The republicans voting for Mr. Hale's notion were Messrs. Bowen, Chace, Conger, Hale, Ingalls, Plumb, Sherman, Teller and Van Wyck, and the democrats oting against it were Messrs. Brown, German, Gray and Walthall. With these exceptions the votes for the motion were lemocratic, and the votes against it republican. Mr. Manderson then moved as an amendment his bill heretofore intro-duced and favorably reported from the military committee known as "the three an amendment his bill heretofore intromilitary committee known as "the three batallion bill," and it was agreed to. Mr. Gibson moved to add an additional section repealing section 1,218 of the revised statutes, which now prohibits any person who served the confederate government from appointment to the army of the United States. 




