The U.S. Senate has taken the first step toward making this a nation of energy efficient buildings.

One week ago the Senate overwhelmingly approved a bill to stimulate the application of known but largely unused techniques that can dramatically reduce the energy now wasted in the built environment.

Today, these same issues are up for an even more crucial vote in a Senate-House conference.

The Senate-passed legislation should be accepted. It would authorize the federal government to:

- Guarantee loans for energy conservation investments in homes and larger buildings.
- Repay a part of such loans.
- Make grants to low-income homeowners for the insulation of their dwellings.
- Pay a quarter of the cost of residential devices for harnessing such renewable energy resources as sun and wind.

In addition, the bill would authorize the development of standards, to be embodied in state and local building codes, to facilitate the design and construction of energy efficient buildings.

For these initiatives, the Senate has earned the wholehearted thanks of the 26,000 members of The American Institute of Architects, and of every other American who still believes there's an energy crisis.

By 1990, measures like these could yield a savings of 12.5 million barrels of oil a day!

We of the AIA know this from the findings of a twoyear study during which we calculated the energy lost through the nation's traditionally profligate, energyintensive methods of design and construction.

The study was grounded in three convictions, drawn from our collective experience in the design of every conceivable kind of structure, from airline terminals to zoos:

- 1. At least one third of the nation's total energy is consumed by the built environment.
- 2. The energy used in the construction and operation of new buildings could be reduced 60 percent through energy-conscious design.

3. A saving of at least 30 per cent could be achieved by making existing buildings more energy efficient.

The savings are manifestly feasible. Within 15 years they could amount to as much oil every day as the nation's 104.7 million passenger cars now use every three days.

That's as much energy—12.5 million barrels of oil a day—as the projected 1990 production of any one of the prime energy industries—domestic oil, nuclear fission, or coal.

The cost? We estimate up to \$1,045 billion over 15 years; a sum significantly less than the value of the energy now being wasted.

Clearly, then, it is in the public interest to propose as a key element in a comprehensive national energy policy:

A nation of energy efficient buildings by 1990.

The current and seemingly abundant supply of foreign oil must not blind us to the urgent need for such a policy. We must still move aggressively to reduce our dependency, not merely on overseas sources but on fossil fuels.

To do this we will obviously need more than legislation.

Successful execution of a national policy will require the cooperation of that broad segment of the economy responsible for the built environment—financial institutions, developers, the building trades unions, engineers, the designers and manufacturers of building materials, and, of course, architects. It will also require the enthusiastic support of the federal establishment, beginning with the White House. (The present Administration has been far too obsessed with the supply side of the energy crisis.) The cooperation of state and local government is essential.

No one can go it alone.

No single institution or profession should or could carry out this strategy singlehandedly—or even try to dominate the process. But the AIA is ready and eager to coordinate the effort. We have no illusion that our extensive research and careful deliberations contain the last word on energy conservation in the built environment. We're interested in other ideas; we have more of our own to share.





You and your staff should be congratulated also on the amount of effort put into the paperwork aspects of licensing so as to ensure this evaluator that he would have in his possession materials necessary in order to enable him to reach a decision that the facility is in compliance with all the rules and regulations, not just the physical ones as it pertains to the fire and health inspections. The Procedures Manual developed by Mr. Merckx and reviewed by Ms. Platt is clear, concise, yet comprehensive. This has assisted me immensely in determining basic compliance with many of the rules.

I have recommended that approval to operate the new facility be given effective today, 2/27/76, and so informed Mr. Merckx via a telephone conversation today.

I. General Information

Evaluation Methods Employed: Review of printed material regarding policies and procedures; interview with Supervisor, Juvenile Director and Judge.

II. Description of Facility

The facility is not operational at the present time because it is a new facility. It has been more than a year in building, planning, etc. It was funded primarily through LEAA funds but the county, at this time, owns the new plant. It is the intention of the county and agreements have been drawn up whereby other counties will use the facility. The Judge has met with other Probate Judges in the Upper Peninsula and worked out written admission policies involving their use. It is expected that approximately ¼ of the beds will be used by counties outside Marquette.

