Selecting a qualified person who has the best interest of the township as his/her main objective will be discussed and probably decided. The applicants who submitted letters indicating their desire to be ap-pointed supervisor are (in alphabetic order): Karen Brzys, Bob Gardner, Lois Kinlaw and Mary Underwood. This appointee must be in place soon to comply with the 45 day window. There were no applicants for the Treasures position that will be vacant as of midnight August 31 when the 45 day clock to fill that position will start. Due to no applicants for the Treasurer's position, it has been reposted with a deadline of August 31. The possible restructuring of the board by reducing the supervisors pay and duties and hiring a manager will also be on the agenda. The manager would be responsible for all Supervisor duties except statutorily ones. Also to be discussed are contracts for the Assessor, Township Attorney and Auditor. An update of the ongoing investigation will be presented. Mike Pond of STS will update the Board on the status of Grant Projects and commitnents. The status of the loans to pay off the IRS, a budget update, financial state of the Township and options for dealing with the current financial situation will be presented. Although there may not be enough information available to make decisions on all items, some of them will be voted on and all of them could be. Your attendance and input is important.

Regular Meeting of the Burt Township Board July 11, 2006 – 7:00 p.m.

Attendance: Lee Durrwachter, Kay Wampler, James Seibert, Gordon Kniss, Lois Leavenworth - Citizens: approx 100

Supervisor Lee Durrwachter read his resignation letter, tendered it with the Clerk and promptly exited the building; Motion by Kay Wampler, second by Gordon Kniss to accept the resignation – 4 ayes. Motion by Gordon Kniss, Second by Lois Leavenworth to appoint Kay Wampler, Clerk to moderate the meeting – 3 ayes, 1 abstain.

Approval of the Agenda: The Board proceeded to review the agenda and delete several items added by the Supervisor for which the board had insufficient knowledge, added posting the supervisor position; and offered to hold a special meeting to address the items deleted within the week. Motion by Lois Leavenworth, second by James Seibert to approve the agenda as amended. 4 ayes

Introductions/Comments/Questions and Answers: Jim Isleib, MSU Extension Service announced that the extension has a proposal on the ballot in August and explained the need to the public. No other comments were offered at this time.

Correspondence: Letters Read – Paul & Sue Bennett – offer to purchase recorder and have all township board meetings recorded; Jerry Spencer – Fireworks damages; Otto Bufe requesting any and all information on the har bor project/efforts; Doug Sharp – requesting permission to add signal device class to the GLSKS; Peter Dame – suggesting the zoning be changed to 36 ft rather than 26 ft height for houses on Canal/all of Burt Twp.; Pat Grasser – request investigation of records regarding vacating alley between her two properties.

Reports: Mike Beek – DPW and Water Dept Mgr, & Sheri Shafer – Park Manager all presented their reports to the board – on file in the Clerks office. The Clerk gave a report on the status of the Fuel System program and Web Site. Treasurer Seibert gave a brief explanation as to the reason tax bills say "tentative" and some taxpayers are getting a second bill. Ambudance Crew introduced Aimee Harju to report on the availability of ALS (Advanced Life Support) to intercept our ambulance crew in-route at a cost of \$225 per occurrence and billed to Burt Township Ambulance service which could then be billed on to the patient.

