With the Romans the Season When the Buds Opened in Marquette it Opens a Budsing Blizzard.

"All Fool's Day" Fast and Present—Origin of the Custom of Tricking People on That Day.

"All Fool's Day." Every fool is supposed to have a birthday, but why the first of April was selected as the day on which to celebrate the appearance in this world of the entire class is something which no man knows.

The custom of playing tricks upon persons, or sending them on bootless errands on a certain day, is of very ancient origin. Some claim that it arose from the sending hither and thither of the Saviour from Annas to Calaphas and from Pilate to Herod during this month because in the Middle Ages this some in Christ's life was made the subject of a miracle play at Easter.

In modern times the custom is found to be almost universal, especially in it observed throughout Europe. In France a person tricked on this day is called un poisson d'Avril, "an April fish"; in Scotland he is a gowk, "cuckoo."

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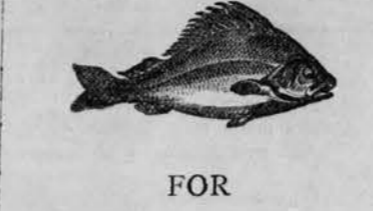
