THE VERMILION MINES. Capt. A. P. Wood, who has been at Two Harbors since the shipping season opened, superintending the loading of vessels there for the Minnesota Iron Company, was in town yesterday, and furnished the MINING JOURNAL with some information about Minnesota's iron field that will interest our readers.

The quantity forwarded was, as reported in these columns, 225,484 gross tons. This product was obtained from five of the Minnesota Iron Company's six mines at Tower, these being the Tower, Breitung, Stone, Lee and Stuntz. The Ely mine, which promises to prove one of the most valuable of the company's possessions, is now receiving machinery and being opened up.

The Vermilion ore is of superior quality, Capt. Wood assures us, and works well in the furnace, but it is extremely hard, and a very difficult ore to mine for that reason.

Of the mines named, five are in a group, the sixth—the Lee—being about a mile distant from the others. These are the only iron properties having a proved value that are yet known to exist on the Vermilion range, though good indications have been noted at other points there.

A second ore dock is in process of construction at Two Harbors, and will be in readiness for service by the opening of navigation next spring. This dock will have the same capacity as the first built, 47 pockets, and will therefore give the company double the dockage room next season that was at its command this year.

The "Adelphi Advance" will be out as soon as the heading arrives from Chicago. Fatal accidents at Republic, in the mine and outside of it, have been unpleasantly numerous of late. Thomas Thompson, of the Rolling Mill location, will make a helper at Chris Johnson's saloon, next Saturday. Many of the young people from here will attend the carnival at the roller rink in Ishpeming next Monday night. If there were a dozen corners in the city as busy as the one on Gold and Iron streets, it would be a pleasing indication of Negaunee's growth and prosperity. The new Scandinavian Lutheran church on Cyr street, was formally dedicated Sunday. The exercises began at 2:30 and ended at 5 P. M. The clergyman present were Bishop Ransanen, of Chicago, and Reverends Lindell, of Marquette, M. Stolpe, of Ishpeming, C. P. Ellund, of Marquette, M. Frykman, of Republic, and Anderson, of Calumet. The sermon was delivered by the bishop, in Swedish, and was a thoughtful and masterly effort. He was followed by Rev. M. Frykman, of Republic, who spoke briefly in English. The services were closed by Rev. M. Stolpe, of Ishpeming, who made a few remarks in Swedish. The new church, of which our Scandinavian citizens are justly proud, is now consecrated as a house of worship. It has not been built without hard and unceasing work, and the ladies of the sewing society who aided so materially in securing its erection, deserve the lion's share of praise. The church is comfortable, and amply sufficient for the present needs of the congregation. It is feared that it will be very difficult to secure a pastor. Seven Danish ministers were telegraphed to, and strongly urged to be present, and assist in the dedication services, but all were unable to come. The church society is now strong enough to maintain a pastor easily, and it is to be hoped that one can be soon secured. Killed While Intoxicated. Phillip Sheehan, a well disposed and industrious man thirty-eight years of age got on a spree Saturday afternoon. Toward dark he was at the western end of town near Dr. Cyr's drug store, in a beastly state of intoxication, and was last seen alive at six o'clock. At seven, as the miners went to work in No. 7 pit of the Jackson mine, his dead body was found in the skip, at a distance of 150 feet from surface and 50 feet from the bottom as noted in yesterday's MINING JOURNAL. The circumstances plainly showed that he had accidentally tumbled into the mouth of the shaft shortly after six o'clock, and had fallen till stopped by the skip. The body was terribly mangled. Justice Jones held an inquest over the remains Monday afternoon. The verdict was in accordance with the above facts. Sheehan was a widower, and leaves four children, two of whom are in Marquette, and two in L'Anse. He has relatives in Hancock, Ishpeming, and Marquette. He was living at the Cleveland hematite mine, which caused the error in the account of the accident published yesterday morning. For Sale. The new advertisement of G. L. RIEL'S FRIENDS. They are to rally at Ishpeming Friday Night, and Raise Money for his Family. A meeting of L'Union Canadienne Francaise of this city, was held Sunday, at which, after the regular business was disposed of, it was decided to call a meeting of all France Canadian societies in Marquette county for Friday evening Dec. 4th. It is expected that the societies of Marquette, Negaunee, and Champion, will respond to the call by sending to the meeting all members who can be present. It will not be a convention, but a mass meeting of the French residents of the county. Various speakers from the different societies will address the meeting, on the subject of the late rebellion in the Canadian northwest territory, and the execution of the leader, Louis Riel. There has been intense feeling among the French speaking residents of the peninsula, and they have decided to give it vent in this way. At the close of the meeting, a subscription list will be opened, and money raised for the family of the dead leader. The list will be kept open for at least one, and probably two, months in the hands of John Tibor, at Donahoe Bros. store. It is expected to raise quite a large sum of money in the city. At 9:30 Saturday morning, masses for the repose of Riel's soul will be celebrated at St. John's Catholic church. Societe L'Union Canadienne Francaise and the visiting members of the French societies will march in a body to the church. The sympathy everywhere manifested for Riel, among French Canadians has taken a practical form throughout the dominion and this country. A large sum of money will be raised, and the French citizens of Ishpeming and the other cities of the peninsula will contribute liberally. Killed in the Mine. The past week was notable for mining accidents, and three men in Marquette county lost their lives in that way. William Lynch, at Republic, Phillip Sheehan, at the Cleveland hematite, and Richard McGrath at the Mitchell. McGrath was caught by a fall of ground Friday evening, but a serious result was not at first apprehended.
