#### Park G. Ogden

Park G. Ogden, age 84, of Alger Avenue, Grand Marais, died in the emergency room of Helen Newberry Joy Hospital on Saturday, August 26, 2006 at 11:27 a.m. He was born in Toledo, Ohio on April 5, 1922 to Park and Mary (Donahey) Ogden. Park graduated from high school in Ohio and then attended Ohio State University where he was a member of the R.O.T.C. program. On April 26, 1943, he married Janet Marie Mulligan. Park served in the E.A.M.E. Theater during WWII in the U.S. Army. He was a signalman and he "dragged" wires and radios all over Europe, including the invasion at Normandy. Following the War, he returned to OSU where he earned his Bachelor of Science in Geology Park and his family moved to Louisiana, but summertime was always spent in Grand Marais. 





#### NEW MAP OF LOGGING RAILROADS RECALLS BYGONE ERA IN U.P. HISTORY

MARQUETTE- The important role once played by railroads in the Upper Peninsula's lumbering industry is highlighted by a new map showing the logging lines in four counties which had some of the highest concentrations of such railroads in Michigan.

The map, compiled and drawn by historian James L. Carter of Marquette and Grand Marais, shows the complete routes of 11 logging railroads which operated in .Alger, Luce, Schoolcraft, and Mackinac counties from 1879 to 1965. The 30 by 30-inch map includes historic photos of the railroads, and is accompanied by a booklet giving a brief history of each of the rail lines.

"The area covered by the map is historically significant because it was here that one of the first railroads in the United States built exclusively for hauling logs was located," Carter said. "It also had what was at the time the state's longest logging railroad, and later what was probably the last major railroad trackage in the eastern U. S. built solely to haul logs."



This mixed passenger/freight train of the Manistique Railway heads east out of town along Grand Marais Ave. (opposite the present-day post office) in 1910, not long before it was abandoned. The train left Grand Marais daily at 9:45 a.m. and went to Seney, Germfask, and Curtis, returning to Grand Marais at 5:45 p.m. There were four other logging trains hauling logs to sawmills here each day.

Two of the former railroads, the Manistique Railway and the Blaney Southern Railway, were common carriersthey also hauled passengers and general freight on a regular schedule. The Lake Superior & Ishpeming Railroad, still serving the iron mines in Marquette County, continues to be a common carrier. The others were strictly logging opera-tions that ran at the convenience of the owners They were the Burt & Gamble Railway, Peninsular, Deer Park & Southern Railroad; the Danaher Lumber Co. Railroad, the Buckeye Stave Co. Railroad, the

St. Paul Tie & Post Co. Railroad, the Lake Michigan & Superior Railroad, the Escanaba (Stack) Lumber Co. Railroad, and the Sucker River Railway.

The map covers a broad swath of the U.P. from Deer Park and Grand Marais on Lake Superior south to Blaney Park and U.S. 2, and from Cusino on the Alger-Schoolcraft line east to the Curtis area in western Mackinac County. It also contains insets showing details of trackage within the major communities served, including Grand Marais. Seney, Germfask, and Curtis

including Grand Marais, Seney, Germfask, and Curtis.

#### To the people of Burt Township:

I owe everyone an apology for my behavior lately, especially last Friday, and most of all to Karen [Brzys]. I can only attribute that behavior to the great deal of stress I have been under and the continued frustrations I have felt since the discovery of the problems that are plaguing our community. But, that is no excuse; I did not express my concerns appropriately and I apologize from the depth of my heart and conscience. Karen and I are very different people, with different approaches to situations. I truly think we both have the same end result in mind.

Over the last several months, the township has suffered much turmoil and gone through many changes. Some of those changes have been necessary to overcome the significant issues uncovered when I came into office in April. Some of the changes have been reactions to what is perceived to have happened. There is a lot of suspicion, innuendo, and misinformation flowing freely throughout the community. We don't know the full story of what happened, we may never know, yet we are making substantial changes that may or may not be appropriate. I simply feel we are being premature, without all the information, and without giving due consideration to the long term effects of such actions. I also feel that we, as a board, may be taking advantage of the publics' outrage and feelings of vulnerability before the truth is known. We do not have a report from the auditor, either one of them; we do not know for certain where the money went. We do know that it was mismanaged, most of it was diverted to fund payroll for the youth center, to cover cost overruns for the boardwalk and various other pet projects. Was there any intent to do harm? I really don't believe so

The ongoing investigation has resulted in keeping tension levels high and the community in a state of uproar. Seeing our community at such odds makes me sick. At times, I sincerely regret having brought the entire matter to the public's attention even though I know it was the right and necessary thing to do. Secrecy is never the answer.

Each of us on the board has the right, and certainly the duty, to give our input without fear of repercussion for expressing a different opinion. Our problems can only be resolved through cooperation. To that end, I have talked with George Curtis and he has agreed to participate in mediation between Karen and me, if she agrees, so we can set aside our differences and learn to work together in a more productive way. We have a number of priorities that must be addressed in order to move forward; a reasonable budget, filings that are long overdue, and more that deserve a cooperative effort.