New Business: A) John Underhill - FOIA Request: Attorney John Underhill announced his intent to file a claim against the board on behalf of the taxpayers in relation to the IRS problems. Mr Underhill made a very informative presentation to the community and the board and offered up several options available for resolution. He also offered a list of Motions for consideration to begin action. **Motion** by Gordon Kniss, second by Lois Leavenworth to pass all 9 proposed motions and accept Mr Underhills offer of legal aide on a pro-bono basis – 3 ayes, 1 abstain. The motions are as follows: 1) Direct all officers to, for a period of 6 months, preserve all existing Township records o ANY kind in any way involving Township business; 2) direct all officers to immediately deliver all Township re cords to the Township office that they may have at home; 3) direct all officers to inform the Township Clerk within 24 hours whether they have any records at home that may be on computer so that arrangements can be made imme diately to download/copy any such material to be delivered to the Township office; 4) Direct that an independent accounting by an outside accountant be immediately performed as to all income and disbursements of all money for the past 5 years; 5) Direct the clerk to report at the next meeting as to who may be available as an independent ac countant to perform the accounting so that a decision can be made immediately to hire someone to get it done; (Thi should not be done by the supervisor); 6) Direct the clerk to immediately send letters (I will help, if asked) to put the following insurance companies on notice of the Township claim(s) for the following individual's failure to perform a) the bonding company for the bond for the past clerk, Lori Savage; b) the bonding company for the bond for the ner, James Seibert; c) The township's general liability policy for any "wrongful conduct" coverage available and d) the township's auditing firm who performed the audits for the past 4-5 years. 7) Direct that an investigation immediately be undertaken by the board itself by directing the Township attorney to immediately have subpoenast instructionality of the following people compelling their testimony under oath at a special board meeting to be held within the next 30 days: a) Lori Savage, past clerk; b) James Seibert, the treasurer;; c) Lee Durrwachter, the supervisor; and Lori Hill, the IRS investigator who has records of all past contacts by and between the IRS and Township Officers 89) Accept the treasurer's resignation. 9) Direct the supervisor to explain at the meeting any and all details su rounding the loans recently obtained that constitute an indebtedness to the Township and how it was done without voter approval. B) Petitions: Mr Underhill was prepared to present a petition requesting the supervisor's resignation tion. The petitions were withdrawn. C) Planning Commission Recommendation on Rental Property: Sherri Bates, Zoning Administrator noted that she would like the Zoning Admin's and the Planning Commission to meet before the Board takes any action on this recommendation. Other: Post Supervisor's position: Motion by Lois eavenworth, second by James Seibert to post the position of Supervisor as necessary, immediately - 4 ayes

Unfinished Business: A) Follow-up on Lois Kinlaw FOIA Requests for Insurance & Bond Claims – Lois withdrew her request as long as John Underhill is taking care of it B) Loan Resolutions – Documents are not on file with the clerk – the clerk is requesting copies from the bank. C) Well Resolutions: STS Consultants provided 2 resolutions (1 change order, 1 request for payment) to be voted. – Both resolutions were approved by roll call vote with 4 ayes, 0 nay's. Copies are on file with the Clerk. D) Auditor Letters – the letters are in the hands of John Underhill for review prior to our signing. E) Site Condominium Ordinance Recommendations/ Discussion – Motion by Lois Leavenworth, second by Gordon Kniss to table - 4 ayes.

Appointments/Resignations/Applications – James T. Seibert, Treasurer read his letter of Resignation to be effective August 31, 2006, Motion by Lois Leavenworth, second by Gordon Kniss to accept Jim's resignation with regrets – 3 ayes. Motion by Lois Leavenworth, second by Gordon Kniss to post the position of Temporary Supervisor and Treasurer superseding the previous motion by Leavenworth/Seibert– 3 ayes, 1 abstain We considered hiring John Underhill as Township Attorney, need to check the contract with the current atmeny of record first.

Approve Minutes of Previous Meeting: Motion by Jim Seibert, second by Lois Leavenworth to approve the minutes of June 24/29 meeting as presented – 4 ayes

Acceptance of Treasurer's Report: Clerk accepted Treasurer's Report subject to audit.

Payment of bills: Motion by James Seibert, second by Lois Leavenworth to pay the bills as presented/corrected - 4 aves

Public Comment: Clerk reminded of items set aside during correspondence for action: Motion by Lois Leavenworth, second by James Seibert to add a plaque on the Veteran's Memorial for Keith Nyman and to have the one for Kirkens' corrected, paid out of Township Improvement – 4 ayes. Special Meeting set to hear subpoenas on August 19th at 10:00 a.m. at the Community Center. Lois offered to appoint Gordon Kniss to approach Lee Durtwachter to recover township properties – Gordon agreed. Motion by James Seibert, second by Lois Leavenworth authorizing Kay Wampler and Evelyn Morrison to sign the agreement with Helen Newberry Joy for the ALS program as reviewed by John Underhill – 4 ayes. Some concern over health insurance to employees was brought up – Clerk offered to revisit it and see where we are at a later date.

Adjournment: Motion by Lois Leavenworth and seconded by James Seibert to adjourn the meeting at 9:00 p.m. 4 ayes

Special Meeting of the Burt Township Board July 14, 2006 – 7:00 p.m.

