A Message from the Supervisor By Lee Durrwachter, **Burt Township Supervisor**

Those who may be at Risk

The recent power outages renewed our efforts to continue to work towards solutions of those who may be at risk. As part of that evaluation we have begun compiling a list. If you would like to have your name included, please let us know by calling the Township office at 906-494-2381, and provide the following information:

What's your primary source of heat?

What type of stove do you use for cooking?

Are you on city water, or do you have your own well?

Do you have a generator?

Do you need help starting your generator? If you have a wood stove to supplement your heat, would you need wood in an emergency?

Would you be interested in making use of the Community Center while the power is out?

If so, would you need transportation to the Community Center? Normally, Hungry Jim leads with articles about our economy and the thrust of "crybaby's" midseason form, but the tip of that iceberg is here. The recent Energy and Water Bill, which excluded the funding of our Harbor Dike, due to funding the rebuilding effort from the war that's "over" in Iraq, included enough money to fund "Hooters" and "Polluters" in Shreveport, Louisiana. Now the government has stepped in and sent huge quantities of plywood overseas to Iraq adding even more problems to the nationwide shortage of plywood. Perhaps you haven't notice the drastic price spikes, but two years ago plywood sold for about \$5 or \$6. Now plywood is selling for about \$17. Of course other factors such as low inventories and a weak economy could be better reasons that the price has tripled since early summer. Other reasons cited for low plywood inventory included wildfires in California, where homeowners are rebuilding, severe storms that hit the East Coast earlier this year and the closings of some lumber mills in the South. Although, the dent in supply of plywood purchased by the government may be arguable, I still haven't heard what they (our money) have paid for it. If the uncertainty of the economy caused inventory shortages, is the recovery really here and more importantly, affordable? Now, I've heard steel price tariff's may be rolled back. One thing is certain, supporting the war in Iraq continues to take many forms of payment, which leaves us all short changed.

In the meantime, I hope you had a Happy Thanksgiving, I did spending time this holiday with my soon to be 97-year-old mother

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

Annual Customer Do-Not-Call Notification

To address consumer concerns about unwelcome telemarketing calls, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) and Federal Trade Commission (FTC) have established a national Do-Not-Call Registry The registry applies to all telemarketers (with the exception of certain non-profit and political organizations) and covers both interstate and intrastate telemarketing calls. Commercial telemarketers are not allowed to call you if your number is listed on the registry.

You can register your phone number for free, and it will remain on the national Do-Not-Call Registry for five years. You may re-enter your number onto the list when the five years have passed, and you may remove your name from the list at any time. The Do-Not-Call Registry will not prevent all unwanted calls. It does not cover the following:

- calls from organizations with which you have established a business relationship:
- calls for which you have given prior written consent; calls which are not commercial or do not include unsolicited adver-
- calls by or on behalf of tax-exempt non-profit organizations.

Consumers may register their residential telephone number, including wireless numbers, on the national Do-Not-Call Registry at no cost by telephone or on the Internet. To register by telephone, consumers may call 1-888-382-1222. For TTY call 1-866-290-4236. You must call from the phone number you wish to register. You may also register by Internet at www.donotcall.gov. Inclusion of your telephone number on the national Do-Not-Call Registry will be effective three months follow ng your registration.

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Seniors and Holiday Depression -Depression is Never Normal

(Farmington Hills, MI December 2, 2003) - Depression is never normal at any age. The holidays however, can be an especially troublesome time for older adults. Seniors, their families, friends, and caregivers need to be sensitive to coping with depression around this time of the year.

The holiday season is traditionally a time to gather with family and friends and reflect upon the past while toasting the New Year ahead. For the elderly, the holidays can be an emotional time that can lead to depression.

"It's important to remember that events and traditions associated with the holidays can often trigger a heightened awareness of losses and limitations in older adults, resulting in the emergence or worsening of depression symptoms," said Albert Bayer, M.D. Dr. Bayer a geriatric psychiatry expert in private practice serves as clinical coordinator for MPRO, Michigan's Health Care Quality Improvement Organization.

"Depression is not a normal part of aging, nor is it a natural reaction to changes associated with aging," stressed Bayer. "Families need to be in tune to the emotional needs of loved ones. When symptoms of depression are effectively recognized, they are typically very sensitive to appropriate treatment."

Some of the more common symptoms of depression in seniors include:

- · Persistent sadness
- · Withdrawal from regular social activities
- Slowed thinking or response. Staring off into space
- · Lack of energy or interest in things that were once enjoyable
- Weight changes/Changes in sleep patterns
- · Inability to concentrate

"We all experience an influx of emotions around the holidays, but it's important to remember that older adults may feel more acutely the passing of time, the absence of loved ones who have passed away and the distance of children who may have moved away," said Vicki Boyle, RN, BSN, MPRO. Ms. Boyle is a project manager for a special study on depression in the elderly.

"If someone suspects a senior in their life is depressed, the best gift of all is seeking help for that individual," said Boyle. First steps are important:

- Talk to the senior and see if you can figure out what's bothering them
- Encourage the senior to see a physician, if they are apprehensive, go with them. An illness can trigger depression
- If the senior is in a nursing home, talk to the staff

"Support is necessary, be persistent until you get to the source of the problem," stressed Boyle.

