

AD HOC COMMITTEES DRAFT REPORT

The following are excerpts from the Ad Hoc Committees Report, the full version will be available at the Burt Township Office or the Gazette Office on June 16, 2006

On May 9, 2006 the Burt Township Board unanimously passed the following motion to create a temporary committee, which was later named the Ad Hoc Committee on the Management and Accounting of Township

Establish an ad hoc committee that reports to the Burt Township Board as well as to the community. It's purpose is to look into the payroll tax issue and prepare a written report that will include recommendations for procedural changes to help ensure that this problem does not happen again.

At that meeting, Kay Wampler and Karen Brzys were nominated to be members of the ad hoc committee. We were charged with selecting a third person. George Curtis was asked and agreed to serve on the committee. The board was polled, and a majority approved this selection.

In order to reconstruct what has taken place and develop recommendations for preventing future recurrences, we did the following:

- Examined Oath of Office records to identify seated board members from 2000-present.
- Analyzed existing documentation to compile a spreadsheet chart that lists all relevant information including federal tax payments, filings of quarterly 941 forms, IRS delinquency notices, and penalties and interest
- Reviewed the Michigan Townships Association website for descriptions of required and recommended duties of officials, financial management, and accounting procedures.
- Researched Internal Revenue Service requirements for payments, procedures, and penalties related to payroll
- Examined all bill sheets approved by the Township Board for the years 2001 to the present.
- Examined the audit contract between the Board and the accounting firm of Anderson, Tackman & Company.
- Reviewed the audit reports for the years 2001 through 2005.
- Interviewed the township secretary and all Board members and the auditor who served between 2000 and
- Reviewed resources available to township officials for training and orientation preparatory to carrying out their duties; also the utilization of these resources by various officials

Based on what we learned, we find the following:

- According to the document entitled "Evaluating and Safeguarding Township Expenditures" on the website of the Michigan Township Association, "It is the duty of every member of the township board to have an accurate picture of the township's financial situation and to ensure that all procedures and safeguards are being followed. . . . Any member of the township board should be able to give an accurate picture of the townships fiscal situation. . . . The township board is responsible for establishing and maintaining a system of internal controls to reduce the risk that significant errors or irregularities will occur and go undetected.... auditors are responsible for evaluating the township's financial internal control procedures.
- Burt Township is required to deposit payroll taxes each month into a Federal Reserve Bank. Of the 64 monthly deposit deadlines since December 2000, only 8 were made on time (12.7%) while 56 were made late (88.89%). Six of the late checks were in fact printed on time, but not deposited. For other months, payments were made late using 941 vouchers. Although the IRS did not sanction us for all of these delinquent periods, we still received penalties totaling \$6,891.16. (On page 7 is a chart that will help explain this

<u>Public Comment:</u> Howard Baker commented that an ad hoc committee is normally 5 to 7 people, no conflict or bias, self-policing or no board members to keep people with a vested interest out of it. Closed at 9:06 a.m.

Approval of the Agenda: Motion by Lois Leavenworth, second by James Seibert to approve the agenda as amended. 5 ayes

Current Business: A) Cert Grant Requests: Need Letters of Support for grants from Alger County Regional Foundation: \$500 for emergency evacuation equipment/cots; \$700 for the purchase of a generator, and \$300 for Workshops for the Arts from the "Jean" Fund. Motion by Lois Leavenworth, second by James Seibert to allow Nancy Weston to pursue the grant [for cots] – 5 ayes. Motion by James Seibert, second by Lois Leavenworth to authorize Nancy Weston to apply for the grant [for a portable generator] as presented and to upgrade the equipment out of Township Funds. – 5 ayes. Motion by Lois Leavenworth, Second by Kay Wampler to approve a grant request for the Jean Fund with instructor fees paid through the payroll – 5 ayes. Motion by Lois Leavenworth, Second by James Seibert to send letters of support to Janice Taylor at ACRF to be written by Lois Leavenworth to go through Clerks office to be included in the township records – 5 ayes.