Attendance: Kay Wampler, James Seibert, Gordon Kniss, Lois Leavenworth - Citizens: approx 8

Approval of the Agenda: Motion by Gordon Kniss, second by James Seibert to approve the agenda. 4 ayes

Agenda and Actions Taken: A) Appoint Member of Board as Acting Supervisor- Wampler requested that the board appoint one of its mem bers to serve as Acting Supervisor in light of the upcoming Board of Review on the 18th. Wampler checked the "Authorities and Responsibilities" (little red book) and the law and found no direct reference of success sion in the event the Supervisor resigned ~ Motion by James Seibert, sec-ond by Gordon Kniss to appoint Kay Wampler as the Acting Supervisor -3 ayes, 1 abstain ~ Motion by James Seibert, second by Gordon Kniss to give Kay Wampler full Supervisor pay (in addition to the Clerks salary) til a Supervisor is seated - 3 ayes, 1 abstain. B) Hiring an Assessor and Update on Status with the State Tax Commission (STC): Wampler has spoken with the STC (Kelli Sobel, Executive Secretary and Mike Gillett) the prior/current Assessor, and 2 candidates for the position. Of note, Mike Gillett will be here on Monday, July 17th to review the items being preented to the BOR and has informed Mark Maki to also bein attendance. Mike Gillett will stay to approve any changes as a result of the BOR meeting. STC, Kelli Sobel indicated that she could give us an extra month on the 90 day deadline in light of the recent changes on the board. Mike Foust (candidate for Assessor) has spoken with the STC requesting an extra year in meeting the total reassessment, his proposal is \$15.00 per parcel, \$23,640 for the total reappraisal (over 2 years) includes most expenses for postage, paper, etc... Ongoing assessing is \$18,912 (\$12.00 per parcel), payable monthly at \$1576 beginning in August 2006 including "all mileage, telephone calls and most office supply costs". Jeff Pecotte (candidate for Assessor) was to fax a revised proposal @ \$30.00 per parcel for our re view - never received. Board Members questioned the cost of Mile Fous for travel ~ Motion by Lois Leavenworth, second by James Seibert to hire Mike Foust as assessor in accordance with his proposal - 4 ayes. C) Update on Insurance Claims filed: Wampler reported her findings in re gards to the claims filed by former supervisor Durrwachter ~ two (2) bond claims have been filed ~ one for "Failure to File Taxes" in the amounts of \$15,325.88, \$4,103.45, \$1,676.94 and \$5,517.29 for the years 2002, 2003, 2004, and 2005 respectively ~ one against the Assessor for failing on the 14-Point review by the STC ~ this claim was incomplete. Jim Youngblood of Midwest Claims advised that surety bonds work like a loan, collateral would be secured until any claims against the bonds are re paid. The claim against the assessor also included reference to the auditor to be filed at a later date. At this time, there is no action on the claims, Mr. Youngblood is overseeing them and has placed them on hold until further notice. D) Update on Bank Loans/documents from the Bank: Wampler has secured copies of the loans from the bank, Lee Durrwachter and James Seibert are shown as signers on the loans at a rate of 4.950%, and currently owing \$70,787.17 including interest to date ~ collateral is listed as "Taxing Authority of Burt Township". As these loans were obtained without proper authorization of the Board or the Voters, Wampler asked Seibert to check the CD's the Township holds (not acquired through special millage) with the option of cashing them in to repay the loans as soon as possible in the hope of recovering the money through insurance, claims against the auditor, or other options that are being undertaken by John Underhill. E) Approve change of August 8th Regular Meeting to the 15th due to the Primary Election: Although discussed on the 11th, the Board never entertained a motion to approve the change ~ Motion by Lois Leavenworth, second by Gordon Kniss to approve – 4 ayes. E) Other: Seibert reported that Sandee Sibbald and the All-Nighters collected approximately \$700 in donations to the fireworks, split between the Town-ship and the Chamber, for a total of \$344 each - Seibert asked that a letter of thanks be written to the group. Wampler offered to write the letter.

