TOWNSHIP ASSESSOR RESIGNS

Burt Township Assessor Michael Foust submitted his letter of resignation to the Burt Township Board on October 28, 2006. Citing the current situation to be totally unworkable he found no alternative but to resign. Further details are available to anyone wishing to view his letter to the township board either at the township office or at the Grand Marais Gazette office. Mr. Foust is very forthcoming in his assessment of working conditions with the current members of the board.

His resignation opens up another problem that the township and its citizens will have to face. Mr. Foust had submitted a plan and had it approved by the State of Michigan Department of Treasury to correct the problem that the township has regarding the tax assessment rolls. His departure leaves the township without an assessor to complete Mr. Foust's plan and no assurance that the state will grant the same extension to any other assessor. Mr. Foust has agreed to stay on for ninety days (per his contract) in order to "get as much information that I have gathered into the new database, get as many problems as possible to the December Board of Review for resolution and try to tie up some of the other loose ends. I will also be willing to assist in the transition to a new assessor" (with one proviso). I have worked with Mr. Foust and found him to be very professional. Burt Township has lost a superb assessor who is highly respected by his peers and the State.

According to the last agenda for the Friday, Nov. 3, 7:00 pm special meeting his resignation will be discussed. Hopefully his entire letter will be read and the board will have a plan to replace him and get the state to extend the previous deadline. If not the state will keep the tax/assessment rolls and possibly send a state team to do the reassessment at a sizable cost to the township. Lets get to the meeting this Friday (Nov. 3) and find our just what the Board decides to do.

The continuation of the Electors meeting we have been waiting for will be this Saturday, Nov. 4, at 10:00 p.m. at the Community Center. Remember this is the chance for the electors of the township to express themselves, this is our meeting and we do have the right to be heard.

PROPOSAL 06-4

A PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO PROHIBIT GOVERNMENT FROM TAKING PRIVATE PROPERTY BY EMINENT DOMAIN FOR CERTAIN PRIVATE PURPOSES

The proposed constitutional amendment would:

- Prohibit government from taking private property for transfer to another private individual or business for purposes of economic development or increasing tax revenue.
- Provide that if an individual's principal residence is taken by government for public use, the individual must be paid at least 125% of property's fair market value.
- Require government that takes a private property to demonstrate that the taking is for a public use; if taken to eliminate blight, require a higher standard of proof to demonstrate that the taking of that property is for public use.
- Preserve existing rights of property owners.

PROPOSAL 06-5 A LEGISLATIVE INITIATIVE TO ESTABLISH MANDATORY SCHOOL FUNDING LEVELS

The proposal would:

- Increase current funding by approximately \$565 million and require State to provide annual funding increases equal to the rate of inflation for public school, intermediate school districts community colleges, and higher education (includes state universities and financial aid/grant programs).
- Require State to fund any deficiencies from General Fund.
- Base funding for school districts with a declining enrollment on three-year student enrollment average.
- Reduce and cap retirement fund contribution paid by pubic schools, community colleges and state universities; shift remaining portion to state.
- Reduce funding gap between school districts receiving basic per-pupil foundation allowance and those receiving maximum foundation allowance.



(Munising, Michigan) On the evening of Saturday, October 28, Michigan State Police received a report from two hikers that had discovered a body while hiking in the Trappers Lake backcountry area of Pictured Rocks National Lakeshore. National Park Service rangers were notified and a joint investigation began.

Michigan State Police troopers and National Park Service rangers hiked into the remote site near Trappers Lake where they found a make-shift camp set up approximately 100 yards off the trail. The body of Daniel Lee Guyer, a 42 year old male from Olivet, Michigan, was found near the camp, a victim of an apparent suicide. The death remains under investigation.



Only one was available and stated that he had NOT been notified but would be available for a telephone interview if so desired. Supervisor Brzys requested Neal Beaver's note be read into the record: "Oct. 13-06 - to Burt Twsp Board, Att: Acting Supervisor Karen Bryz; Dear Ms. Bryz: Attached find four (4) applications for Burt Township Manager. I do not recommend we extend the effort to interview any of these applicants and that we continue to support the current Board and Management procedures. Our current Supervisor, Clerk and Treasurer are far better qualified to manage Burt Township than any of the other three applicants all of whom indicate computer knowledge but have no education or experience indicating the ability to lead others or handle a pipe wrench. Respectfully yours, Neal W. Beaver" Clerk Wampler also asked Mr. Beaver how he could indicate that they did not indicate "leadership" skills when one applicant was the Director of Operations for the United States and Canada for a rather large Marketing firm.
Clerk Wampler also read some of the skills noted in the application. Motion by Correll, second by Leavenworth to "nominate" Karen Brzys as Township Mananger - 2 ayes, 1 nay, 1 abstain. To clarify Mr Beaver's note, Clerk Wampler asked him if he felt we needed this position of "Township Manager", he adamantly said "No" despite Ms Brzys attempt to quiet him.

Public Comment: Clerk Wampler read her letter of resignation into the record, "Since April 7th, I have dealt with the ups and downs we have all been experiencing as a community. I have tried to do the right thing at every turn. Now, it seems this administration is interested in their own agendas, not how it impacts us. I am not interested in any agenda, or vendetta against our past public servants. My interests lie in what is best for our community as a whole, over the long run. I have been against this idea of a Township Manager from the first time Otto Bufe and John Underhill mentioned it to me during the summer. I do not believe that our small community needs big city politics and infrastructure. I strongly believe this position should not be held by a seated board member. The legality of it is being looked into by the Attorney General's office, the Auditor General's Office, the State Tax Commission, the Governors office, our State Representatives and Senator. Until a ruling comes down from Lansing, I cannot condone what I believe is wrong, either legally or ethically. I am resigning my position as Clerk, effective 2:00 p.m. tomorrow, October 18, 2006, Signed by Kay L. Wampler" Motion by Brzys, second by Correll to accept with regrets - 2 ayes, 1 nay, 1 abstain. Other comments were heard from Brenda Reeves and Bill Platt.

Adjournment: Motion by Leavenworth, seconded by Wampler to adjourn the meeting at 7:10 p.m. – 4 ayes

GRAND MARAIS -----THE WHOLE POINT OF ALGER COUNTY!

As winter will soon be upon us, the Alger County Road Commission would like to remind you of our policies regarding mailboxes and plowing of snow across roads.

MAILBOXES: Due to plowing operations the snow plow operators' visibility is restricted making it very difficult to see unmarked mailboxes—the Alger County Road Commission requests the cooperation of residents living along county roads to have their mailbox locations marked with a wooden pole approximately 1-1/2" in diameter and of sufficient length that it will extend at least 3' above the mailbox at all times.

The Road Commission will only repair mailboxes that comply with highway regulations and have been properly marked when damaged as a result of being struck by a snowplow unit. If damage is so severe that the existing box is beyond repair, it will be replaced with a metal box, the size and style of which shall be at the discretion of the Road Commission. Unmarked mailboxes that are damaged and those that have been damaged by snow thrown by the plow will not be repaired/replaced.

PLOWING SNOW ACROSS ROADS: The Alger County Road Commission requests the cooperation of residents plowing private driveways not to leave snow, slush or ice on the roadway or plowed shoulders. Plowed snow, slush and ice hardens and can result in damage to the snow removal equipment and is a safety hazard. According to the Michigan Vehicle Code it is illegal to deposit snow, slush or ice on any roadway or highway.