B) Pre-Approve Payments for Monthly Due Dates, including Utilities, Telephone, Federal, State and County Obligations: Motion by Lois Leavenworth, Second by James Seibert to "include but not limited to" [the items listed] authorize the Clerk to pay the bills in accordance with due dates. – 5 ayes

C) Federal and State Payroll Filings: Kay Wampler reported on current status and process instituted to ensure compliance with current Payroll filings/deposits with copies to the Board. Gordon Kniss felt "blindsided by last deal", Lois Leavenworth felt she was "on the outskirts here", and Lee Durrwachter suggested copies of any correspondence to everyone on the board.

D) Ad Hoc Committee – Members – discussion: Karen Brzys, Kay Wampler, and a third to be chosen by Monday, May 15th. Further discussion: Auditor was authorized to meet with the IRS today, Lee Durrwachter cancelled audit date set up by Kay Wampler, Kay Wampler noted that this is not a good time to change plans with filings already past due (for 2005 and 2006), the auditor is working on the payroll filing problems, and it would be better to get everything completed before we consider hiring a new firm. Motion by Kay Wampler, second by Gordon Kniss to allow Lee to call the auditor and to stay on track for June 5th – 5 ayes.

E) Budget Review – nothing at this time – Kay Wampler reported that we still need to finish the payroll issue before we will know what we need to do on the budgets.

1) Motions to be considered: Lee Durrwachter presented the Board with 5 motions to be considered: James Seibert wants to recognize that computer management is not the duty of the Clerk anymore than electrical work is not the duty of the Treasurer and performing those duties without additional pay is a gift to the community. Kay Wampler installed the software on 5/5/06. Lee Durrwachter was to obtain a backup of the data before the software can be initialized. Motion by Kay Wampler, second by Jim Seibert to leave the Fuel System at Lori's until we are ensured the new Fuel Upgrade software is functioning properly, payment up to \$1000 for the software to come out of the Fuel Fund – 5 ayes. Motion by Kay Wampler, second by Jim Seibert to review what is in place regarding Ambulance Billing and Receiving and to revisit it at a later date – 5 ayes.

 Minutes Tabled: Motion by Lois Leavenworth, second by James Seibert to approve the minutes of May 4th as amended – 5 ayes.

3) Revisit Website: James Seibert is concerned that the township has a website and no-one on the board can get into it. Gordon Kniss noted that the person selected to do it opted not to continue to work for the township. Lois Leavenworth wondered who is responsible. No Action was taken on this matter

4) Meeting Dates: Motion by Kay Wampler, second by James Seibert to postpone the Board Meetings scheduled for June 13 to Saturday, June 24th for the Regular Meeting and June 9th for the Special Meeting – 5 ayes.

Adjournment: Motion by Lois Leavenworth and seconded by Kay Wampler to adjourn the meeting at 11:00 a.m.

Treasurer Seibert asked that all candidates be investigated/checked out prior to being submitted to the Board for approval. [Note: Special Meeting for the 26th was cancelled/postponed.]

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





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National Lightning Safety Week June 18 through June 24 Governor Jennifer Granholm has declared June 18 through June 24 as Lightning Safety Awareness Week in

While lightning can be fascinating to watch, it is also extremely dangerous. During the past 30 years, lightning killed an average of 67 people per year in the United States based on documented cases. This is more than the average of 65 deaths per year caused by tornadoes and the average of 16 deaths per year caused by hurricanes. However, because lightning usually claims only one or two victims at a time, and because lightning does not cause the mass destruction left in the wake of tornadoes or hurricanes, lightning generally receives much less attention than the more destructive weather-related killers. While documented lightning injuries in the United States average about 300 per year, undocumented injuries caused by lightning are likely much higher.

Between 1959 and 2004, the state of Michigan ranks 13th among all states in the number of lightning deaths, with 101 people known to be killed by lightning. During that same time period, Michigan ranks second only behind Florida in lightning injuries, with 714 people known to have been injured by a lightning strike in the

Last year in Michigan, fortunately there were no reported lightning related deaths, but there were 5 reported lightning injuries. Total reported damages from lightning amounted to over 2 million dollars

During a thunderstorm, each flash of cloud-to-ground lightning is a potential killer. It's only a question of whether a person is in the path of the lightning discharge. Lightning deaths can be prevented only if people are aware of the dangers and seek shelter in a building or car.

