The school children attended the services at the church in a body, returning afterward to their homes. No funeral sermon was preached, but at the request of Mr. Bates, the dead boy's father, Rev. Richards made some remarks on the dangers of the practice to the indulgence in which their late comrade's death could be charged. Despite the bad condition of the road to the cemetery a long line of sleighs containing sorrowing friends of the family followed the remains to their last resting place. The school in which Sidney had been a pupil was draped in mourning, and in many other ways the people here testified to their remembrance of the unfortunate boy and their sympathy for his stricken parents.

The exhibition will be something new, as it has never before been tried in Michigan. Those who have witnessed Mr. Mennie practicing say that he is quite an expert on the stils. The L. A. & S. band will furnish music, and all are admitted, and skating begins at 8:45.

OF LOCAL INTEREST.

Facts Gathered About Town Yesterday For the Enlightenment of Readers of the Mining Journal.

Fish Stories, Warranted to be True—A Fisher Street School Rumpus Calls in the Law.

A Thriving Business.

The reporter visited Parker & Goodwin, Marquette's largest fishing firm, yesterday in search of information concerning the business done in that line during the past season.

Mr. Goodwin informed the reporter that the past season had been a successful one on the whole, although the dull times had affected the market prices for fish.

For several seasons the firm has fished with the "Rose," a staunch little tug, but she is now advertised on another page as for sale.

The season opened last year in April and closed about a week ago. Daily runs were made during the week, six "gangs" of nets being used, half a gang being raised and half a gang set each day.

But little fishing was done down the lake last season, the nets being set usually from twenty to twenty-five miles above Marquette.

A Case For Judge Grant.

A young ruffian who has already been sent over the road once for a serious offense committed in Marquette, insured a second experience for himself in the same line by raising several distinct varieties of hades at the Fisher street school yesterday.

He then returned and informed the teachers, he remarked that they are all women, that he was ready for the whole lot of them, at the same time drawing a revolver and flourishing the same in true cowboy style.

His character is such that the town would be well rid of him permanently; for sixteen months he served the state for complicity in the raping of a young Indian girl near here about two years ago.

The opening of the carnival will take place February 1st, and the program covers two weeks, culminating every Thursday night in the storming of the castle with fireworks.

First day.—Reception, grand procession and formal opening of the palace.

Second.—Opening of the various toboggan slides and promenade concert.

Third.—Arrival of the ice king, and queen of carnival.

Fourth.—Editorial day, assault upon the ice palace by the fire king and his force.

Fifth.—Fancy skating tournament, parade and carnival masquerade ball.

Sixth.—Parade of Esquimaux dog trains, riding in cutters on the river, concert and exhibition of St. George club, of Winnipeg.

Seventh.—Toboggan contest, polo, snow-shoe race and second entertainment by the Winnipeg club.

Eighth.—Exhibition by Sioux Indians and illumination of the ice palace with colored fires and dissolving lights.

Ninth.—Prize exhibition of Scandinavian skis, trotting races on the river, concert by St. Paul Idealists.

Tenth.—Reception of visiting posts and parade by G. A. R.; storming ice palace by G. A. R.

Eleventh.—Prize snow-shoe contest, grand review of all uniformed clubs, saturnalia at the palace grounds, and illumination of the palace with colored fires.

Twelfth.—Children's day on toboggan slides and skating rink, opera of Pinafore by St. Paul German society.

The business men of St. Paul and Minneapolis have given the carnival liberal support from the first, and there is no lack of means to do whatever will add to the pleasure of visitors or the grandeur of the demonstration.

To illustrate the benefit St. Paul will derive from the enterprise of its citizens it is stated that should no further return for the outlay be reaped than has already accrued to the city, with the carnival yet to be opened, still the money invested would be more than returned; the expenses are way up in the thousands too, to be remembered.

Over one hundred thousand strangers are expected to visit the city during the gaieties of the carnival, and ample accommodations have been provided for them.

The new hotels of the twin cities, the West and the Byron, are among the finest in the world, and in every way the two cities are better able to take care of a vast throng of visitors than is Montreal.

Uniformed toboggan clubs from Duluth, Winnipeg and all the principal cities of the northwest will be present, while a large number of snow-shoe clubs from different parts of Minnesota and adjoining states will also take part in the celebration.

All the railroads leading to St. Paul are offering special rates to those desiring to attend and from present indications the number will exceed even the most sanguine expectations of the originators of the carnival.
