# Grand Marais School Building Has an 80 Year Anniversary

Alumni, former teachers and staff will be having their all school reunion on July 25 and will also be celebrating the 80th anniversary of the school building. The school building opened for students on January 28, 1929. The following article appeared in the Superior Sun school newspaper at that time. "The most unbelievable has happened- the new school building is in operation! Some of the pupils and some of the townspeople are still inclined to rub their eyes and wonder if they are seeing things. For there on a spot where nothing stood five months ago, as completely modern a building as you will find in the length and breath of the land, now houses the Burt Township School. Not only is the building modern in materials it is constructed along lines which meet the recommendations of leading educators and follows the example of a large city school". A Mr. Holmes was the architect and Mr. Gustafson the Contractor, The new school was bonded for a number of years previous to 1929 and raised the taxes for taxpayers 50 cents for each 100 dollars of evaluation. Another quote from the Sun " In years to come the citizens of Grand Marais will look back with a noble feeling of pride to that moment when they decided to build a good school for their children one that could fit them properly for their work in this world. They will never regret this move and will always thank the group of men and women who worked so hard to overcome all obstacles and to obtain a good school for the children of this town."

The writer of the Superior Sun article would be happy to know that the residents of Grand Marais truly did appreciate this wonderful building. Due to their continuous financial support they were able to produce a wonderful education for students. With the help of dedicated administrators, teachers, support staff, school board members and community volunteers the school has had an outstanding 80 year history.

A recent EMS recruitment drive by Michigan's Region 8 (Upper Peninsula) Healthcare Emergency Prepared-ness Network has spurred a great demand for this level of EMS education. Some local EMS and Fire agencies throughout the Upper Peninsula have expressed interest in recruiting new members and may pay a portion of the course fees for eligible candidates. Others may be able to assist with tuition assistance. Boundtree Medical a vendor of emergency medical equipment also has their legacy scholarship program, aimed at promoting the professional status of Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs). This program will award \$50,000 in scholarbips to children of EMTs and Firefighters interested in becoming EMTs, or furthering their certification by becoming Paramedics. The scholarship awards will be available nationwide for those who fit the eligibility criteria and are interested in pursuing a state approved certification program.

The course will begin on September 15, 2009. Classes will be held on Tuesday and Thursday from 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. in the Northern Michigan University, University Center Room 2306 in Marquette and will be available at other Hospitals around the Upper Peninsula via videoconference. The actual availability of classes at local Hospitals will be dependent upon minimum enrollment at each site. There will be two Saturday classes in the program from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Tuition for the program is \$1,000.00 and covers books, uniforms, and required equipment.
