Many things have happened in Grand Marais this past year. Michigan's Governor came for a short visit and talked with the citizens of Grand Marais in October. Things are progressing with the breakwall. The money has been earmarked by the federal government and work should start some time this year. We had a cruise ship in the harbor this summer when Lake Superior kicked up her heels.

The township purchased five lots downtown facing the bay for future use. The Pickle Barrel was restored and reopened this past July. The township has started the process to have a new well in operation this year. The township is also looking into the possibility of a sewer system in town. Questionnaires have been sent out asking residents for their input concerning various options and costs. The voters rejected the millage for a new DPW/EMS/Fire Building. This might come up again at a lesser amount with fewer items on the want list. This building is needed badly, material and equipment is spread around town at the present time.

New owners of the "Sportsman" began the process of repairing the facility for reopening in 2006.

Several annual events including the UP 200 Sled Dog Race, Fly-in, Music Fest, Triathlon, Sea Plane Fly-in, July 4th celebration, Kayak symposium and others came off well. A first Flag Retirement Service was held on July 4th. Several local Veterans participated and the ceremony is scheduled to be an annual event. Goodbye 2005, Hello 2006!

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

Go Norwegians!!

One dark night outside a small town in Wisconsin, a fire started inside the local chemical plant and in a blink of an eye it exploded into massive flames. The alarm went out to all the fire departments for miles


You will see some new faces down at North Shore Lodge. We have some exchange students that will be spending the better part of the winter here. Introduce yourself and get to know them

We were surprised to read in the Dec. 1, 2005 gazette that in 1960 up to 3 feet of water flooded the main street in Grand Marais, MI. Who can verify that? I think that it must have been Grand Marais, MN. We lived on main street in Grand Marais, MI from 1950 to 1982 and main street was never flooded.

We remember that storm on 28. 1960. Pulpwood washed ashore in Grand Marais and some was retrieved by local people.

There was a time tho' when there was flooding on Coast Guard Point. Some tourists were staying in Welker's Cabins and were planning to attend the Sunday morning service at the Mennonite Church. When they opened the door to leave, however, water was up to the threshold. It finally receded but later in the day flooded again.

We were told the scientific explanation for this phenomena which we have forgotten. Can anyone enlighten us'

I think what you were trying to remember was a seiche natural, standing wave in the water of a lake, bay etc., caused by changes in atmospheric pressure, seismic disturbances, winds, waves, tides, etc.: it continues after the generating force stops. This happens in Marquette near the old ore dock, you can see the piling in the bay appear and disappear at different times of the year. Editor

This Day in Weather History November 28, 1960 - A severe storm produced waves 20 to 40 feet high on Lake Superior. Duluth, Minnesota was buried under a foot of snow and recorded wind gusts over 70 mph. The northern shore of Lake Superior was flooded and property along the shore was battered. Thousands of cords of pulpwood were washed into the lake and up to 3 feet of water flooded the main street of Grand Marais. Michigan.



Women's Winter Weekend Planned for **Porcupine Mountain** Wilderness State Park

A weekend packed with snow-related activities for women is planned for Feb. 11-12 at the Porcupine Mountains Wilderness State Park in Michigan's western Upper Peninsula. Sponsored by the Department of Natural Resources (Becoming an Outdoors-Woman) (BOW) program, with cooperation from park staff and Friends of the Porkies, the weekend's classes will be designed to acquaint women 18 and older with the delights of cross country, downhill and telemark skiing as well as

"The Porkies is the perfect location for a weekend of fun," said Bob Wild, park interpreter. "We offer a 600-foot vertical drop at our downhill ski area, as well as 42 kilometers of groomed cross country ski trails encircling the alpine ski area, with numerous scenic loops.'

The sessions will begin on Saturday with a brief meeting, followed by cross country ski lessons and gliding time on the groomed trails. After lunch, participants will have their choice of either downhill or telemark skiing lessons for the remainder of the afternoon. That evening, cross country ski on a groomed trail lighted with old-fashioned oil lamps will be offered. Hot chocolate will be waiting at a trailside bonfire. Sunday morning, participants will explore the backwoods of the Porkies on a guided snowshoe hike.