The facility is based on a wheel, hub and spoke approach with one unit of six beds or six rooms available for primarily girls and a similar unit available for boys. In the event there is an overflow, it will be possible to mix the wings. The Supervisor, as the Administrator of the facility is known, lives in the facility with his family. They are in a separate wing as far as bedrooms, living room and bath are concerned. There is only one kitchen and dining area which serves the entire unit. In the center is the major living area which consists of a living room and a more active play area or recreation area which is separated by a large double fireplace with a wall running approximately half-way across the room starting from the center and going in both directions. In addition, there are to be folding walls that can be pulled out to close off the two rooms whenever it is appropriate. The facility has a basement level which includes a garage. In addition, off the living room there is an arts and crafts room. At the main entrance and to the right side is the office area. This is across the corridor from the Supervisor's residence.

The facility sits back in the pine trees and looks very much like a beautiful home. The interior of the facility is also very homelike and relaxing. It should provide a rather tranquil respite for youth placed there.

III. Housing

The facility meets all the rules relating to this, i.e. Rules 2-11.

The Health Department has, as of 2/26/76, given approval for the facility. The State Fire Marshal gave temporary certification effective 1/6/76 through 3/6/76. Since that

inspection was done, the agency has been busy completing the various items which were noted as being in noncompliance by the State Fire Marshal. Of eight items listed on that report, items 1, 2, 4, 5, and 7 have been completed. Only #3, the fireplace glass installation has yet to be done; #6, the notarized affidavits attesting to the fire hazard classification of the wood paneling and wood folding partition needs to be done; and #8, information submitted to the State Fire Marshal outlining the schedule for attendants to be used during sleeping hours needs to be done.

IV. Personnel

Enclosed with this evaluation will be a list of all members of the facility, their positions, duties, salaries and general information regarding their work. Most of this is included in the Procedures Manual or Personnel Practices.

Rules 12-15 are in compliance.

V. Care of Children

The facility complies with the standards in respect to care of children covered in Rules 16-21. The provisions are made for dental, medical, nursing care, physical examination and medical isolation. Notification of illness or accident, discipline and control as well as menus are all covered either in the Procedures Manual or shown through the menus planned and written up. Copies of all this material are in my file.

VI. Program

The agency is an open facility and, therefore, programs related to education, religious and recreational programs are, by and large, carried out through the use of community resources rather than on-campus facilities. It is assumed and again covered in the Procedures Manual that youth placed there will attend the Marquette Public School System. They will attend any religious service of their choice in the community and participate in recreational programs offered in the community if they so desire. In addition, there are provisions made for on-grounds recreation, primarily indoor activities at the present time. Because of the facility's rural location, the agency has great opportunity to utilize the great outdoors during the winter through the use of cross country skiing, tobogganing, sledding, and other sports of that nature. At the present time, however, they do not have this equipment available to them. Since they are in snow country, the basketball court is covered with snow as would be, obviously, volleyball which would have to be an outdoor activity inasmuch as there is no recreation building of that size to allow them to play those large muscle games out of the weather. At the present time, the facility has for large muscle activity only a ping pong table that can be played indoors, but it is the intention to provide weights, speed bags and, in general, improve the quality and quantity of recreational, especially large muscle activity, equipment as soon as possible. There is more than an ample supply of sedentary or table game activities available to the residents. This would include arts and crafts materials as well as checkers, chess, card games, etc.

VII. Records

Inasmuch as the facility is new and has no children residing, a statement regarding the current records obviously is not required except to say that in previous years equette County Detention Facility - Evaluation sbruary 27, 1976

in the old facilities that were operated by the court, records containing the required information were maintained in good order. In addition, it should be noted that improved forms have been developed so as to provide this information in a more efficient manner and more readily readable.

VIII. Recommendations

Inasmuch as the facility is new and as nearly as possible is in compliance with the rules and regulations, it is recommended that the facility be approved to care for a maximum of 12 children through 17 years of age.

OSHA "EXIT" FEDERAL REGULATION

A new ruling issued by the "Occupational Safety and Health Administration", Department of Labor, has determined <u>all</u> public buildings, (city, county, state and federal, etc.,) must abide to federal regulations concerning proper markings for doors, doorways, hallways and any means of egress from all exits and emergency exits. The law, taken from the Federal Register, is as follows:

1910.36 GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

(b) 5. Every exit shall be clearly visible or the route to reach it shall be conspicuously indicated in such a manner that every occupant of every building or structure who is physically and mentally capable will readily know the direction of escape from any point, and each path of escape, in its entirety, shall be so arranged or marked that the way to a place of safety outside is unmistakable. Any doorway or passageway not contituting an exit or way to reach an exit, but of such a character as to be subject to being mistaken for an exit, shall be so arranged or marked as to minimize its possible confusion with an exit and the resultant danger of persons endeavoring to escape from the fire finding themselves trapped in a dead-end space, such as a cellar or storeroom, from which there is no other way out.