Public Comment: Discussions over the loans, insurance claims, receipt of the Supervisors records, seating a replacement to the Supervisors position, John Underhill's references, and use of the RLF were fielded. Seibert indicated that the RLF gave the Township a "Grant" to purchase the "Hoffman Property" next to the Marina for \$\$0,000 with no provision for repayment – further he stated that most communities who obtained funds for an RLF from the State no longer have any of it left. Seibert also indicated that the board could sell that parcel and return the funds to the RLF. The board has 45 days from the effective date of the resignation(s) to seat replacements – Wampler has a call into the County Clerk to provide more guidelines and ensure we handle everything properly.

Adjournment: Motion by Lois Leavenworth and seconded by James Seibert to adjourn the meeting at 7:32 p.m. - 4 ayes



A RETURN TO MY HOMETOWN AFTER A RIDE FROM HELL by Lois Riley Leavenworth

I went home to my hometown of New Britain, Ct., for my 60th high school reunion.

This time I chose to go by train instead of driving it alone by car, since I don't fly. I had to head for Ann Arbor to catch the Amtrak bus to Toledo, Ohio, leaving Toledo at 8:00 p.m. Left my car in Curtises' condo garage in Ann Arbor and had dinner with her next door neighbor in the old railroad station downtown. Very fancy, good food, nice ambience. Arrived at Toledo at 10:30 p.m. Waited until 1 :00 a.m. for the train to come roaring in. food aboard for the next leg of my journey to Albany, New York, about 12 hours away. Slept a little and then made my way, via a rolling, 90-mile per hour train, swaying from side to side, to the dining car at 6:30 a.m. Arrived in Albany, three hours late, to catch the next train to Springfield, Massachusetts. That train was waiting on the next track, so we just skipped right over to jump on board. Then once in Springfield, just a short jaunt to Berlin, Ct.,-- my final destination, 23 hours later. Wow!!!

Spent my whole time in New Britain at my son's new house where I had my own room. Oh, what luxury! Rented a car, disappointed it wasn't a red convertible, but a plain new Chevrolet, and proceeded to tour my old haunts

My son, Matthew, took me to a baseball game in New Britain, which is now the home for the farm team for the Minnesota Twins. They are known as the "Rock Cats." Entertainers put on different acts in between innings that were done very well. Very talented group. One man, dressed in an Indian costume, had a long pole attached to his legs and arms with two dummies on the front and back of him. Then everytime he moved, four dummies moved also. He did quite a few different dances to music with perfect rhythm. My other son, Jesse, took me to the musical, "Li'l Abner" performed in an old opera house from the 1800's that was restored many years ago. It's called "The Goodspeed Opera House" and presents musicals every summer from the 30's, 40's, etc. It is situated high on a hill overlooking the Connecticut River.

The reunion itself was OK -- a little dull, as a matter of fact, but good to see some of my dear, old friends. Eight of us sat at the same table and got caught up on the latest doings of all of our individual families. However, we were situated in a side room, instead of the main ballroom. Missed seeing an ex-governor and other celebrities from this class of 602. There were 152 in attendance with 244 deceased listed in our program. When I got to my son's home, at the end of the

evening, my daughter-in-law was reading the program and asked, innocently, why my name did not appear on the program. I explained to her that it just listed the ones who had passed on and I haven't joined that illustrious group as yet. She was a little embarrassed, to say the least.

The return was a little shorter in time. Did not sleep at all. Sat next to a nice Rumanian girl, first time in this country, who had landed in New York the day before, been greeted by a nice family, saw the Statute of Liberty, Empire State Building, and then taken home to a home- cooked meal. Was going to spend the summer in Toledo, Ohio, waiting on tables at a very large restaurant. She is a college student, entering her senior year when she returns to Rumania. Brave girl!

Landed in Ann Arbor about 9:00 a.m.. Called my new, dear friend and she came down to the train station to pick me up. Brought me back to her condo and proceeded to feed me a sumptuous breakfast. We got along like two peas in a pod," even though we had never met before she took me to the station the first time Well back to reality --glad to be home in beautiful Grand Marais

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

It is pretty obvious that I was wrong when I predicted

Landed in Ann Arbor about 9:00 a.m.. Called my new, dear friend and she came down to the train station to pick me up. Brought me back to her condo and proceeded to feed me a sumptuous breakfast. We got along like "two peas in a pod," even though we had never met before she took me to the station the first time Well back to reality --glad to be home in beautiful Grand Marais.





They tied my shoes and pulled on my boots. They held my husband and wiped my tears when he went off to


