## **Festival Rules & Reminders**

- Everyone must wear a wristband on his or her wrist in plain sight at all times people on festival grounds without a wristband may be ticketed
- No above-ground fires! All fires must be in the Tourist Park fire rings
- Absolutely no pets allowed
- Camping is only allowed in designated areas. You must have a tag for each camping unit (tent, trailer, screen house, etc.)
- Campers must maintain at least four feet between camping shelters
- Camping shelters should be at least 10 feet from fires
- Absolutely no bicycles, skateboards or roller blades allowed in the concession area or on the adjacent road
- Drumming after sunset is allowed in Area "D" only
- No drumming after 1 a.m. local time
- A curfew of midnight is in effect for children under the age of 18. Children must be at a campsite under adult supervision after this time
- An adult, parent or guardian must supervise all children under the age 18. Disruptive people, including teens and their parents, will be removed from the festival and wristbands will be confiscated
- ✓ Underage drinkers, as well as any person engaged in illegal activities, can and probably will be arrested by the Marquette City Police
- Camping tags must be attached to each camping shelter, and you must camp in the designated area for which you have registered
- Chairs are not permitted on the "Blanket Side" of the Main Stage small chairs must have a seat that touches the ground
- NO laser pointers, Frisbees or balls are allowed in any stage or workshop area
- Playing of recorded or amplified music is not allowed
- Tokens should be used to purchase items from contracted vendors only
- All vehicles (cars, bikes, skateboards, scooters, etc.) should limit speed to walking pace

## **Common Courtesies**

- Parents are responsible for all their children, including teenagers
- Please register ALL children at the Information Tent
- Please keep noise to a minimum in all camping areas, especially after midnight
- Please pick up and properly dispose of all trash anywhere on the festival grounds (stage, camping and concessions areas), including cigarette butts
- Please consult the Information Tent for messages, directions, and lost or found children, parents or

- items (Hiawatha volunteers wearing a Hiawatha Official T-shirt may also be able to help you)
- If you move a picnic table, please put it back where you found it before you leave. Hiawatha is charged for every table that has to be moved after the festival



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## Festival Artwork Winner Joanna Otremba




Hazel Dickens, the incomparable singer who was an authentic voice of America's working class, died April 22, in Washington at 75.

Laura Stein provides a rock-solid beat with her "Boston style" piano, and keeps a keen eye tuned to the progress of the dance. Joel Mabus compounds the beat and seasons the sound with guitar or banjo - or adds a second fiddle. Their set list include several dance-tested originals by Brian and Joel as well as traditional music from Ireland, Scotland, and North America. No academic exercise here - this is the vibrant pulse of a living tradition. So push back the sofa and roll up the rug. The music won't let you sit still - we guarantee it!


Personnel and configurations have changed over time - we've ranged from trio to small orchestra and back again.





pump organ when he was just two years old. Several vears later, his step-mother showed him a few boogiewoogie patterns which further ignited his passion for the blues. At age 14, he played his first gig and after leaving home two years later, he discovered the Winston-Salem, North Carolina, drink-house scene where he continued developing his impressive piano and singing talents.

After spending time on the Miami R&B scene in the late 1950s and inventing his 'button board,' a homemade portable keyboard which he mounted to an ironing

> board that simulated the Hammond B3 organ sound, he made his way to Memphis where he was dubbed Ironing Board Sam for his unique invention. Relocating to Nashville in the

mid-1960s, he became a wildly popular entertainer around the famous black entertainment district along Jefferson Street and performed regularly on the landmark R&B television show Night Train.

## John McCutcheon

No one remembers when the neighbors started calling the McCutcheons to complain about the loud singing from young John's bedroom. It didn't seem to do much good, though. For, after a shaky, lopsided battle between piano lessons and baseball (he was a mediocre pianist and an all-star catcher), he had "found his voice" thanks to a cheap mail-order guitar and a used book of chords.

From such inauspicious beginnings, John McCutcheon has emerged as one of our most respected and loved folksingers. As an instrumentalist, he is a master of a dozen different traditional instruments, most notably the rare and beautiful hammer dulcimer. His songwriting has been hailed by critics and singers around the globe. His thirty recordings have garnered every imaginable honor including seven Grammy nominations. He has produced over twenty albums of other artists, from traditional fiddlers to contemporary singersongwriters to educational and documentary works. His books and instructional materials have introduced budding players to the joys of their own musicality. And his commitment to grassroots political organizations has put him on the front lines of many of the issues important to communities and workers.