The fee for the program is \$75, which includes two lunches, Saturday evening dinner, snacks, lift tickets and trail passes. Participants will be responsible for lodging in nearby Silver City and breakfasts. Rental equipment will be available for an additional cost.

"Many women are familiar with the (Becoming an Outdoors-Woman) programs offered in Michigan, and this special weekend will focus on winter activities in one of the most beautiful places for snow-related recreation in the Midwest," said Ann Wilson, coordinator of the U.P. BOW programs.

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
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The year 2005 was in my opinion a terrible one. Not only did we have intentional disasters but natural ones also took a terrible toll. The world is still suffering from the tsunami, earthquakes, hurricanes, disease, droughts, fires floods and the inhumanity of man. We in the United States continue to have a government that is more interested in wielding its power than taking care of its own. Although I am a firm believer in "Figures don't lie but liars figure", figures do have validity. I heard the number 35 million people in the United States would go to bed hungry tonight (Christmas Day"). Pretty sad that our government thinks nation building is more important than its feeding and housing its own citizens. The year 2006 promises not much improvement except that due to a continuing loss of support for the nation building of Iraq and for Georgie Boy and his henchmen, and the fact that this is an election year, we will probably see a reduction in forces in Iraq. I don't care what initiates a troop reduction, I am happy to hear that it will probably happen. Too bad politics is the reason for bringing some of our troops home

It is even worse that these troops will be coming home to an ungrateful government that continues to cut promised Veterans benefits. I just received notice that the cost to me of my medications has increased one dollar per 30-day supply of each drug. Doesn't sound like much but it is a 14% increase for something I was promised would be given to me for my service. Were benefits increased 14%? How about pensions? This \$100.00 per year will not break me but it will be hard on a lot of Veterans. Amazing that we heard nothing about it until we heard that it was in effect. The vast majority of the troops coming back from Iraq and other military actions will need help of some kind. Will it be there? No! and those that protest will be labeled unpatriotic by the right and the left will say that they can do nothing about it. Maybe if enough people complain about the mistreatment of Veterans and the fact that this is an election year the incumbents will increase VA funding in order to save their lucrative positions.

There are legitimate arguments for both the support and opposition of the "Patriot Act". I understand the value of tapping into conversations of suspected terrorists and would support it if a court order were required. Any red tape delays could be solved with a proviso allowing the taps before a court order was received and in the very unlikely event (less than 1%) that the tap was denied it must stop, with no repercussions to the agency performing the tap and an appeal could be made in secret to a designated official. The cart blanche that Georgie Boy and company want scares the Hell out of me. I see the "Big Brother" mentality taking center stage for people like Georgie Boy. If our government was trustworthy it would be a different story.

Michigan's government has made some decisions that will further erode any control of utilities. Although the MPSC is in the back pocket of the utilties, there is some hope that they will act responsibly some of the time. I have still had no response to the letters to Granholm, Prussi, Adamini and the MPSC as to how we can go about overturning the authorization for Hiawatha's 20%-40%, depending on how you figure it, rate increase. I suppo people are too busy to respond to us peons. Maybe a letter to the editor of some major newspapers in the UP will get some action. I will find out shortly if the letters are printed.

In an attempt to fix one of the many problems of "Proposal A" the state house has created another monster that could cost local governments property tax income; no one seems quite sure how this will effect property tax income for cities, villages, townships and schools. Without going into a long and boring explanation of the legislation, suffice it to say that the law creates a new tax to replace property tax for some commercial rental property. For further details pull up or write for a copy of House Bills 5096 and 5097. In a typical government move the legislation suggests that commercial property owners file a form by December 31, 2005 in order to qualify: problem is, there is no form in existence. This means that if an individual or commercial entity builds in violation of a zoning ordinance they can pay the \$500.00 fine and remain in violation into perpetuity. 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There Was A Place

Once there was a place that was known as one of the great harbors on the south shore of Lake Superior. It was a fine refuge for all ships that needed protection from the fury of the lake storms as it was deep and well protected. Picture yourself on the bank of this harbor on a bright summer day. You would observe a beautiful expanse of water with a picturesque sand island in the distance. The bay is rimmed with boat docks. You would see fish tugs and trolling boats returning from their trips to the fishing areas on Lake Superior. Also you would observe youngsters fishing for perch from the docks. Sunbathers and swimmers could be seen using the small beach below the bank. If you would stand in the same spot in the winter you would see numerous fish shanties as well as skaters on a cleared off section of the bay. This harbor was a haven for fish. Before areas of the bay were covered with and there was a good growth of water plants for cover and food