Lightning can strike as much as 10 miles away from the rain area in a thunderstorm, which is about the distance that you are able to hear the thunder from the storm. That is why we stress: IF YOU CAN HEAR THE THUNDER FROM A STORM, YOU ARE CLOSE ENOUGH TO BE STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.

Where organized sports activities are taking place, coaches, umpires, referees, or camp counselors must protect the safety of the participants and viewers by stopping the activities sooner, so that the participants and spec tators can get to a safe place before the lightning threat becomes significant. In May 2000, several children were struck while exiting a soccer field in Northville. Just four months later, one boy was struck and thrown to the ground as children in Warren were rushing off a field during soccer practice.

We encourage everyone to take advantage of Lightning Safety Awareness Week to review their plans and discuss with their children the dangers of lightning. Simply moving indoors when you see lightning or hear thun

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Abu Musab al-Zarqawi finally bit the dust. There is no doubt in my mind that the world is better off without him but is it worth the price? It is pretty obvious that Georgie boy & company have learned from the "Mission Accomplished" blunder; the reaction was one of cautious optimism by almost everyone that I heard make a comment. Although radicals from both sides are predicting either an explosion of terror activities or an end to most of it, the effect is an unknown but will become apparent shortly. If you think the killing of al-Zarqawi is worth the cost to the USA and others, I strongly disagree with you. The death of all the USA service personnel, for that matter even one of them, far outweighs the value of al-Zarqawi demise. Add to that the death of other country's people and tens of thousands of Iraqis and this is a bad investment. Adding the removal of Sadam Insane and other criminals still makes this war a losing proposition. If we add the hundreds of billions of dollars (that could feed, shelter and provide for our destitute) it has cost the American taxpayer we have made the deal ridiculously one sided. Every day more macho supporters of the war when it began are rethinking their position and it now appears that two thirds of Americans believe that the war is going badly and al-Zarqawi's death doesn't seem to increase the administration's popularity, even among his elephant ex-supporters.

It seems as though every time I turn around there is another scandal because of this administrations policy. Now three "prisoners?" have committed suicide at the Guantanamo detention center. There is something wrong when a man who is guilty of thousands of murders, like Sadam, is treated better and given a trial with state financed lawyers but a person who might have some connection with a terrorist or terror organization is held without charge, trial or representative. There are no doubt some criminals held at Guantanamo and other detention centers/jails but there are also no doubt some people who are squeaky clean. We afford our more vicious criminals, murderers, pedophiles, child abusers, rapists etc. much better conditions and rights. I can understand that these detainees become hopeless and hard to deal with. That in turn causes the suicides and the stress on their keepers who become less and less humane to the detainees. I don't criticize the guards for mistreating prisoners, I am sure it is a maddening assignment and I have no idea of what it is like. I do however place blame on our government, especially the warmongers, for employing conditions that we would not accept, and rightfully so, from others for our citizens. Three years ought to be enough time to find out if these prisoners are in fact connected with terrorist groups or not. As long as this continues you can count on more mistreatment and suicides in these places; some might even be our troops. I don't want criminals set free but I also don't want innocents incarcerated with no hope of freedom. We can do better.

I don't think that even Georgie boy and his henchmen are stupid enough to start another war but they have proven me wrong in the past.

One was gas price; it ranged from \$2.999 in Seney and Munising to \$2.869 at some stations in Marquette. There can't be that much difference in cost in that short distance. Of course our government tells us there is no price gouging happening. I wonder what their definition of "price gouging" is. They are de grading our intellect expecting us to believe that these price fluctuations and the fact that oil companies are realizing record profits is completely defensible. The second thing that set off questions concerning the use of common sense by our state gov-ernment was the road work between Munising and Shingleton. It appears that a long passing lane area is under construction. I surely am not opposed to passing lanes but when this road and others are full of pot hole and other deterioration it would seem more intelligent to repair what we have rather than to create more to maintain.

