Grand Marais hosted the 21st Annual Fly-In and Pig Roast at the airport on Saturday, July 19, 2003.



Dave and Karen Cook were first on the scene at 5:30 that morning, getting the roast pig and turkey underway. Four aircraft were already on the field the day before, their pilots

electing to forego the "First to Arrive" prize in order to get a jump on the festivities.

By 7:30 the various volunteer crews began to assemble. The day was clear and sunny and everyone eagerly awaited the first aircraft. By 11 a.m. nothing but a swarm of hyper-active grasshoppers had flown in, and the assembled multitude was becoming apprehensive.

Suddenly the radio came to life and the sound of an inbound plane was heard. Shortly after, at 11:15, Wayne Braden of Traverse City landed and taxied in, claiming his official Fly-In tee-shirt as the first arrival of the day. Many more were to follow.



By noon, the meal was ready and being served, to the delight of all. There was scarcely a morsel left by 1:30 p.m. Just after 3 p.m. we logged the 24th visitor's landing of the day, making an official count of

28 aircraft on the field for the event.

Receiving the prize for the longest distance flown to attend was our own Bob Caldwell, who arrived in his newly-refurbished Navion from his "flatlander" abode near Port Clinton, Ohio! Oldest pilot of the day was Red Rowley of Beaver Island in his Lake amphibian. The youngest pilot was Airport Manager Sandee Sibbald's "little boy" Jeff, of North Branch, MI, in a Cessna 180.

All in all, a great day was had by everyone who attended, although we did miss the opportunity to see the local area from the air due to our friend Mike Bodak's inability to be with us for the day with his Cessna twin. Congratulations and thanks are due to all who had a hand in making the occasion a success, and we look forward to seeing you again next year for the 22nd installment of this annual classic.

Helping To Save the Pickle Barrel House

For years the Pickle Barrel House has been slowly falling apart, and in recent years the amount of damage has increased alarmingly. Uncertainty whether the Barrel was ever given to the town has contributed to its neglect. Some people think that it is now too late to save the little building. The Grand Marais Historical Society hopes they are wrong. They are working to establish title to the property on which the Barrel stands, and to raise the funds needed for its restoration. It is their goal to return the house to the way it looked when it was first given to William and Mary Donahey in 1926. They would like the restored house to be a tribute to Mr. Donahey and his stories about the tiny, resourceful people, the Teenie Weenies.

The Historical Society is looking for a cooper (someone skilled at building wooden barrels) or skilled at historic preservation, to do or oversee the work on the building. In the meantime, they will cover the roof and protect the barrel to prevent further damage this winter.

Their fund raising efforts began on the Fourth of July. Two "Save the Pickle Barrel" floats appeared in the parade, and a display telling about



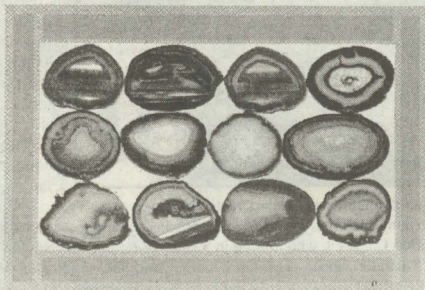
the Pickle Barrel House was set up outside the building. Free pickles were given with a donation at the Barrel House throughout the day. Fund raising continued at the Fly-In and at the Saturday night pasty dinner for the kayakers. Pickle jars for donations have been placed at local businesses around town, along with a brief history of the Barrel. The Historical Society plans to continue its fund raising during the music festival weekend. Tax-deductible donations can be made at any Peoples State Bank or sent to Save the Pickle Barrel House, P.O. Box 179, Grand Marais, MI 49839.

A Message from the Supervisor

Tom Marcin was in town last week, for the first time since the dedication of the Park's Pavilion. He especially enjoyed the Wednesday's vespers at the Pavilion, while viewing the sun setting over the Lake. Thank you again Tom for your generosity. We are getting lots of compliments on the great tastes achieved using the Pavilion's grills, too.

Don't know if you've seen this or not, but apparently due to the lower water in the Lake, and the last few seasons of severe winter storms, these vessel(s) (hidden treasures) were resurrected



(exhumed by Mother Nature) this spring from the beach. While kayaking, two local residents, Chuck Cardinal and Al Wissinger, discovered these relics. How long this wreckage will be there before the Lake recaptures them totally is anybody's guess. It appears one of the vessels is 200 foot long. I suspect the Lake is saying, "You can run-around, but you can't hide from me"... Their location is about 10 miles East of Grand Marais. Is there anyone out there that could tell us more about them? Could this be the Christopher, or Curtis? Or is it the Trempe, a barge with ore, which went ashore 10 miles east of Grand Marais in 1878? There's a lot of black sand around it.