Commercial fishermen made good catches of whitefish in the spring and the bay was a fine place for sports fishing with small boats. The bay was fed by a creek and a river. The river connected the harbor to another bay that was also a great recreation area. Cabins located along the river were able to provide boats for fishing in the river and the smaller bay, which held a good population of bass, pike and steelheads. This smaller bay was also the location for a small park that had children's swings and picnic tables. During the 1950's this all began to change as a breakwater protecting the harbor continued to deteriorate. The wind and currents began to bring in the sand that would almost destroy the beautiful harbor that existed at one time. Of course this place is Grand Marais, MI.


The good news is that a new breakwater will be completed in the near future. This will allow for a return to the past with many of the fine features of the earlier bay. Of course it will be on a smaller scale. There will be better protection from storms especially the north-

easters. There will be no need to dredge out the marina area every year. Without this sand build up in the bay there will be more chance for weed growth and better populations of fish. Summer and winter fishing will be much improved. Some fear the bay water will become warm or stagnant but I think this will not happen. With the pier channel providing enough current to circulate the bay water it will be fine. The bay water has always been colder than Lake Superior and I don't think this will change. There will not be the constant flow of

ice in the winter, and this will make the fish shanties more stable and allow the bay to again be used for ice-skating.

Some questions will now have to be addressed. What will happen to the beach to the east of a new breakwater that stretches to Lonesome Point. My belief is that it will become larger and more beautiful. If you have hiked across the Sucker River to the present Lonesome Point you know what I mean. Presently this beach is covered with large driftwood and beautiful beach rocks. It is also a wonderful place for swimming and hiking. This spot can be promoted as one of the finest beach areas along the shores of Lake Superior and it must be pre-served as a public area. We have a national treasure in the lands along the shore west of Grand Marais and now it is important to save this gorgeous beach area to our east. It would be a shame if it were commercialized and privatized. We have saved the harbor, now it is important that we save this beach. Presently there is a maintained road from the School Forest to the Lonesome Point area. It would be nice to have a public trail from this road to East Bay and this beach. Another question- will the new breakwater be able to be accessed by sports fishermen. This could be another outstanding destination for pier fishermen. With the west side of the west pier constantly adding sand a new area will soon be needed. A public road and parking lot could be made near this new breakwater.

The restoration of our beautiful bay is exciting to contemplate and again we will be able to say there still is a great harbor of refuge along the south shore of Lake Superior.

Governor Granholm Declares January Mentoring Month

LANSING - Governor Jennifer M. Granholm declared January Mentoring Month and is calling on people around the state to step forward and mentor children in their community. The Governor' proclamation coincides with the observance of National Mentoring Month in January

"Mentoring transforms the lives of children and adults," Granholm said. "By strengthening our children through mentoring, we are building a stronger future for them, our communities, and our great

As attorney general, Granholm created the "Mentor Michigan Initiative", now led by First Gentleman Daniel G. Mulhern. Mento-Michigan is a statewide effort to raise awareness about the need for mentors and the benefits associated with mentoring. As a result of the Initiative, organizations across the state are coming together to encourage people to mentor a child.

The Governor and First Gentleman mentor children from the Lansing area and are among the 99 percent of mentors who would rec ommend mentoring to others. They believe the experience enriches many more lives than the life of the mentee.

"Mentoring is one of the most rewarding experiences you can have" Mulhern said. "Our experience with mentoring has enriched our family's life as well as the lives of our mentees."

The First Gentleman is urging men, particularly men of color, to step forward to mentor children in Michigan.

Mulhern cited a recent study released by Kahle Research Solutions, Inc. that showed only 33 percent of mentors in Michigan are men. The study also showed that while 36 percent of the mentees are children of color, only 24 percent of the mentors are people of color. This disparity creates a dilemma for mentoring programs trying to match children with mentors from the same ethnic and gender backgrounds.

