THE LOWER RANGE. The Menominee Range, of Iron Mountain, has these items of information regarding mining properties in that region in its issue of the 21st, the tenor of which denotes that activity is beginning to reign there in good earnest.

Operations preparatory to starting the Iron Star mine commenced yesterday (Wednesday). Capt. J. Tobin has been looking over the Calcedonia mine, and will probably return in a few days and commence operations.

It is being hoisted at the Shelden and Shafter mine at the rate of 110 to 125 buckets a day, by way of getting ready to work, without any blasting.

The timbering of the Danfs shaft, on the northeast quarter of the northwest quarter 25, 40-31, where explorations are now being conducted, has been completed, and the shaft will be sunk in the ledge about twenty feet and a level driven to the north.

The developments at the Traders exploration on 17 are of a character to give additional encouragement to the promoters of this enterprise. The shaft, which is well timbered, has now reached a depth of between 40 and 50 feet, and is now in one of a fair quality.

The Ludington mine location was first illuminated with electric lights last week Wednesday. The management has put in a plant of 30-amp light power, and at present is running 15 latest improved double carbon Brush arc lamps and 5 incandescent lamps in the office.

Quite a serious breakdown occurred at the hydraulic power works last Saturday afternoon. The machinery had been running at a speed of 20 revolutions per minute, and the pressure becoming too low, the engineer increased it to 27, when the gearing of the middle pair of compressors suddenly gave way, wrecking the pinion, spur wheel, and pillow blocks.