Every Tuesday at 10 a.m. at the Community

Center, updates and reviews are taking place by the Alger County Road Commission concerning the paving of H58 West through the Picture Rocks National Lakeshore Park. All are invited to attend.

Another important construction project, which we are excited about is in the works. The final design and engineering/survey data is being compiled for the construction of the harbor's protective dike. As you recall, we are looking for 100% federal funding of one of the three designs submitted as a possible solution to the Lake's erosion and sediment deposit in our harbor. The Army Corps of Engineers are moving forward with surveys and designs for the "55-degree Recommendation", which is about \$9 Million. It consists of 2,700 feet of stone reinforced breakwall beginning and adjacent to the East Channel's Breakwall, and ending about 600 feet East of Katherin Street in the harbor. Boats and barges will be deployed soon to drill various locations along this proposed route. DO THE RIGHT THING

"The mere existence of conservatives should be proof enough to liberals of the fallacy of their belief in the perfectibility of mankind."

Now that the Congress' report of their investigation of the 9-11 attack is published, there appears a host of conflicting and confusing claims and charges about it. Herewith are a few observations on the subject.

First, a bipartisan group of Senators and others in Congress urgently clamors to have the President declassify 28 pages or so of the 900-page document. The White House refuses to do it, citing compromise of sources and methods crucial to other, ongoing investigations of the matter. The main claim of those favoring release of the information is that it has nothing to do with national security, consisting merely of facts that would prove embarrassing to the administration, if revealed.

Second, the Saudi Arabians profess violent outrage over the classified pages, demanding their immediate release. If they are not, the House of Saud claims that their government is being "convicted by innuendo", and that revealing everything will exonerate them.

Regarding the Congressional demand, let's first understand something: There will be little or no criticism of Congress or members of Congress, past or present, found in this report. This despite the fact that, since the era of Senator Frank Church in the '70s, Congress doggedly proceeded to gut and geld our intelligence agencies. Congress placed maximum emphasis on space-based and other high-tech means of spying on our enemies, while virtually destroying our human intelligence collection capabilities, because they were "nasty" and "ungentlemanly" and generally beneath our dignity. Our intelligence agencies were prevented from dealing with or paying off anyone with a criminal nature or background; we could only associate with or seek information from "nice people". Our spymasters were retired and their networks rolled up. We were going to be modern and politically correct and courteous about this ugly business. FBI, CIA and other agencies had their turf carefully identified. They were not to encroach on one another or, in many cases, even share information or talk to one another. This agency was strictly confined to operations inside our borders; that agency had to remain outside those same borders. Knowing these things will also allow them to pin down things of an evidentiary nature which they need to destroy or conceal in order to cloak their perfidy.

I must confess that I have a much greater trust in the President and his assertion that we need to protect sources and means connected with ongoing investigations than I have in the Saudis and our Congress as they scream for "openness".

Please, DO THE RIGHT THING and support the President's position in this matter by contacting him and your Senators and Representative. You may agree or disagree with me, but the important thing is to let these elected officials know what you believe and what you expect from them, in a courteous manner. REGARDING TOWNSHIP DECISIONS

In November of 1998 a unanimous decision was made by our board, to sanction a thorough search of a seven block stretch of property. The Supervisor, as well as other members of the board have changed, but regardless of this being a very divisive issue, it continued to be wholeheartedly supported by continuing boards.

That decision was to authorize the chair of the Zoning Board of Appeals, John Markes, to do this search upon the request of one property owner. John Markes did not have the qualifications to undertake such a search. The general public were not aware of what was happening until they received the 71 page completed report in March of 1999.

Most people upon receiving this set it aside as it was much too comprehensive. Unfortunately, some of those having ownership within the area of question, did actually believe they had a legal claim based on the townships approval of this report.

It immediately initiated serious confrontation between neighbors in that strip of land. Those expecting to gain additional land, and those in ownership, entered into long and very disruptive battles. Some stripped their neighbors land, others boldly, intentionally trespassed upon a neighbors property, and many legal battles were initiated. Those who had been good neighbors for many, many years, now became enemies.

