie Rogers, Roy Acuff and the Carter Family are presented in a faithful yet original light. Anchored by the insurgent walking bass lines of Nate Gawron, the band resurrects 1940's and 50's honky tonk heroes like Hank Williams and Lefty Frizzell, providing each tune with all the swinging electricity found in the originals without plugging in a single instrument. The finishing touch for the band's sound is produced by the slippery dobro, chugging clawhammer banjo and plunky mandolin of jack of-alltrades, Phil Wade. While Sheldon and Ellis handle the bulk of the vocal chores, the whole group can sometimes be heard harmonizing on a beautiful old gospel tune.

Witnessing a performance by The Wilders is an exciting experience not soon forgotten. The members huddle around a single microphone. When the time comes for a solo, each player moves with clockwork precision ~ they are artists at making each instrument and vocal line mix perfectly through their posture and position in relation to the microphone. There's plenty of unplanned humor as well. Never ones to take themselves too seriously, the band deals with the calamity of a string break or a high humidity detuned instrument in an often hilarious way. Because of this natural sense of humor and humility, smiling faces are a familiar sight at any Wilders show!

The Wilders are completely unique among bands playing old time country music. They know the importance of variety in their performances and always strive to give the crowd the best

show they could ask for. They multiply their musical skills with a sheer will to give out the most energy they can - and they do it all with honesty and a genuine enthusiasm for the music. For those who like country music, and even for those who don't know they do yet, The Wilders' show is not to be missed!


Jonathon Edwards

The word "legend" is often used to describe veteran folk/rocker Jonathan Edwards, whose 1971 million-selling "Sunshine" ("go away today") brought him instant fame. He was born in Minnesota and detoured into blues and rock before realizing he was hooked on folk music.

Once you hear Jonathan Edwards' voice, you'll want to hear it again and again. His rich, warm tenor has a distinctively unique and natural quality.

"My inspiration came from the soul of people,



not so much the technique", Edwards explains. "My influences came from Ray Charles, Gladys Knight, Van Morrison and even some of the more popular folk people like the Kingston Trio and Peter, Paul and Mary. But there's no one I ever tried to sing like".

Jonathan has acquired an enviable track record, one of skill and grace in the sometimes brutal world of the music business. And he has done it while keeping intact his ear for a strong melody and love of a beautifully crafted song. Jonathan's natural ability to sing and compose as well as produce has garnered him a reputation as a "musician's musician"

During his 29-year career he has recorded 14 albums, performed throughout North America and in Holland, and collaborated with artists such as Emmylou Harris, Jimmy Buffett, Maura O'Connell, Christine Lavin, and Cheryl Wheeler. He takes great pride in having shared the stage with B. B. King, Emmylou Harris, Rod Stewart, Willie Nelson, The Allman Brothers, The Judds, James Taylor, Roger Miller, Mary Chapin Carpenter, and The Seldom Scene, to name just a few.

His 1987 children's album, Little Hands, was selected by the National Library Association as a "Notable Children's Recording."

His varied career has included theater, commercials, record productions, and a movie soundtrack. He narrated and performed in two 13-week TV series for Media Artists, "Cruising America's Waterways, which started airing on PBS-TV stations in May 2001. "Sunshine" can be heard in the 2004 Will Ferrell Movie, "Anchorman" and is included on the soundtrack.

"I've been a very lucky guy", he grins, "and I've seen it all--black limos, red carpets, blue nights and green money. Success is being able to sing your heart out no matter what else is going on in your life and to follow each song to where it may lead without regard to category, market niche or radio format".

Using rhythms and harmonies born of slavery and adapted and nurtured throughout the sojourn of African people in America, In Process... has voiced song commentaries on issues affecting all people and communities: love, self-respect, women, family, the environment, substance abuse, AIDS, freedom and justice, equality and peace.

In Process... stands firmly in the African American oral tradition: the song is both creative and functional; it helps one move from one point in life to the next. The song is both transforming and healing. The unaccompanied voices give force to the social, cultural, spiritual, political, historical and personal issues delivered in song. Experience the harmonies and sounds of that oral tradition as expressed in spirituals, gospel, blues, R&B, work songs, songs of praise, love and protest.

