(b) If the Township attorney is not present at the meeting, the minutes will be forwarded to the Township attorney who will consider the legal appropriateness of any such resolution;

(c) The resolution passed will then be reduced to a separate writing with an object title and assigned a number beginning with the year it is passed, followed by a dash, the number of the resolution in sequence for that year and then be submitted to the next following Burt Township Board meeting for approval;

(d) After approval at the following meeting, the Clerk shall sign and date the resolution and file it in a 'resolution book" in the chronological sequence in which it was passed; and

(e) The "resolution book" will be made available to any member of the general public during normal business hours of the Burt Township Office without requiring a formal request made pursuant to Michigan's Freedom of Information Act. Adopted on motion by Seibert, second by Leavenworth – 4 ayes.

RESOLUTION No. 2006-09

RESOLVED, all records and papers in any way involving Burt Township operations in any respect shall re-main at the Burt Township Offices, the only exception being that the Officers shall be allowed to remove materials for specific work projects they desire to accomplish at their homes after which any such records shall be returned to Burt Township Offices within 48 hours.

This Resolution is not designed to prevent the Burt Township Officers from having copies and/or duplicates of written materials to work on at home for longer periods of time including duplicate computer records. Adopted on motion by Leavenworth, second by Kniss – 4 ayes.

RESOLUTION No. 2006-15

RESOLVED, it is hereby ordered that a special meeting of the Burt Township Electors will be held no sooner than 15 days and no later than 20 days to consider the following issues:

A) Whether Burt Township should seek a loan and/or mortgage on the Smith Brothers beach property located on the south shore of Grand Marais Harbor for \$150,000.00 or in another amount found appropriate, on just and appropriate terms, the proceeds of which may be used:

First, to pay off all unlawful loans made during May and June of 2006, which were used to pay back employment taxes, fines and/or penalties assessed by the IRS, in the approximate amount of \$70,000.00;
Second, to pay the cost of the audit being conducted of the Burt Township financial records for the past ap-

proximately 5 years as well as the normal financial audit of the books and records of Burt Township for fiscal year ending March 31, 2006;

3) Third, to reimburse the Burt Township General Fund for all monies paid for back employment taxes, fines and/or penalties to the IRS arising out of Burt Township's failure to pay employment taxes in a timely fashion (approximately \$25,000.00);

4) Fourth, to pay the expenses associated with the investigative special hearing set for August 19, 2006 (Transcript, filing fees, subpoena costs, etc.); and 5) Fifth, to deposit the remaining loan and/or mortgage proceeds into a new account designated the "Rainy Day Fund" to be distributed only by further resolution of the Burt Township Electors and/or Burt Township Board to apply to the loan and/or mortgage, defray any further expenses connected to Burt Township's failure to pay the employment taxes described above and/or any other payment found appropriate from time

B) Whether the salary currently awarded to the elected Burt Township Supervisor should be reduced, with the supervisor's written consent, in the amount of \$10,000.00 (from \$13,200.00 to \$3,200.00) and the \$10,000.00 savings paid to fund the new Township Manager position.

C) Whether the Burt Township Board, in the future, shall be allowed to indebt the township in any fashion without a lawful resolution duly passed at a meeting of the Burt Township Electors.


2006-19 Was this really necessary to take up the time of the Board Members and the attorney to do something so simple as move the office from the basement to the main floor?







.................. **Management Is A Solution**

In these days of growing environmental awareness, forest manage-ment and the use of wood should be re-visited by many. In terms of securing a plentiful future for our children and grandchildren, forest management is more of a necessity than it is an option. Neither is it something we need to "put up with" to maintain our accustomed lifestyles. Rather, forestry is a viable and exciting solution to many of our environmental challenges.

Frequently, I hear the question about why forest management is necessary. After a bit of clarifying, the focus usually comes down to timber harvesting. And then, most commonly clearcutting. And for many folks, the whole forestry thing is the same as forest removal for land development.

First, land development is not forestry. At best, these "terminal harvests" are sold for wood products, rather than burned or taken to a landfill. However, that is not forestry. That's land development.

More accurately, harvest practices within the context of good forest management do at least two of the three following things. One, harvest generates wood products, which we all use in significant and increasing quantity. Two, harvest helps regenerate the forest, which is the main idea behind clearcutting certain forest types. Three, harvest leaves behind a better quality forest than what was there before the cutting.

On average every day, each person in the United States now uses about 4.5 pounds of wood. That's roughly 675,000 tons of wood per day as our country reaches the 300 million person mark. Without nanagement of this renewable and environmentally sound raw material, forests are at increased risk of degradation. Most people nod their heads in agreement when they see the connection between use and management.

Keep in mind that of all our raw materials, wood is by far the most environmentally friendly. This is especially true when measured against energy use, long-term sustainability, and impacts on natu systems. Metals, concrete, oil, and plastics don't come close to wood. So, it makes far more sense, from the "green" point of view, to use paper cups rather than plastic. The same holds true as the young guy at the grocery store packs your groceries. Harvesting encourages forest regeneration, especially when using

science-based and properly applied forest management. Forests have a wide variety of habitat requirements, as do individual trees speas are filled with variety and can be rather complex. Nevertheless, deca experience have provided keen insight into the workings of forest ecol ogy. Forest management uses that body of knowledge, and a variety of techniques, to create optimum environmental conditions that favor forest regeneration.

Most harvesting goes unnoticed, because the majority of harvest involves partial cutting in forest types where this makes the most sense. These forest types are most common in our landscape and are ly more common as time passes. Most harvest becoming increasing most probably for the visual impact objections are about clearcut and erroneous associations attached to habitat degradation. When done within the context of forest management, cie

the habitat conditions needed to reproduce certain forest types, as aspen, paper birch, and jack pine. Clearcutting may, indeed, be ecologically sound, but all the science in the world can fail to overcome social objections. Unfortunately, visual quality is a particularly poor measure of ecological health and habitat quality. Yet, it is the measure too often forced upon public forest management agencies and adopted by a great number of private forest owners.

Lastly, harvesting should enhance the quality and health of a forest. In forests where partial cutting is more appropriate, the reing stand should he and o

maining trees should have

among the genetically best. The corrupt practice best and leaving the rest" is called high-grading and has little appucation in good forestry. It is also sometimes called "select cutting"

under the guise of making it sound like good forestry. Even clearcutting leaves the next stand in better condition, which might sound odd to many folks. The removal of the parent stand does not spell doom for the forest, although this is an easy conclusion from a purely visual frame of reference. In fact, the sunny and

dry conditions promote regeneration of the same sort of forest. That young forest will be more vigorous and holds a promise for the future that would otherwise be compromised by benign neglect. Forestry involves an in-depth understanding of forest ecology and the wide variety of forest conditions that exist in the land-

scape. Professional foresters have the ability to work with forests and forest owners to meet an equally wide range of interests and de-mands. It's a whole lot more than just cutting down trees.
