

Also, order from Macomb County Probate Court postponing the decision on the Conservators for Ed Warren request to July 16 along with the Guardian Ad Litem's recom-mendation to let the contract stand. The program will take several years to go through all the steps required and suggested we get started with updating the Master Plan, to get a Legal Opin-ion from an attorney familiar with Land Issues, and proceed to learn our eligibility. Scott and Jack will form a committee the built device the Master Plan.

New Business: A) Bud & Ryan Caryl – skateboard use – Bud Caryl presented a petition signed by 95 people in the community stating that they "believe it is our duty to provide our youth with a "Skate Park" so they can partake in their skateboarding activities in one centralized area, rather than on the streets where they continue to be a major liability." The further proposed to use one of the current tennis courts for the Skate Park and asked the board to approve that request. Funding for the Skate Park would be earned through fundraising and donations. He also indicated that they would build similar obstacles as were done in the past. Paul & Normalean Bennett (closest residents) opposed the use of the Tennis Court for this project due to the poise they experiment when the fund cancerd users done on Supposed the use of the Tennis Court for this project due to the noise they experienced when this was attempted several years ago. Supervisor Hubbara indicated that this should have been included in the Recreation Plan when it was updated earlier in the year. He furthe noted that the children have been destroying picuic tables and other township property by skateboarding on it showing a lack of respect for the property. He also reported that our insurance company and Risk Management gave us some strict rules that would have to be followed to reduce Township liability. The main issue was that the obstacles had to be com-mercially built, inspected annually and that users would be required to wear appropriate safety gear and adhere to the rules. Mr. Caryl noted the formation of a skate park in Munising and they weren't requiring such strict rules. No decision was made at this time. B) Water Rate Advisory committee recommendations - Supervisor Hubbard and Trustee Wiet ing reported that the rates reported will remain for the Likety Split, Campbell Street Gallery, the Agate Museum, and the Market Place citing the urgent need for upgrades and lack of available funding. Normal can Bennett reported that the Market Place doesn't use that much water. Stu Stuart stated the he feels he should only be charged one residence even though he operates the gallery, one rental apartment and his own private residence in the building. Supervisor Hubbard reiterated he operates the gallery, one rental apartment and his own private residence in the building. Supervisor Hubbard reiterated that the water rates are not based on use but on ready to use/availability. No board action was required, C) Ambulance Fee Increase – Chief Morrison reported that the Auditor recommended increasing our rates for ALS and our loaded mile rate to be in line with prevailing rates. Motion by Leavenworth, second by Wampler to increase the rates as proposed by the Auditor effective immediately – 5 ayes. D) Election Commission (KW, JH, MO) – Appoint Election Inspectors for August 5n Primary – Motion by Hubbard, second by Oglexie to approve Brooks, Dowe, Durrwachter, Hubbard, Leavenworth, Munger, Pine, Powers, Shafer, Smith, and Smith as presented. – 3 ayes, 0 no. The election Chair will choose from those approved. E) Adjusted Mileage Rate - Motion by Wieting, second by Leavenworth to amend the policy sheet to \$0.585 per mile in accordance with the IRS – 5 ayes, 0 nos. Public Comment: Paul Bennett asked about adding steps to two back doors on his house, he was referred to the zoning administrator. Evie Morrison commented about the danger erossing Woodruff Street on Veteran Street going west and asked if we could have the trees trimmed.

Adjournment: Motion by Leavenworth to adjourn the meeting at 9:45 p.m






### **EVELYN MILLER**




Town was a busy place over the holiday. It was nice to see all of the boats at the marina and everyone enoving the harbor.

# 2008 Piping **Plover Report: Grand Marais**

By William G. Davis Three Piping Plover nests have hatched in Grand Marais this summer. There are ten flightless chicks on our beaches Four chicks are near the foot of Cemetery Road between Lonesome Point and the Sucker River mouth. Six chicks on Agate Beach range between

the Harbor Breakwall west to the Boardwalk

You may observe several weirdly dressed people with binoculars and spotting scopes and protective hats and bug nets - they are looking for and looking after these ten chicks. Plover Biologists and volunteers dressed for beach flies, no-see-ums, mosquitoes, and other pesky insects are with the chicks seven days a week until the chicks are able to fly. If you would like to see the piping plover chicks and their adult parents just ask these

people who would be happy to help you and show them to you and answer any questions. The plovers are mobile and wide ranging and won't interfere with your beach activities. Unleashed dogs and ATV's join gulls, ravens, marlins and a variety of other predators as the biggest threats to this endangered spe-

Last year, Grand Marais fledged 10 of 12 chicks hatched from three nests. As of July 6, 08, we still have all ten chicks that hatched this year. Thanks to everyone who helped the biologists and volunteers, especially the beach front property owners who let them watch the birds from their property

In the next few weeks, the chicks will be able to fly and shortly thereafter, they begin their journey to the southern gulf coast with their parents.

  - Don't feed gulls, crows or ravens as it brings these and other predators into proximity of flightless chicks
    - No ATV's or ORV activity on the beach (except for emergencies). Keep dogs on a leash.


