On summing up, we find that the output of iron ore from the mines of the Lake Superior region in 1884 exceeded their product in 1885 by a considerably larger amount than the excess in favor of the former year as it was estimated at the close of navigation last season. and before the full returns were obtainable The total output in 1884, including that of the Vermillion mines in Minuesota, was 2,518,048 gross tons. With the addition of the newly opened Gogebic mines, in 1885 it was but 2,427,437 gross tons, the difference in favor of 1884 being 90,611 tons.

In to-day's number of the MINING JOURNAL is presented a statistical table showing in detail the production of the iron mines of the Lake Superior region, by years, from the inception of the mining of iron ore here up to the close of 1885. The figures have been carefully compiled, and while they may not be absolutely correct, they approximate accuracy very closely-sufficiently so for all practical purposes. We could not vouch for them positively without having an opportunity to verify from the books of the mining companies the reports kindly furnished us, but without having done this, we believe the table to be much more accurate than published statistics ordinarily are.
