FUN, FIRE, AND EROLIC.

The Fancy Dress Carnival at the Casino Rink Last Night Proves a Brilliant Success.

A Large Attendance of Skaters and Spectators—Description of a Few of the Costumes—Award of Prizes.

Despite the doubt and misgivings of many, the carnival proved a great success and the experience gained in it will probably lead to further efforts in this direction in the future.

The skaters in costume and spectators began to arrive at an early hour; the sale of tickets indicated that over 400 spectators were present, the skaters in costume being admitted free.

After a short interval, in which general skating was permitted, the floor was cleared and the first grand march of the skaters in costume, led by manager Stevens, took place. The effect produced by the many elegant costumes, as well as the equally fine comic ones, was very beautiful, as the skaters wheeled and circled about in the intricate figures of the march.

After nearly an hour spent in skating, the second grand march, with the burning of colored fires, took place. It didn't take place according to the program by any means, however, as the pesky fires burned too rapidly and in one place set fire to the asphalt floor of the rink, producing a dense and stifling smoke which entirely filled the building. The choking fumes of the burning chemicals were unbearable, and although all windows and doors were at once opened, many were compelled to leave before the close of the carnival. It is very much to be regretted that such was the case, yet, in spite of the unfortunate occurrence, the evening as a whole proved a grand success.

After the atmosphere had cleared somewhat, the committee of award, James Russell, Rev. Dr. Hall, and V. B. Cochran, made its report. Rev. E. G. Cheverton was prevailed upon serving on the committee by the death of a much esteemed member of his church. The committee awarded the dressing costume prize for the most beautiful lady's costume to Miss Ada Mapes, who was elegantly dressed as "Monte Carlo." The prize for the most comical costume worn by a lady was divided between Emma Schwalm and Mae Brooks, who were dressed as chambermaids, armed with brooms and dust pans. The prize for the handsomest gentleman's costume was awarded to E. L. P. Wetmore, whose rich and elegant dress, taken from the court life of the middle ages, was greatly admired by all. D. W. Kaufman captured the prize for the most comical costume, by his great hit as a Broadway dude; the reporter would really like to know where he obtained that six-inch standing collar. Ned Ward and Miss Jennie Rankin took the prize for the best matched couple, by their "Evening Star" costumes. Louis Vierling and W. C. Finney captured the prize for the most comically dressed couple, in the characters of a "Dutchman and his Frau." They wore the regulation wooden shoes, to which small cart wheels had been attached for locomotion. They greeted a storm of laughter whenever they appeared.

The very crowded condition of its columns this morning prevents as full a description of the costumes—of those taking the prizes, and of others which were noticeably fine—as the MINING JOURNAL would be pleased to give. The costumes worn by Miss Mapes, Miss Murray, and Miss Sellwood, of Ishpeming, were very fine. Miss Murray in velvet and gold, as a wasp, with the required head-dress and wings, had one of the most beautiful costumes on the floor. Miss Sellwood had, perhaps, the richest costume worn, it being a Spanish dress. Miss Kate Hopkins and Miss Randolph also had very pretty dresses, though not of the same style as the above.

The costumes worn by Messrs. Bartis, Cross, Stevens and Pohlman were very elegant and attracted much attention. Ross, as George Washington, Christy, as the clown, and Jacobs and Rankin in their patch-work suits were good. Miss Ellen Cowden, as the "MINING JOURNAL," made a hit, her dress and hat being made and trimmed with the paper named. Rosa Smith, as a German girl, Miss Fanny Moore, as the alphabet, and Miss Gregory, as the "tea party," were very good. Tom Treloar and Albert Elstrom, as the darky dude and dudine, closely contended the prize in their "class," with Vierling and Finney. Chan Brown made about the greatest hit of the evening, as the "present amateur photographer; he took very good pictures until his camera was knocked out of time by being turned up on the MINING JOURNAL reporter.

About sixty were present in costume and some of the costumes were laughable in the extreme; the credit for making the most fun for the audience belongs, however, to Brown first, and then to Kaufman and the Dutch peasants with their "canal boats." An impromptu dance closed the carnival, three waltzes being played by the band.

COMMON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

A regular meeting of the common council of the city of Marquette was held in the council rooms on Monday, December 7th, A. D., 1888, Alderman Wetmore presiding.

At roll call these were present Alderman Finlayson, Keyes, Green, Kreig, Morgan, Palmer and Wetmore.

The minutes of meetings held October 5th, October 17th, October 21st, November 20th, November 12th and November 17th were read and on motion approved.

Moved and carried that the grade of Champion street, as established June 6th, 1878, be reconsidered, and that the same be lowered according to profile.

Moved that the viaduct on Champion street be changed to eight by ten feet in width and height, instead of six by eight, but on a vote being taken same was lost.

Moved and carried that Edward Powell's bid of a dollar and fifty cents per linear foot, for constructing sewer from brick sewer on Spring street along Third street to a junction with the Washington street sewer, be accepted when bonds in proper form shall be presented.

Report of street commissioner French was read, and on motion approved.

The bill of M. R. Manhard & Co. was referred to the street committee.

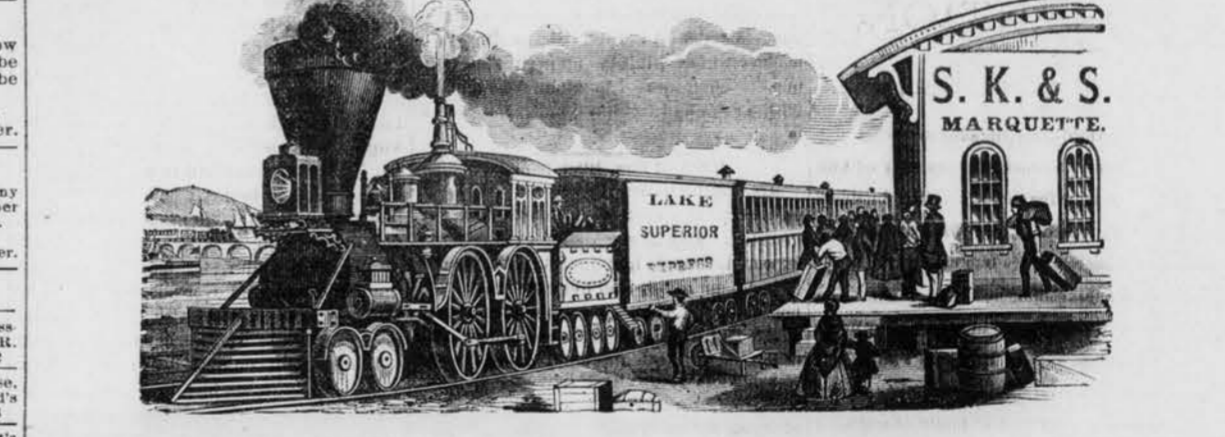
