A CORRESPONDENT of this paper recently mentioned that a "new find" of ore had been made in the Michigan mine. The superintendent writes us, in correction of the report, that no new discovery of ore has been made on the property, and that the statement sent out by the correspondent was wholly without foundation.

THE MORAL SIDE OF IT. There has been no little discussion of the alleged discrimination against the barley produced in Iowa and Kansas by brewers who are said to have instructed their agents not to buy any grain for their use grown in these states.

THE death of ex-Secretary of the Treasury Manning, which occurred Saturday afternoon, was not unexpected by the people of the country, preceding reports of his condition having prepared them for an announcement that would have shocked them greatly otherwise.

IRON ORE AND PIG IRON. The last number of the Cleveland Iron Trade Review gives this report on the state of the market for iron ore and pig iron at that point at closing of business on the 24th.

CONGRESSMAN GUENTHER, of Wisconsin, is going to introduce a bill whose object is government supervision of the operations of pools and trusts, somewhat after the manner of the supervision of railroads effected under the provisions of the interstate railroad bill.

would hardly count for anything against such men as Jay Hubbell, Tim Nester or Joe Steere. And these three are the leading candidates for Moffatt's place, with the chances favoring Steere if he wants it, Nester if he will work for it, or Hubbell, if Nester and Steere will help him.

It will surprise a good many of the republicans of the district to learn that Judge Steere stands so well toward the front among the eligibles. He really has but very little strength, though he would make a good run if nominated and a fair member of congress if elected.

Even if it is true that the Chicago brewers have determined to boycott the prohibition farmers of Iowa and Kansas, the farmers can have no reasonable ground of complaint. A number of prohibitionists have appealed to Senator Stanford not to put any money that is derived from the sale of wine into his new university, and they call on all temperance people to back up the appeal.

It is likely that in spite of any boycott of this kind, brewers will buy where it is the most convenient and cheapest, no matter whether the product is raised by prohibitionists or not. But we cannot conceive of a prohibitionist selling his products to persons who will use them for the manufacture of drinks. In fact, there ought to be a law in Iowa and Kansas to prohibit persons from raising products out of which beverages can be made.

There is not much of interest in the pig iron market, and, while the prospects for business after the first of the year are fairly good, there is but little to note for the past week. Bessemer iron for steel purposes is the lowest factor on the list, just at present, but there is no reason why the demand and prices should not materially improve after the railroads west of the Alleghenies begin to place their orders. The recent intimation of the Bessemer men in Pittsburgh, that the steel works might be compelled to close down, seems to have brought about unforeseen results.

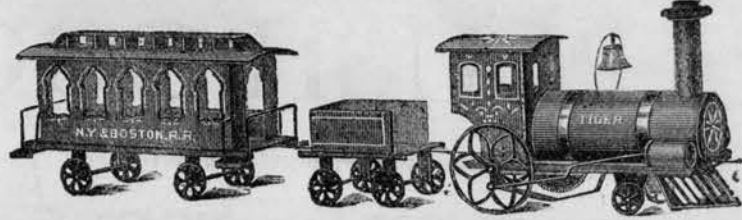

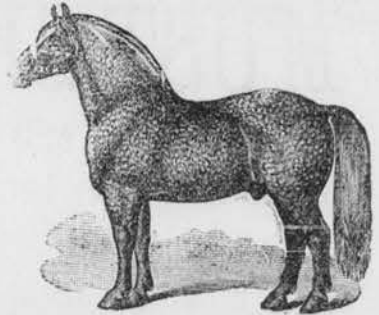

The selections were well rendered in every instance, and some of them were exceedingly difficult as every musician in the audience well understood. The surprise at the splendid playing of the band was well expressed by a gentleman who said to the reporter: "Why, it was a regular entertainment." He was probably one of those who turned out to "help the band along."

A gentleman who has had large experience with band music, who was himself seven years a band master in the English navy, said after the concert last night that Marquette had reason to feel proud of her band. While it was by no means perfect yet every player possessed evident talent and if the members kept at work as they have been doing since coming here the time would surely come and soon at that when they would be without a superior in the state.

Mr. Saunders and the members of the M. C. B. do not intend to let up on the work at all, and have new music to practice right along. They were highly pleased at their success last night, and will "buckle in" harder than ever. At the end of the concert the young people remained to dance, and others kept coming in constantly later in the evening, making the benefit a very substantial one for the band, and no one will say that they have not earned it.

In this connection and at the request of the members of the band it may as well be said that some one has started a false impression in Calumet. The M. C. B. does not want to return to Calumet, nor have its members ever thought of such a thing. Marquette suits them very well, and they suit Marquette. Since Tuesday last they have been engaged just five nights, so are not falling out of practice even in the dull season of the year for such organizations. They're as pleased with Marquette as a boy is with his first pair of red-topped boots, and the chap who tells it otherwise is fooling himself—so the band said last night.