The local issues, IRS filings and assessments are being discussed in a much calmer way than I would have expected. I give a great deal of credit for this to Karen Brzys, George Curtis and Kay Wampler, the Committee. I know there is a lot of discussion going on and incorrect information circulating but there have been many people at the meetings to discuss these problems who are getting the facts. There is much to be decided yet but the work of the Committee has provided us with quite a bit of information to help us to decide what we need to do to resolve these issues. The board meeting on the 24th will spend time on these issues and possibly incorporate a plan for their resolution. I hope that a lot of citizens present their views in a reasonable manner at this meeting or, if they can't make the meeting by communicating with the board before the meeting.

And finally. The trip to Green Bay with the 2nd-6th grade students went well, details are found elsewhere in future papers. My nephew Jake's graduation party was very enjoyable. He did very well in high school and is planning to work toward a profession as a pharmacist. My nephew Jeff and his wife Yulia were also there with their baby twins and Yulia's mother Vera from Russia. All my siblings were there and I had a nice visit with each; damn they are sure getting old. Grannie Annie was there and appears in good health. Being 90 doesn't seem to have affected her much. On my next trip I have to bring my brother-inlaw, Dave, a new deck of cards. The deck we used at his place was the same deck that Adam and Eve used to play cribbage. My three kids, Pug, Poo and Seen had a good time at the party, maybe too good. I understand Sherri had a rather loud designated driver trip to the motel. Boo the grandkids and I left about an hour before Sherri and the kids. We all got up reasonably early and went to the "Golden Corral", a place Mr. Hammer took us to on the school trip. It is a great place to eat; the buffet has just about every thing you could want and one heck of a desert bar Then we headed for Bay Beach Amusement Park, the best kids entertainment value that I have ever seen. 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

AD HOC COMMITTEES DRAFT REPORT



- Documentation for 2001 is not complete and there is no record of the IRS delinquency notices, although we know from discussions with IRS representatives that some were received. After comparing the amount of tax due and the amount of tax paid, there is an additional amount of \$4,931.71. This amount most likely constitutes extra payments to cover penalties and interest charges.
- Four times a year employers must file a 941 form summarizing total tax due and total payments for the quarter. When the form is filed, any amount of tax due must be paid. Of the 17 quarters that had tax due, payments were not made on time in ten quarters (58.8%) resulting in 60,005.19 in penalties. Of the 21 quarters examined since December of 2000, we were late in filing the 941 form 14 times. Fortunately, the IRS is penalizing us for only 7 resulting in 11,965.40 in penalties.
- Each year employers must prepare W-2 statements for employees and file W-2 and W-3 forms with the IRS. Each W-2 statement summarizes the wages, state and federal income taxes withheld, and Social Security and Medicare taxes withheld for each individual employee for the year. The W-3 form totals these figures for all employees, although the IRS has begun their investigation, they will continue only after the payroll tax problem is resolved. Thus far, we have received a penalty of \$146.03. More penalties will be forthcom-
- The IRS charges interest on all delinquent tax payments. Although some of the interest fees are still being computed, as of the present writing, we have paid \$7,736.95 in interest

- inual audit reports clearly identified the payroll tax payment problem in 2001, 2002, and 2003. Also, during the annual audits, meetings were held wherein the auditor verbally identified and described the problem to the entire board.
- Each month the clerk prepares a bill sheet listing expenses that must be paid. The list is reviewed by the board and approved for payment. It includes tax liabilities due to the state and federal governments. The clerk prepares and signs checks for each payment, and delivers them to the treasurer who also signs. The checks then become valid and are distributed to payees. Of the 55 meeting minutes with bill sheets attached, only 14 (25%) had the correct amount of federal tax deposit listed, although for two of these months checks were never printed and paid. The 41 bill sheets that were not correct included:
 - 20 with no listing at all for either federal or state withholding tax payments.
 - 7 with the wrong amount listed for the federal payment, most of which were significantly low
 - 7 with multiple payments on the same bill sheet (note: there should only be one federal and one state payment each month).
 - 6 with only a state payment (federal payment was missing).