1910.37 MEANS OF EGRESS

- (q) 2. Any door, passage, or stairway which is neither an exit nor a way of exit access, and which is so located or arranged as to be likely to be mistaken for an exit, shall be identified by a sign reading "NOT AN EXIT" or similar designation.
 - 5. A sign reading "TO AN EXIT", or similar designation, with an arrow indicating the direction, shall be placed in every location where the direction of travel to reach the nearest exit is not immediately apparent.
 - 8. Every exit sign shall have the word "<u>EXIT</u>" in plainly legible letters not less than 6 inches high, with the principal strokes of letters not less than three-fourths-inch wide.





Lessed agrees that in the event taxes on the demised premises are increased that it will pay an additional amount as rent, which additional amount shall represent the proportion of the increase in the taxes which the demised premises bears to the entire building.

Lessee agrees that at the termination of this lesse by lapse of time or otherwise to yield up the premises to the Lessor in as good repair and condition as the same are at the time of commencement of said term, reasonable use and wear thereof and damage by fire or other casualty not occurring through the default of the Lessee only excepted.

Lessee agrees that before making any alterations in the demised premises, it will obtain the approval in writing of the Lessor to the plans and specifications of such intended alterations.

The Lessee shall have the option or privilege of renewing this lease for an additional term of ten (10) years on the same conditions as are expressed in this lease with the express proviso that the rent to be charged in the renewal shall be the subject of negotiation between the parties.

The Lessee expressly covenants and agraes to give written notice to the Lessor three (3) months before the termination of this lease as to whether said Lessee desires to surrender the premises or make a new lease therefor, and the Lessee covenants and agrees that failure to give such notice shall at the option of the Lessor constitute a renewal of this lease.

Provided always and these presents are upon the express condition that if the Lessee shall fail or neglect to perform and observe any or either of the covenants on its part herein contained, it shall be lawful for the Lessor at any time thereafter and without notice or demand to enter into and upon the demised premises and repossess the same as of its former estate, and to expel the Lessee and those claiming under it, and each and every occupant to remove and put out.

For some time now, we in the district court have been quite dissatisfied with the sporadic program of cleaning and maintenance in the courthouse in general and the district court in particular. Our main complaints are about the condition of the ladies bathroom. As you know, this is also used by the general public and it sees a lot of traffic during the course of a day. We feel that this should be cleaned on a daily basis - thoroughly cleaned with clean soapy water and lysol, not only the toilet and washbasin but also the floor and tiled walls. At present, it receives its cleaning via a squirt bottle of cleaner and paper toweling. The floor has not been thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned in more than a year.

Second, the counters, cabinets, bookcases etc. should also receive attention at least once a week whereas at present this chore is ignored.

Third, the windows should be cleaned on a regular basis.

We all agree that our own desks should be our own responsibility.

After taking these complaints to the Controller's Office, I was instructed to write a letter to you and receive your comments on the situation and then forward it to the Controller who will take it up with the Personnel Committee.

We would appreciate any action you can take to improve the situation.

While this latest evaluation disclosed basically a facility operating in compliance, there were two Administrative Rules that were substantially in non-compliance. Nevertheless, I am recommending regular approval.

Despite this recommendation, the seriousness of the electrical hazard and the very definite need for recreational opportunity both indoor and outdoors, especially in the evening hours, require some definite action to correct those deficiencies.

Should these areas, as cited in the evaluation, be corrected, your facility will be operating at a high level and one that you can justly be proud of.

I recognize you have sent a letter to the Chairman of the County Lands and Building Committee but I am concerned about the electrical hazard potential in terms of the washing machine. Inasmuch as I am writing this letter almost a month after your letter to the Chairman, Ms. Sally May, it seems that a reply from her could be expected very shortly.

I appreciate your basic concern for youth housed at the facility and want to work with you in the provision of quality residential care to the youth placed in your facility.

