NEW ORLEANS EXPOSITION CLAIMS.

Warrants have already been issued by the treasury department for the paymen of undisputed claims against the World's Exposition, at New Orleans, amounting to \$188,020. Bankers and Business Men of Utah Complain of Obnoxious Treasury Rules.

SALT LAKE, Utah, Aug. 18 .- The Triune says: "Bankers and mining men here omplain of the last order of the treasury regulating the distribution of standard lollars. Heretofore any man could get silver dollars delivered to any point withthe amount, to purchase them, with the assistant treasurer of the United States depository, on which a certificate of deposit is issued, which must be forwarded to the treasurer of the United States, who will, on its arrival, order the dollars to be forwarded from any point he may elect. At the going rates of interest here, \$1,000 is worth 33½ cents a day by the length of time now required to get money here, through roundabout channels and a man who needs money finds it cheaper to pay express charges and receive it at once." express charges and receive it at once.

THE MARTELLO TOWERS.

They Were Built on the Coast of Ireland to Repel a French Invasion.

"Before the martello towers all disappear from the Irish seaboard," writes a correspondent to the Transcript, "the puran anticipated French attack. There are many of them along the English shore, but Ireland was the expected scene of invasion, and was at the time the least protected part of the three kingdoms. As a matter of fact the French fleet did ride in Bantry Bay, and an invasion was always dreaded. Lord Cornwallis was viceroy, and he ordered a series of forts to be built wherever there might be fear of the French landing. It was necessary to select some plan of construction, and it was thought desirable that the same model should be adopted in all cases. It happened that the duke of Richmond had just returned from the Mediterranean, where he had witnessed the bombardment of a little town on the shores of Corsica by a well equipped fleet. These were not the days of rifled cannon. The duke made a note of the diremstance, and when a model had to be adopted suggested the fort which had done such service in the siege of Martella. The town seems now to be forgotten, but the name of it in a corrupted form has, at least, got a foothold in the English language, and may puzzle an entymologist of the future, as, indeed, the towers themselves—if a few should survive the lapse of centuries—may confound the Pickwicks of a coming day."