* 3 with no payroll payments of any kind (but employees were paid).

As a result of the IRS investigation, the township has had to pay back taxes of over \$50,000 plus penalties and interest of over \$38,000. One payment was made from available fund balances on April 17, 2006 for \$22,648.02. A loan has been secured (5% interest) from the local bank to cover two other payments of \$39,031.94 on May 4^{th} and \$25,000.00 on May 19^{th} . Another payment is due on June 12^{th} for \$5,307. Additional penalties and interest charges are still expected.

Closing Thoughts
In closing, the committee would like to respond to an often asked question: "Where did the money go?" We feel confident that there has not been embezzlement or any other illegal removal of money from the township accounts. The preliminary search of inter-fund transfers shows a shortage of almost \$25,000. Money should have been transferred from the various fund accounts to the payroll account to cover the payroll tax liability. Instead, most of the money stayed in the original accounts and was spent on other things. Additional monies were transferred, but were spent on making delinquent payments to the Michigan Unemployment Agency. A comprehensive reverse budget analysis could be conducted to determine with a high degree of certainty how the money was spent.

When this ad hoc committee began to study the payroll tax issue, we discussed the positive outcomes that could result. Our community's journey to improve township operations begins by bringing the facts to the surface. We have done that. Our research efforts were diligent and the findings are as accurate as the available documentation would allow

It is not possible to solve a problem unless you first acknowledge its existence

Editors Note: This report is open to the public in it entirety, and needs to be read and studied to be understood. Let's take the time to review the information and implement some of the suggestions made by the Committee to make Burt Township a bet-ter place to live. This situation is not finished yet, as more information becomes available hopefully we will be able to learn from the mistakes made and move forward in a positive way.

The final report to the citizens of Burt Township will be available this coming Thursday, June 15th at the township office. If you have any thing to say to the township board remember that the next scheduled meeting will be June 24th at 12:00 (noon) at the Community Center. Please come and let your voice be heard.

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

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

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

Who Love its Backcountry

Pictured Rocks National Lakeshore recently announced a new "Adopt-a-Trail, Adopt-a-Campsite" program, as part of the park's overall Volunteer in Parks (VIP) program.

"As with many other public institutions, we need the assistance of volunteers to complement and supplement the work of our paid professional staff," Park Superintendent Jim Northup explained. "With over 100 miles of trail and 13 designated backcountry campsites, this is just as true in the backcountry as it is in the developed areas of the park."

A half-day orientation and training session for Adopt-a-Trail, Adopt-a-Campsite Volunteers is scheduled for Saturday, June 17, from 9 a.m. to noon. It will be held at the Grand Marais Ranger Station located at E22040 Coast Guard Point Road in Grand Marais

Under this new program, interested individuals or groups who love to hike and camp in the park can adopt a section of trail or a backcountry campsites. Adopt-a-Trail, Adopt-a-Campsite volunteers will be asked to visit their section of trail or campsite once a month from May through Oc tober for light maintenance duties including picking up litter, light brushing, cleaning out water bars, and breaking up illegal fire rings. Over 20 local citizens have already signed on as trail volunteers.

Volunteers will also be asked to fill out a brief one-page summary and to report on any larger issues that need to be followed up or completed by park staff. The park will provide a VIP uniform shirt and ball cap, basic tools and gloves, and written guidelines on the work to be performed

The park's trail network has been sub-divided in 37 sections that are available for "adoption". Adoptable sections range from trails that are easavailable for adoption. Adoptable sections range from trails that are easily accessible and less than a 10th of a mile to one section of the North Country Trail that is 5.3 miles long. "There is something for every ability and level of interest," said Chris Case, the park's Facility Manager. "We are actively seeking individuals who want to assist us as citizen

stewards," Northup said. "We are hopeful there are a number of individuals in our surrounding communities who hike and enjoy the park's trails on a regular basis, and we are asking them to join with us in protecting park resources and contributing to the enjoyment of current and future generations. This is a great way to get outdoors, get some exercise, and be part of conserving America's first national lakeshore.'