"Mentoring programs from across the state have expressed the desire to put the 'men' back in mentoring," Mulhern said. "Many programs are not enrolling boys, because there are no male mentors available. This is a missed opportunity for everyone who stands to benefit from mentoring."

Additionally, the Michigan Community Service Commission, chaired by Mulhern, has program information and resources on the Mentor Michigan website to help future mentors find an available mentoring organization in their community.

Historical Society Looks Back on Successful Year

The Grand Marais Historical Society enjoyed a banner year in 2005, highlighted by the success of several large projects. Membership continues to grow (are you a member yet? It's the best deal in town!) and new volunteers were welcomed aboard.

As the year opened, restoration of the Pickle Barrel was in progress, under the direction of Bob Metivier. The Historical Society focused on fundraising. In February, we raised several hundred dollars and spread the word about the Historical Society at the UP 200 Sled Dog Championships. Historic photo reprints from the Historical Society collection were featured and continue to be a popular sales item.

In March, Grand Marais was featured in *Michigan History* magazine in a five-page article with many color photos. If you missed this, copies of the magazine are available from the Historical Society.

Winter drew to a close, and so did the restoration of the Pickle Barrel House. Master gardener Dan Filizetti drew up plans for landscaping the garden area, and on Memorial Day weekend, volunteers began planting the trees and flowerbeds. Chuck Cardinal created a beautiful showcase for the Teenie Weenie collection. Display items came from donations and eBay searches; the red pump in the garden was located in Iowa, the cedar garden furniture came from New York state. The Internet was our friend!

The first Community Yard Sale of the season took place in June, with proceeds benefiting the restoration. We raised over \$1500. A second Yard Sale was held on Labor Day weekend, and another \$1700 was raised. A huge thanks to all who helped!

On July 3, a beautiful sunny day, the Grand Opening ceremony for the new Pickle Barrel House Museum was held on the Greenspace. Over 200 people assembled to mark the occasion, highlighted by a ribbon-cutting ceremony featuring Grand Marais resident Bill LaCombe, who also participated in the original dedication 79 years earlier. Susan Bennett, chair of the Save the Pickle Barrel Committee, and Pat Munger, Historical Society President, entertained guests with a history of the Pickle Barrel. Several hundred folks toured the new museum afterward. The Pickle Barrel House and the Lightkeepers House were busy all summer. Several thousand visitors toured each, and we look forward to another great year in 2006.

In October, the Trudy McDonald Historical Garden was dedicated at the Lightkeepers House. This garden honors longtime Historical Society member Trudy McDonald, who created many of the beautiful plantings around the Lightkeepers House. Trudy and her family attended a tea at the museum, where a special plaque was unveiled. This plaque will be mounted at the Lightkeepers House in the spring.

In the spring of 2005, The Historical Society was awarded a grant from the Michigan Department of History, Arts and Libraries to help in archiving our photo and document collection, and also to renovate the Promenade Through the Past historic walking tour. With the grant money, we purchased a fireproof file and archival sleeves in many different sizes. The photos and documents are being scanned, stored on gold CDs for long-term storage, and placed in archival sleeves to protect them. Some of the photos that the Historical Society owns will be reprinted and offered for sale as an ongoing fundraiser.

Volunteers rebuilt the historic walk planters, and Kay Powers and Sue Allyn revamped the brochure to include several new stops. The Women's Club donated the flowers, and the Promenade Through the Past was completely replaced in August. We hope that this walking/biking tour will become a popular attraction for Grand Marais visitors. Brochures are available around town.

For the first time, we were able to have the Pickle Barrel open for Starry, Starry Night. This, along with sales at the Women's Club Craft Bazaar, added several hundred dollars to the restoration fund. Gabey Whaley and John Leach were the winners of some special Pickle Barrel items. Our thanks to all who participated and helped us make these sales a success!

As 2005 draws to a close, we are proud to say we have reduced our Pickle Barrel mortgage to a few thousand dollars. We are working to finish paying this off, and we're also establishing a maintenance fund to keep the Pickle Barrel in good repair for future generations. Your contributions are welcome as we continue our fundraising efforts!

