Dear Editor:

On November 22, the three-judge panel of the Michigan Court of Ap-peals, in a unanimous decision, affirmed the judgment of the Alger County Circuit Court in the case involving the status of land within the old Burton Ave./Summit St. right-of-way in Grand Marais. The Appeals Court decision is not being appealed to the Michigan Supreme Court. Therefore, the decision of the Appeals Court is final.

The court's two-page decision came sooner than expected. It said that when a portion of the plat of West Grand Marais was vacated in 1894 by the Grand Marais Mill Company, the streets and alleys, as well as the lots affected, reverted to the ownership of the company, and that "...the Mill Company was free to convey the vacated property, including the former right-of-way, in any manner that it saw fit." A copy of the decision (case #237-868) is available from the Appeals Court in Lansing.

Over the past century, more than two dozen parcels within the former right-of-way were sold by the Grand Marais Mill Company and its heirs. In 1999, a study by the Township's Zoning Board of Appeals Chair John Markes, commissioned by the Township Board, raised serious questions about the validity of deeds to property within the right-of-way. Markes went so far as to say that the right-of-way had never been w cated and therefore remained public land. A release of the study to Grand Marais Post Office boxholders raised a storm of controversy and caused widespread confusion over the status of land title within the right-of-way. This led to the litigation now finally resolved by the Appellate Court.

In addition to the controversy and confusion experienced by the community, the study has caused major difficulties and stress for those of us who own property within the former right-of-way. It has been a sorry chapter in the history of Burt Township, and-after the necessary actions have been taken to repair the damage which has been done--we can put this all behind us.

DO THE RIGHT THING By Lee Goewey

"The mere existence of conservatives should be proof enough to liberals of the fallacy of their belief in the perfectibility of mankind."

As we move from the specific to the general, from the personal to the anonymous, we often find that we move from the sublime to the ridiculous. In the following four examples, I offer you three of the former and one of the latter, by way of illustration.

In his sermon on the mount, one of the things Jesus taught his twelve disciples was what we know as *The Lord's Prayer:* His summation of what we need to take into account when we pray to God totals 66 words. Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, an immortal message of healing and hope to our nation while embroiled in civil war, consisted of only 286 words.

In 1776, fifty-six representatives of the United States of America addressed the nations of the world, pledging their lives, fortunes and sacred honor in our Declaration of Independence. This totaled but 1322 words.

In 2002, the U.S. Government rules and regulations for the sale of cabbage amounts to 26,911 words. Are you able to figure out which of these four examples is ridiculous?

Our founders clearly understood that government was a necessary evil, and that the less there was of it and the fewer and simpler its powers, the freer and safer we would be. Unique among the nations of the world, the American people held all power at the outset. Only power that the people gave the government was power the government legitimately possessed. Government, in other words, could not ever legally possess any power not already possessed by the people. (This is a test which you may apply to law and regulation today.) The people also understood that each transfer of power to government lessened the freedom of the people; therefore the powers of government needed to be kept few and specifically enumerated in the Constitution.

Generations of Americans since then have incrementally handed over more and more power, losing more and more freedom in the process. In recent years, the courts have been allowed to usurp legislative power, making law themselves, illegally, by judicial fiat, and they have not been successfully deterred in doing so. Aggravating this process has been an accelerating trend of failure of adult citizens to pass on to succeeding generations of children the value and importance of our heritage and history. Today, all cultures are held to be of equal value and our own is given short shrift. This is a sure route to national suicide, and many of our intellectuals in positions of influence and authority, especially in education, hold that not to be a bad thing.

Regulations for the sale of cabbage are an excellent example of the insane mountains of minutiae produced by an ever-more powerful government, to the attendant paralysis and diminution of our freedom. We are surrounded today on every side by bureaucracy run amok and, because it all takes place so slowly, we are like the proverbial frog who began to be boiled alive in a cool pot of water atop a cold stove. We don't realize what's happening to us until it's too late.

It's long past time for us to DO THE RIGHT THING and reclaim the freedom we have lost by giving the government powers it doesn't need, to do things better left undone, or that we should have done for ourselves. (Done at the local level where we have a prayer of controlling and directing them.) We must be especially vigilant now to avoid losing precious freedoms in the name of "homeland security." All options must be carefully considered.

Your first step must be to educate yourself on the situation and then insure that you and your schools teach your children what they need to know to save themselves and their country from the lunatic lovers of big government. Always remember the "KISS" principle: Keep It Simple, Stupid: We don't *need* twenty-seven thousand words to tell us how to sell cabbage!