The experts concur that depression is not an inevitable part of growing old. Depression is treatable. For questions on senior mental health see your physician. 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
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



National Diabetes Month All Foods Can Fit!

November was National Diabetes Month. It is estimated that almost 500,000 adults and 6,200 youth under 18 years of age have diabetes in the State of Michigan. Studies suggest that over 200,000 Michigan adults have diabetes and are not aware of it and over 550,000 Michigan adults have pre-diabetes.

The Michigan Dietetic Association is committed to promoting healthy eating and well being for all people. People with diabetes have the same nutrition needs as anyone else. Along with exercise and medication, healthy eating is important for good diabetes control.

According the American Dietetic Association, "medical nutrition therapy, provided by registered dictitians as part of a person's health care team, has been proven effective in treatment and prevention of nutrition-related diseases (such as diabetes). People receiving medical nutrition therapy, or MNT; have been shown to have fewer complications, fewer hospitalizations, and lower health care costs.

No food is off limits, but make a few healthy choices to help keep your blood sugar under control. A Registered Dictitian can help you work these guidelines into a healthy meal plan that will fit your life-

- Try to cat about the same amount of food at about the same time each day.
- Choose whole grain carbohydrates, such as whole wheat breads and pasta, whole grain cereals, and brown rice. Include dried beans and peas 2 to 3 times a week.
- Although sugar sweetened foods can fit-use them sparingly and balance them with other carbohydrates foods in your meal. Choose sugar free drinks or lower sugar food options when avail-
- Eat a variety of foods, including fruits, vegetables, whole grains low fat dairy foods, and lean meat, poultry, fish, or alternatives
- Choose lower fat options and limit saturated fats and cholesterol.

Use less salt. Use herbs and spices to taste, instead.

Remember that everyone can benefit from a healthy diet. Healthy eating now can help prevent type 2 diabetes later in life. A Registered Dietitian can help you build life-long healthy eating habits for you and your

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The Last Time We Had Fresh Turkey For Thanksgiving By Dayne Shaw

Years ago, in the nineteen forties, when I was young, we did not go the grocery and purchase a frozen self-basting turkey, with a plug stuck in it's breast that pops up when it is done. If we wanted to we could purchase one at the meat market that was cleaned and almost ready to roast.

Our family always gathered at my Uncle Russell's house, in the small town of Port William, Ohio. This is where we had our thanksgiving feast. My Uncle Russell always felt that a fresh turkey was absolutely necessary to make the meal a success. He was not satisfied with going to the meat market to get his fresh turkey, he would go to a local farm and purchase a large live turkey and bring it back to butcher on the morning of Thanksgiving.

This task was not an easy one; it consisted of killing the bird and then soaking the carcass in a tub of boiling water. The hot water made it eas ier to remove the feathers.

The feather plucking was done a hand full at a time. After the feathers were removed, he would have to cut the turkey open to take out the in-

The whole process was no easy task and my uncle started very early in the morning. At the Thanksgiving dinner, as my uncle carved the golden brown turkey, surrounded with a table full of great things to eat and about ten hungry people, he would say, "If you want good meat it has to

On the morning of our last really fresh Thanksgiving turkey, Uncle Russell started his process the same as previous years

As gruesome as it may seem, to kill the turkey you cut off its' head. To do this my uncle would stuff the live turkey into a large burlap bag. Only its head stuck out and the bag was tied shut with a string.

Almost everyone has probably heard the old saying, (Running around like a chicken with its head cut off). The reason for this saving is, chickens do not have very large brains, and when their head is cut off, they jump and flop around a lot with reflex actions. Thus, the saying came

A turkey is much bigger than a chicken but the reaction is the same Uncle Russell always put the bag on the enormous turkey to keep it from flopping around. This time when my uncle brought the axe down on the big bird's neck, he also cut the string holding the sack closed.

The headless turkey got out of the burlap bag and took off running, not flopping, but running. It tore across the neighbors back yard and ran into the side of his garage, bounced off the wall of the garage and took off up the alley heading for main street, with Uncle Russell, still holding the axe, in hot pursuit.

My uncle lost track of the headless turkey and was following the blood trail when he passed Buck Barlow, a neighbor, sitting on his front porch. Buck had come out on his front porch to smoke his pipe; his wife would never let him smoke the old smelly thing in the house. My uncle, with a bloody axe in his hand, looked up at Buck. Buck said, "Did you lose something Russ?" My Uncle replied, "have you seen---." That was all he got out when Buck took his old corncob pipe out of his mouth and pointed the stem toward an old shed, across the street, about twenty-five yards away. My uncle knew by the big grin on Buck's face that he would never live this early morning chase down.

Uncle Russell found the dead turkey behind the shed where it had finally run out of gas. He took the bird back and finished cleaning it. He used the leftover hot water to clean up the mess the turkey had left on their foot race through town.

That thanksgiving the dinner was as good as ever but when Uncle Russell carved the turkey he did not make his usual comment, "If you want good meat it has to be fresh.

That was the last time he ever purchased a live turkey and another Thanksgiving tradition came to an end.