In September 1980, 30 women joined a circle in a song workshop presented by Sweet Honey In The Rock, a world renowned a cappella group. Over the months, the circle narrowed, and in June 1981, participants (signifying a quest for continual growth and development) chose the name In Process... and emerged in concert with nine members. During their twenty years, more than fifty women have been in the In Process... circle.

Striving continuously for harmony, these women blend their styles and songs in ways that allow what is powerful and true to be heard. Her repertoire, from traditional songs to original contemporary song written by members, articulates the concerns of people around the world.

The women of In Process... look to the oral tradition and spiritual roots to garner strength in carving out a future in a world continually in process.


Blue Moon Rising is an east Tennessee based band with a unique and exciting sound, true to traditional bluegrass,



yet fresh with new, original material. Their name is derived from the title of a newspaper article commemorating the life of "The Father of Bluegrass Music" Bill Monroe.

Since forming in the Fall of 2000, they have performed at numerous prestigious venues including the world famous Station Inn in Nashville, TN. Recently, the band performed alongside Alison Krauss & Union Station at the Fredericksburg Summerfest in Virginia. Haymaker Productions, who presented that show says Blue Moon Rising is "a rare and hot commodity in the bluegrass world - fantastic young musicians who do justice to the roots of the genre ... They play with an energy and spirit that indicates their relative youth, but their harmonies and songwriting belie their age."

The band has a nationally-released CD on Crosscut Records which received a five-star review in Bluegrass Now magazine, and they were selected to showcase at the 2003 IBMA World of Bluegrass Trade Show. Steve Gulley of the band Mountain Heart says, "In my opinion, they're the best kept secret in bluegrass music but look out because that's about to change." Simply put, this band has it all. They play well, sing well, and write well. With credentials like that in a little over two years, it's safe to say this Blue Moon is definitely Rising.

Maura O'Connell has played for Hiawatha before, and it is about time we had her back. In 1980 she was the vocalist for DeDanann, the hot Celtic group from Galway Ireland. If my memory serves me it was October and they were on a whirlwind tour of the states. I say whirlwind with no reservation. After playing the concert at NMU they were relaxing and

talking about the tour. The next concert was scheduled for Winnipeg early the next evening - over 600 miles away. I understand they didn't make it. I'm glad the tour was going east to west - but I digress. Maura mesmerized the crowd with a voice that was big enough to fill a hall yet tinged with the gentle emotion that will bring tears to your eyes. She was phenomenal, but it was obvious that she was destined for more. It is interesting to me how something can make such an impact that you remember it clearly almost 25 years later. First was her rendition of "The Train to Sligo." I'd never heard it before and I haven't heard it since, but I shall never forget it. It is a shame that it was never recorded. Secondly was an impromptu singing of "Waltz Across Texas" during a practice session before the concert started. This is where you could hear her future. Although she had only been in the states for a bit over a week, she nailed it like a seasoned singer who had been singing to underappreciative audiences in roadhouses and honky-tonks longer than she had lived. That's another one that she has never recorded. Finally, I remember my father with tears welling in his eyes when I played DeDanann's recording of Maura singing "Maggie".

A lot has happened for Maura since she was last here. Within a couple of years she had

moved to Nashville and never looked back. She has recorded 10 solo albums - garnering a Grammy nomination for her album "Helpless Heart." she collaborated on another 10 albums and sang background/harmony vocals for the likes of Dolly Parton, Van Morrison, The Chieftains, Nanci Griffith, Francis Black, Peter Rowan and The Nashville Bluegrass Band. She was even cast by Martin Scorsese in his epic movie The Gangs of New York as an Irish migrant street singer (scruffed up a bit for the role).

Maura's singing is not confined by any genre. Her abilities allow her to sing any type of music and her recordings reflect this eclectic talent. Drawing from the compositions of Nashville's hottest writers she is able to penetrate to the heart of their songs. Welcome back Maura.





The Electric Porcupine Dance Band





Electric Porcupine's focus. The craft of performance that guides an audience to feel good and have a great time is what gives breath to their shows.



Over the course of her career she performed at Winnipeg, Wheatland, Jacob's Pillow, Wolf Trap, and on A Prairie Home Companion. Among these, Hiawatha has always been a favorite.