Section II. Description of the Facility

This facility is less than six months in operation in a brand new physical plant. A more accurate description of the facility is in the initial report dated 2/27/76. Suffice it to say that the facility is well laid out and quite functional based on a wheel, hub and spoke approach with a capacity for 12 children; 6 boys and 6 girls in two separate wings.

The facility is designed to accept children on an emergency basis whether delinquent or neglected with primary emphasis on delinquency until a more appropriate plan can be developed for the particular youth.

A review of statistics disclosed that there were 13 youth detained over 21 days. Three of the 13 had been in the facility before. All 13 ranged between 22 days to a total of 80 days. Of the 14 youth who had been admitted during July, seven had been previously in the facility, or 50%. Some of these involved DSS but the majority were court wards only. It would seem, as far as planning is concerned for these youth, it would be appropriate to again review casework planning for youth who are admitted into the facility so as to avoid readmissions if possible.

Section III. Findings

- A. Administrative Rule 1 Approval of Plans
 - (1) Nonapplicable.
- B. Administrative Rules 2-11 Housing
 - (2) The facility has been approved by the Health Department with no deficiencies noted, while the State Fire Marshal has indicated

two areas of noncompliance. The area involving the schedule for attendance during sleeping hours has been submitted to the State Fire Marshal's Office but the two subsections under the one deficiency relating to wood paneling being noncombustible material and the folding wall are not in compliance; therefore, the State Fire Marshal issued a temporary certification of the facility until 12/10/76. There has been correspondance between the architect and the State Fire Marshal in their efforts to achieve compliance which should occur in the very near future.

There appears to be a problem in environmental safety in relation to the washing machine which has not been properly installed. This is an area that apparently had not been spotted by either the Fire Marshal's Office or the Health Department but needs to be corrected inasmuch as there is a high potential for electrical shock because of the improper installation of the washing machine. This consultant is citing the facility for that specific item as being in noncompliance.

The agency is in compliance with Administrative Rules 2,3,4,5,6,7, 8,9,10 and 11, all relating to adequate space, condition of the facility in terms of cleanliness, equipment, with the one exception noted above, arrangement of rooms, sufficient light and ventilation, square footage, proper bedding, children sleeping alone, place for personal effects in terms of towel, washcloth, toothbrush and comb, and the heating facilities being adequate to maintain a proper temperature in winter weather.

C. Administrative Rule 12-15 Personnel

(3) Adequacy of Staff At All Levels - R12

A review of the staffing pattern would seem to indicate basically that the agency is in compliance in this area; however, there are some discrepancies that need to be mentioned such as no job description for what is entitled a Senior Child Care Worker. This particular position is responsible for the midnight shift when no shift supervisor is immediately available but is rather on call and available through the use of a beeper system. Essentially, this system seems to be adequate and although a problem did occur during that shift, it seems measures have been taken to eliminate this happening in the future. It is important that the job description match the function because it is somewhat different from a regular Child Care Worker's position. The Senior Child Care Worker does not act as a shift supervisor and this distinction meeds to be made. Either the supervisor or deputy supervisor of the facility is on duty or on call at all times.

Mrs. Merckx, the Matron, is on duty 40 hours a week, Monday through Thursday, with a part-time cook coming in for Friday, Saturday and Sunday. There is a discrepancy rether job description that needs to be clarified in writing. Does the Matron have authority over the residents and staff, and under what conditions?

(4) Physical Examinations of Staff - R13

The agency was found to be in compliance.

(5) Qualifications of Staff - R14

All staff either have appropriate training and education suitable for the responsibilities they assume or it has been waived for child care fund matching purposes. This is the case for the deputy supervisor of the home. The supervisor of the facility was grandfathered in earlier.

(6) Staff Members Shall Be Accessible to Children At All Times - R15

The facility does have sufficient staff to comply with this rule, although there was a situation that did occur, as mentioned above, that caused some difficulties. The staff or administration has taken appropriate action to eliminate this in the future. It simply involved one incident and in all likelihood will not reoccur.

D. Administrative Rules 16-24

(7) Provisions for Dental, Medical and Nursing Care - R16

The agency does have a written policy covering this satisfactorily. However, there was a situation that occurred once or twice whereby a youth newly admitted to the facility refused to undergo a physical examination. This condition was not expected and unplanned for. Obviously the agency needs to develop some procedures to protect the children who are already in the facility from any contagion that the incoming youth might bring. This has been discussed with staff and it is assumed, as well as expected, that this condition will be dealt with administratively and in writing. The agency is in compliance.