Though we had no ownership within this strip, I was a witness to the trespassing, harassing, stripping of a hill-side, and the continuing and increasing enmity between all of these neighbors, that forced them into a long legal, and costly litigation.

Eventually the problem went to the Circuit Court for a decision. This consumed another period of time, adding costs to the property owners attempt to defend their title, as well as those who, felt they were entitled to one-half of the disputed strip because of the townships sanction of it. The final decision of the Circuit Court was not rendered until October of 2001.

Requests for answers from the board at that time, were ignored. Instead the matter was simply referred to in the Grand Marais Gazette, with the township claiming no involvement in this issue. Yet, individuals seeking direct answer by written correspondence were given to understand that the township board, did authorize, support and give cooperation to Mr. Markes in letters of reply from the Supervisor.

In the Markes report, not only did he base most of his decisions upon the property ownership of Land Titles, instead of land boundaries, which the court recognized as being the real problem, but he then proposed remedies, such as an Assessor's Plat, which the township board seemed to think was the answer. Had that truly come about, the costs for every property owner within that seven block strip would have been, for many, beyond their financial capability.

In the process of compiling this report Markes also demeaned individuals who had spent their lifetime serving this village in many, many ways. Had the board been willing to accept a copy of the documentation of the Vacation of this Right-of-Way by Circuit Court Action in 1894 when offered to them by one of these individuals, perhaps the decision they had made to sanction Mr. Markes to do this search, might have been a different one.

Unfortunately, they were not willing to meet, or reply to offers from those having that documentation. Finally I was granted a meeting with Supervisor Durrwachter, with another member present, and did furnish them with a copy of it. I honestly thought the board would then take into consideration the fact the Markes Report was flawed and perhaps take some action to end this bitter controversy.

When the decision was rendered by the Circuit Court in October of 2001, stating the **Township had never had claim to any of this disputed property**, proof that the Markes Report was flawed, the board still did nothing to try and end the problem, or even reply to questions asked them as to what the true status of their property was.

Ironically, some individuals were reassured by a member of the board they had nothing to worry about. How anyone, especially a board member, knowing an appeal had been made to a higher court and the final decision would not be known until that court rendered its decision, was very questionable. The board still maintained to the public, they had no involvement, but in reply to personal letters supported the Markes Report.

Finally, on November of 2002, after near four years of controversy, the Michigan Court of Appeals rendered their decision, once again confirming the Markes Report had no merit. This certainly should have reversed the boards, or the Supervisors belief, that it was NOT a valuable document and would continue to serve this village well for many years, as they had previously stated, but actually was proof of their error in judgment by their decision in not seeking the services of the Township Attorney, or other qualified help. When no further appeal was made to the Michigan Supreme Court, within the statute of time allowed, **THIS DECISION BY THE COURTS BECAME FINAL.**

The wonder and delight of fishing with a child is unmatched. It is a simple joy, yet one which provides insight into learning and life.

I recently held a fishing symposium with fifteen of my friends. We spent hours reliving fishing stories of trips gone by and planning for our adventures yet to materialize. When it came time to draw partners for the day upon the water, I drew Conner, my friend's eight year old grandson who was visiting from Hawaii. We were to be canoe partners and fishing buddies for the next day.

We went to bed knowing that the fishing would begin early the next morning. I, for one, made mental inventory of my tackle boxes and poles. By the time I drifted off to sleep, I had selected the two poles I would take, arranged the tackle box with the lures I wanted, loaded my canoe and packed snacks for Conner and myself to enjoy on the lake. 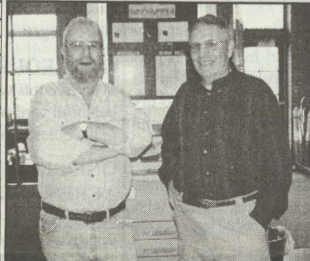

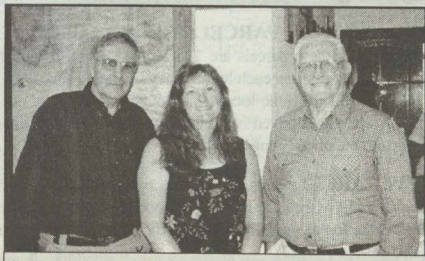

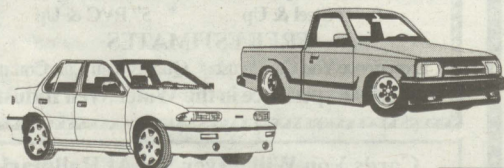