After these things are accomplished, let your elected officials know what you believe and what you expect from them, in a courteous manner. DECISION RENDERED ON THE BURTON/SUMMIT- CONTROVERSEY

After so many years of turmoil, harassment and costly legal fees for many of our local property owners, this controversy has been settled.

It was caused by the 70 some page report, compiled by John Markes, and sanctioned by our Township Board upon the request of one property owner, then mailed out to all Burt township residents. I was tremendously upset upon receiving this report, as I knew he had to be in error, and rudely asked him why he would do such a thing. Like the old cliché of "opening a can of worms," I predicted he had opened one that would never be closed and some neighbors would never be good neighbors again. The decisions rendered first by our Circuit Court, and being appealed, again by the Appellate Court, has solved this matter beyond question.

This report, questioned a strip of land, known as the Burton Avenue/ Summit Street right-of-way, which stretched from Cowell Street west for seven blocks. His whole report was based upon the fact that this socalled right-of-way was actually still in Township ownership, therefore anyone who had been deeded any part of it over the past 100 years or more, did not have good title to it. Unfortunately, or perhaps I should say lack of thorough research in not obtaining a copy of the document proving that it had been vacated, legally, in 1894 brought about this drawn out conflict...

I know the majority of the Grand Marais people, who received Markes report, not understanding it, just set it aside. Others, who were more knowledgeable of events that had transpired in the past, did not, and many were upset that this was allowed to happen. If the individual who sought this information to be legally researched, feeling they had justification that past land transactions were not done as law demanded, certainly it should have been done by a licensed attorney, qualified to do such a search, instead of someone, who felt they had the expertise to challenge records from over a hundred years past, and more important, having our own elected representatives, go along with it.

Many involved, who were once good neighbors, will never be again. In the process of doing this search, and disseminating a personal, unqualified opinion, two people, both of whom had devoted most of their lives to our town, were critically and publicly demeaned, to the point where their reputations were jeopardized.

On the basis of this one man's, and again I will use the word, "unqualified", opinion neighbors cut into neighbors property, others actually, and deliberately placed old cars and trailers, woodpiles and such upon a neighbors beautiful lawn, without seeking out a legal opinion as to whether or not they had such a right. When our law officer was called he then threatened to arrest the people who had suffered this trespass if they were to try and remove what was placed on their property. This certainly was enough to shake the faith of a lot of people as to the fairness of our elected, or appointed township representatives, and law officer. Even when presented with documented proof, that this unqualified person's opinion definitely needed to be questioned, our board simply ignored it. In answering peoples questions as to the status of the situation, they also claimed having no part in it.

In all fairness, all of our residents should demand that, both, or at least the Appellate Court of Appeals decision should be made public to all Burt Township residents. I would hope this may set a precedent that might prohibit this ever occurring again, and that our elected officials will seek competent legal guidance before they concur with such a misguided, report, such as the one they allowed, that initiated all these problems.

Many of you might say that since I personally was not affected by any of this, it's none of my business. I disagree and feel these things need to be known by all of our people, as, whenever any questions were brought to our Township Board, in regard to this conflict, they always claimed they really did not have any responsibility in it.

The entire conflict was based upon the fact that it was the Township who supposedly owned this disputed area, and since they never even questioned the facts rendered by this unqualified person, and that they had sanctioned his doing this, they could not truthfully claim they were uninvolved. By allowing this to have been sent to all the people, and even within its content, the author claiming it was under the Township auspices, how could they not be involved?


I watched my neighbors suffer through all this turmoil, causing them even some health problems, not to mention the years it has taken to have this resolved, and the money they have had to spend to have it proved that the property they purchased, and vastly improved, was theirs.

I definitely believe some apologies should also be made, especially to Frank Mead, and James Carter, both whose integrity was questioned. Most of you folks have known both of these men for many, many years, and of their devotion to Grand Marais. I'm of the oldest generation here now, and I do not know any living person today who has more documented proof of land transactions, and of Grand Marais history than Jim Carter. He printed his very first publication when he was ten years old, and is still working on an update. Everyone who cares and treasures the past events of our town, should thank him for this, as it is the only way we will have this to pass down to our future generations. After all the years of dedication to our town, these men did not deserve to be treated so upon the basis of such a report prepared by an unqualified, and fairly newcomer to this town.