(8) Physical Examinations of Children - R17

Children are given a physical examination as soon as possible after admission with the one exception noted previously. Again, these procedures are in writing. The agency is in compliance.

(9) Medical Isolation - R18

This is handled either by the youth remaining in his own room or if the contagion warrants it, he is removed and placed in the hospital setting. Again, this is covered in the Standard Operating Procedures Manual. The agency is in compliance.

(10) Immediate Notice in the Case of Illness or Accident - R19

There has been no major problem in this area. The judge has been notified appropriately when these have occurred. Compliance exists.

(11) Discipline and Control - R20

Action taken by the facility staff is recorded in the youth's file. The description covering the onset as well as the basis for the action is written. Compliance exists.

(12) Adequate Nutrition - R21

This rule is in compliance. Meals are planned, menus established and a review of the written menu indicated that the standards of nutrition as set up by the State Department of Health were being met. Any changes to the menu are recorded.

(13) Provision of Education for Children Detained - R22

This rule is met either through children attending the school in the community or, for those few children who are detained within the facility, a tutor is brought in to assist the child in the area of education, primarily remedial. Fortunately, children are not detained that securely in the facility for any significant length of time. In the event that a youth was ordered detained in the facility as opposed to being placed in the open program, a more formal arrangement would have to be made in order to actually comply with that rule because the teaching facilities, the educational staff and the equipment would have to have the approval of the State Department of Public Education which, at the current time, it does not.

(14) Opportunity for Indoor and Outdoor Activities In Order to Promote Physical and Mental Health - R23

This rule is not in compliance. While there is some equipment available for indoor recreation and some equipment available for outdoor recreation, the outdoor equipment is not readily usable inasmuch as there is not the space developed in order to make outdoor recreation possible. At the time of the inspection, the facility was being landscaped, meaning a bulldozer had just leveled the area behind the facility which had been planned as the general recreation area. There seemed to be little intent to blacktop an area large enough for significant recreation under most climatic conditions. Currently, there was a temporary arrangement whereby a badminton court was set up across a road. There was no possibility for playing basketball, volleyball, etc. except on the unsodded ground which, in the event of rain, would be very muddy and inappropriate for that kind of activity. Indoor equipment for recreation consisted of one ping pong table. It seems that equipment such as a Foos-Ball, pool table and weight lifting equipment would certainly not only be advisable but necessary equipment for 12 children.

While there were weaknesses as far as ongrounds recreation were concerned, the agency did make provision for offgrounds recreation which would include going down and swimming in a nearby city

swimming hole with appropriate lifeguards on duty. In addition, children not restricted to the grounds did have access to leaving the facility to participate in other community recreational areas. However, since the facility does have a curfew on for youth, especially the evening hours, it would seem most appropriate and necessary to have some of the more usual or normal recreational facilities such as the basketball court, volleyball court and badminton court, all of which could be multipurpose for outdoor recreation activity as well as the indoor equipment such as Foos-Ball, a pool table, barbells, weight lifting equipment, etc. Youth living in cramped quarters or at least in a restricted area need definite means to burn off that excess energy that youth traditionally have.

(15) Records of Children - R24

The facility did meet this rule.

Section IV. Summary

The agency was found to be not in compliance with Administrative Rule 23 and not in full compliance with Administrative Rule 2, relating to the State Fire Marshal's recommendations and this consultant's recommendation as it relates specifically to the improperly installed washing machine.

It should be noted, however, that Judge DeFant has attempted to obtain the necessary recreational equipment, especially the outdoor variety, from the Chairman of the County Lands and Buildings Committee Board of Commissioners in his letter dated July 14, 1976.

Section V. Recommendation

A. Approval Action

A regular approval status is being recommended despite two rule violations. They are as follows:

- 1. Administrative Rule 2, specifically the inadequately installed washing machine with the potential hazard for electrical shock.
- 2. Administrative Rule 23, inadequate opportunity for outdoor recreation and inadequate or insufficient indoor recreation equipment.

B. Terms of the Approval Status

- (1) Maximum capacity 12 children
- (2) Age range 6 through 16 years of age
