The McKinnon brothers, owners in fee of the Nanaimo mine, have seized that property for royalty alleged to be due, but the company will contest the claim, on the ground that the owners are just a little previous. The lessors insist that they are not in default, and that they are still legally entitled to hold the mine. A case for the courts, probably.

ONE more mine—the Manganeese—has "gone over to the majority," i. e., joined the list of idle mines. Its management intended to achieve an output of 20,000 tons of ore this season when work was resumed in the spring, but has concluded to quit after having got out less than one-fifth of that amount. It is a discouraging time for mines of that class, we regret having to say.

The weekly advice by cable from the European bourses say that the dealings in the London markets have been characterized by activity and a tendency toward higher prices. American railroads have been in strong demand, and the advance during the week was continuous. Investors are showing more confidence. In Paris, where there are comparatively few transactions in American securities, business has been quiet, but prices were fairly maintained.

HERE is a breezy disposition on the state of the iron industry, which we clip from that excellent authority on politics and turnip-raising, the Appleton, Wis., Post. "This right to the point, the reader is requested to peruse:

According to reports the iron trade is looking up. There is no special interest to the public. What's wanted is for the industry to get up and walk around the country, and encourage general traffic. Looking up may simply mean that it is flat on its back without the energy to move. If iron once more takes a boom then prosperous times may be expected in all branches of industry.

During the week, Mr. Jones, the Ishpeming assayer, made analyses of several specimens of sugar quartz from the new find on 35, 48-28, selecting pieces in which no gold was visible. From these he obtained gold at the rate of something over \$60 to the ton, which would denote that the least of the vein matter is quite rich enough to give good results in the mill. Of course the actual value of the find can only be determined by future work, but everything thus far disclosed goes to show that it is wonderfully charged with gold.

For the week closing with and including Wednesday, lake shipments of iron ore from the ports of Marquette, Escanaba and St. Ignace footed up a total of 79,889 gross tons, this being 16,626 tons less than the shipments from the ports of this district for the corresponding week of last year.

By arrangement with Mr. C. H. Hall, of the Lake Superior Iron Company, a ton of rock from the new gold find on that company's property will be supplied to Mr. Merritt and the gentlemen associated with him in perfecting an entirely new method of extracting the precious metals, for treatment by their process. Mr. Merritt visited Ishpeming yesterday, to ascertain if Mr. Hall would furnish the rock for an experimental test, and the latter very kindly offered to do so.

We quote from a private letter received at this office from Gov. Swineford, which is dated, Portland, Oregon, Aug. 14th: "This is the day I should have sailed from Port Townsend, but, owing to misinformation given me at Washington, I am 'left,' and at this writing I am uncertain when I will get a steamer—possibly not for two or three weeks."

NEW RESIDENCES.

Description of Two New Dwellings Soon to be Added to the Adornments of Our Beautiful City.

A MINING JOURNAL reporter yesterday had the pleasure of examining the plans of an elegant residence which is soon to be erected in Marquette, and which will add another ornament to the city.

The new residence is to be located on lot No. 6, in Hughlett's addition, on Ridge street, east. It will be a wooden structure, Queen Ann style, and two stories high, besides the basement and garret.

The basement will contain six rooms, with an eight foot ceiling. The different rooms will be fitted up for the steam heater, fuel, general store room, laundry, and other purposes.

On the first floor above the basement there will be four rooms, besides a hall, kitchen and pantry. The parlor will be 13 feet and 6 inches by 27 feet, and will open into the library by an archway.

The second story will contain six bedrooms, six closets, and a commodious bath room, provided with hot and cold water, and marble-top, stationary washstand. The hall on this floor will be 12x22 feet, with an enclosed stairway leading to the garret.

The front of the structure will be provided with a handsome piazza, as well as the side facing the lake. The windows will be large, with top sash of stained and ground glass, the balance to be the best quality of double strength glass.

The general appearance of the structure will be very attractive and striking, and when completed, it is estimated, will cost from six to seven thousand dollars.

The contract for erecting the house has not been let, but the plans now being ready, bids will be received at any time.

Mr. Robson also has just completed plans for a very handsome and commodious story and a half cottage for Marshall French. This is also to be a wooden structure, with stone basement, and will be located on the corner of Michigan and Pine streets.