Looking forward to 2006, you'll find us at the UP 200 in February. Our first Community Yard Sale will be held in June on Splash-In weekend, so please save your usable items to donate! Both of our museums are staffed by volunteers, and new volunteers are welcomed with open arms. Harvesting Is A Helping Hand

Timber harvesting simply is not a high priority among most of Michigan's family forest owners. Some would argue that it is becoming an even lower priority as time passes. Let's look at how we know harvesting is a low priority, and then consider whether that's a road we want to follow.

A huge survey of private forest owners was published in 1994. Yes, that was a long time ago, but the study demonstrated some clear conclusions. Smaller, more recent studies echo similar results.

First, most of Michigan's 335,000 owners ranked timber harvest low among reasons to own forest. Maybe that's because almost half the ownerships were under ten acres? Maybe because many of those small parcels are bought-up through urban splatter?

Second, among the fewer owners with large acreages, timber harvest ranked high among priorities. That means most of Michigan's private forest acreage is owned with a high interest in timber harvest. It seems many reviewers underestimate the potential impact of the "fewest who own the most".

The U.S. Forest Service and other agencies keep track of what is harvested and from which ownership the harvest comes. Among all the ownerships across the upper Lake States, the Michigan family forest category is dead last in terms of timber harvest. That's a bit surprising, as most of the acres are owned by people who rank harvest as a high priority. Could it be that survey responses don't necessarily reflect what people actually do?

Michigan families own nearly half of our 19 million acre forest, so the low level of harvest has a profound impact on forest industry. It also has a profound impact on the ecological integrity of the forest and the lifestyles of everyone. Oftentimes that impact is negative, contrary to ownership objectives. "Natural" is not always desirable. But that's another

Michigan has one of the largest timber "surpluses" in the nation. We grow far more wood volume than we harvest. We have been doing so for decades. We're certainly not running out of forest, trees, or wood volume. So, family forests are not exactly conserving a resource in short

In fact, they are contributing to the shortage of "available" timber by refusing to harvest trees. This places more pressure on public and industrial forest lands. Of course, there are interest groups successfully working to further reduce harvests from public lands. So, public foresters often find themselves between a rock and a hard place. Meanwhile, fiber costs increase and a major Michigan industry declines.

This squeeze has profound economic impacts, especially in our rural areas. Fiber costs in the Lake States are among the highest in the world. This makes doing business all the more difficult for loggers and mills. The American Forest & Paper Association identified fiber costs as the single most important factor in global competitiveness. Losing jobs and industries in these times of austerity, especially in rural areas, is not something we can afford. Yet Michigan mills continue to close. Keep in mind the decline of the industrial infrastructure translates into fewer management choices in the forest. Less management will generate an entire suite of economic, social, and environmental challenges for our children and grandchildren. The massive wildfires in the western states highlight that lesson. Insect and disease epidemics are more likely here in the north, especially from exotic species. But, that too, is another

Only 10-15 percent of family forests employ the services of a professional forester, according to the folks who work in the area of private forest assistance. That percentage is a lot lower than in Wisconsin and

You would think a person with timber, potentially worth tens of thousands of dollars, would seek expert advice. Don't most people seek professional advice when managing other huge assets, such as retirement accounts and investment portfolios? And, what about all the non-timber values? Most forest owners are not foresters or ecologists. Paying for services would be a good investment.

In the absence of professional expertise, it's not too surprising when misunderstandings occur between loggers and forest owners. The majority of loggers are highly-trained, honest, and hard-working business men. Of course, there remains a smaller group of predatory loggers that take advantage of the ignorance of forest owners. The unethical practices of these few loggers increase forest owner reluctance to harvest and generate more than its fair share of bad press.

It's also not too surprising when lack of management leads to forest changes the owner did not intend. Wildlife habitat will change, often unfavorably. I hear this all the time in relation to deer. Beech bark disease and emerald ash borer wreak havoc. Buildings in mature jack pine plains and balsam fir stands are at high fire risk.

There are many, many good reasons to plan for and harvest timber. There aren't many good reasons to maintain private reserves, especially when nature often pushes the forest in unexpected and unpleasant directions. Forest management and timber harvest are part of the solution to a wide range of environmental, social, and economic challenges. They are not part of the problem.