Besides his usual circuit of major concert halls and theaters, John is equally at home

in an elementary school auditorium, a festival stage or at a farm rally. He is a whirlwind of energy packing five lifetimes into one. In the past few years alone he has headlined over a dozen different festivals in North America (including repeated performances at the National Storytelling Festival), recorded an original composition for Virginia Public Television involving over 500 musicians, toured Australia for the sixth time, toured Chile in support of a women's health initiative, appeared in a Woody Guthrie tribute concert in New York City, gave a featured concert at the Smithsonian Folklife Festival, taught performance art skills at a North Carolina college, given symphony pops concerts across America, served as President of the fastest-growing Local in the Musicians Union and performed a special concert at the National Baseball Hall of Fame. This is all in his "spare time." His "real job," he's quick to point out, is father to two grown sons.

But it is in live performance that John feels most at home. It is what has brought his music into the lives and homes of one of the broadest audiences any folk musician has ever enjoyed. People of every generation and background seem to feel at home in a concert hall when John McCutcheon takes the stage, with what critics describe as "little feats of magic," "breathtaking in their

ease and grace...," and "like a conversation with an illuminating old friend."

Whether in print, on record, or on stage, few people communicate with the versatility, charm, wit or pure talent of John McCutcheon.

Collectively they spent 14 years under the tutelage of one of bluegrass music's greatest bands, Doyle Lawson & Quicksilver (1996-2009). Darren and Barry were part of DL&Q during its record-setting run of seven-consecutive IBMA Vocal Group of the year awards.

After leaving DL&Q both continued to have major success. Barry fronting his band Second Wind would receive a Grammy Nomination in 2009 for his gospel release "In God's Time." Darren fronting his band Legends of the Potomac would have his release "Takeoff" be one of the top bluegrass CDs of 2010. In November of 2010 the two had always talked of singing together and thus a bluegrass mega-merger was formed. The band consists of veterans Shayne Bartley, Tim Laughlin and Jason Leek.

The Beachley & Scott Band brings forth all the elements of incredible vocal harmonies and rock solid playing with original material from the pen of Barry Scott and many of today's great writers.

Jason Leek, chop guitar, bass and vocals, went to school and lived most of his life in Blountville, TN. He was raised in church and was introduced to music at an early age. Growing up, Jason spent the day with his mom at her music store watching her play the piano and learned to play when he was six years old. His dad, who lives in Jefferson, NC, always had big collections of Doyle Lawson & Quicksilver tapes and several other groups.

Shayne Bartley, banjo, mandolin and bass vocals, has been one of the most in-demand musicians in the last 25 years, having worked with some of the top acts in bluegrass music. At the age of 16, he took the stage as part of his brother's band, Newground, playing guitar. In 1984 at the Festival of the Bluegrass in Lexington, KY,

From there he started his career in music.





Whether they're at a brewery pub, a music festival or on a street corner, Michigan-based band The Northern Skies plays "bluegrass, Americana and Celtic music and pours it through an indie rock funnel to distill something that sounds like a party out in the back yard." (Revue Magazine, Grand Rapids)

Each musician is as talented as they are versatile. In fall 2009, they were selected as finalists in the Great Lakes Song Writing Contest for their song "Mission Accomplished" (www. GreatLakesSongs.com). In summer 2010, they followed up their 2009 appearance at Royal masterpiece," their fourth and most recent album "Northern Skies" was recorded at River City Studios in Grand Rapids. The 2009 album reflects each season of their home state of Michigan. The spirit of each month is captured with eclectic style and diverse instrumentation, an American sound of "acoustic, bluegrass-tinged folk that perks up your ears with an infectious indie-rock sheen." With the flaking ruins of Michigan Central Station or the smoky laughter of a 4th Street bonfire as their backdrop, Petal Shop tells a new story of Detroit. Songs ripe with surgical observation and pleading hope weave their way into the texture of an urban narrative not focused on desperation and recovery but harmony and intuition. Folk music with a color reminiscent of the dusty sepia of America's 30s and 40s finds itself injected with fresh and modern storytelling. Tales of leaving home, urban wilderness, social

absurdity and jubilant nihilism create windows into a space that is as colorful as it is sincere.

Petal Shop performs with an energy that is at once the subtle tension of an intimate folk concert and the wild, Pentecostal drive of punk-driven bluegrass. Fiddle, banjo and guitar cling to each other as three vocals intersect and blend into a single, stratified voice. Dancing is common, both on and off stage as Petal Shop's members beg for "just one 'Amen."

Touring nationally with a European excursion around the corner, Petal Shop has shared the stage with the likes of Lucky Tubb, Dan Miller of Blanche and Goober and the Peas, .357 String Band, Midnight Ghost Train, High Lonesome, Andru Bemis, Listener, Catfish Mafia, Chicken Little, Nana Grizol, Lac Le Belle, Drink Up Buttercup, Audra Kubat and Frontier Ruckus.

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
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
#### 2011 Volunteers of the Year