Herriman Again. The ten-mile go-as-you-please race at the Casino Saturday evening between Herriman and Carney, alias "Gulsteau," proved a slight worth seeing, and well satisfied the crowd present. Both men were in good condition, and despite the fact that Carney was tackling a "bad man" he was as full of pluck as if walking against an amateur.

Spectators were stationed at each end of the rink, Herriman starting at one end and Carney at the other. Soon the men came together and contained so for a little while, Herriman dogging his short competitor. Finally he made a spurt past him on the side and by doing some tall sprinting gained a lap. He then resumed his old tactics and so the race went on, Herriman making a lap every mile or so. Carney is full of grit and endurance, while he is a muscular prodigy. Healy returned Saturday from a trip to Detroit and was interviewed by a reporter of the MINING JOURNAL concerning the political situation in this congressional district and concerning the use of his name in various quarters in connection with the vacancy in the house caused by Congressman Moffat's death. Mr. Healy stated positively that he was not a candidate for the position mentioned nor for any other political honor. It was very easy for the MINING JOURNAL to believe this inasmuch as Mr. Healy has just been appointed general counsel for the Duluth, South Shore

& Atlantic Railway company, a position which he formerly held with the Marquette, Houghton & Ontonagon and for which his great legal ability eminently qualifies him. The emoluments of the position are certainly greater than those of the position of representative from this congressional district, if, indeed, the honor is not equally great, and with his large legal practice outside render it impossible for Mr. Healy to accept any such nomination, even if tendered unanimously. When questioned as to his preferences in regard to a candidate Mr. Healy replied that his position as chairman of the republican county committee estopped him from having any.

A Handsome Gift. At a few minutes before 6 Saturday evening Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Deane, of the Hotel Marquette, were summoned to the dining room where they found all the employees of the hotel assembled while the air of mystery was unmistakable. Mr. John Hogan, the popular clerk of the Marquette and who is the oldest employe in the hotel, then stepped forward and addressing Mr. and Mrs. Deane begged leave in the name of the employees of the Hotel Marquette, from the bell-boys up, to present them with a slight token of their esteem, friendship and good will, at the same time throwing back a cloth and revealing the finest mantle clock to be found at Conklin's. Mr. Deane was entirely taken by surprise. He had noticed mysterious conferences during the day, but had been so busy preparing little gifts for each of his employes that the significance of the conference never occurred to him. He was entirely at a loss for words with which to reply suitably to Mr. Hogan's well-chosen presentation speech, but the feeling which he exhibited in receiving the gift was more pleasant to the donors than any speech would have been. The clock is an elegant ornament for any mantle; it is made of silver and bronze, and the oval mirror which stands by the clock with drawn sword has attracted great attention during the holiday season, while occupying the position of honor in Conklin's windows. Mr. Deane has reason to be proud of the gift. It well indicates the popularity which he possesses with his large force of employes.

Failed to Get Through. For the first time within the memory of Mr. Pencillings, the highly esteemed Nestor of this force, the MINING JOURNAL goes to press without a word from its Ishpeming and Negaunee reporters. At times something has prevented the "copy" of one or the other from getting through, but never before have both failed. At this hour it is impossible to decide at the office whether the failure is due this morning to the Christmas demoralization of the reporters themselves or of the railroad men in whose care the copy is usually sent down. Evidently somebody's hat didn't fit him, and that accounts for the walling and gnashing of teeth in which the managing editor played the leading role last evening.

Sunday Night. At midnight, Sunday, Antoine Barbeau died at his home on Rock street aged 67. Mr. Barbeau had been a resident of Marquette for over thirty-two years. For the last ten or fifteen years he had not been engaged in any occupation but lived upon the earnings of previous years. His funeral was to have been held to-day, but has been postponed to allow relations to reach the city. The funeral will take place tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock at the French Catholic church. Moses Berry, deputy sheriff of Powers, a nephew of Mr. Barbeau, is now in the city.

Laid at Rest. Yesterday morning at 10 o'clock the funeral services of the late Frank Herlich were held at St. Peter's cathedral. Rev. Father Coyle officiating. The funeral was the largest ever held in Marquette, the large attendance at the services, and the number in the line which followed the remains to their last resting place showing in what esteem the young man was held by those who had known him from boyhood up. He has been released from suffering, but will be long and sincerely mourned.

On Saturday Last. The funeral of Walter Oscar Krieg, the little two year old son of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Krieg, who died on Friday morning, took place Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the house. Rev. Dr. Hall, rector of St. Paul's, officiated while the music was in charge of Mr. F. C. F. Cramer, also of St. Paul's. Mr. Krieg is an old resident here and has many friends who will sympathize with him in his loss.

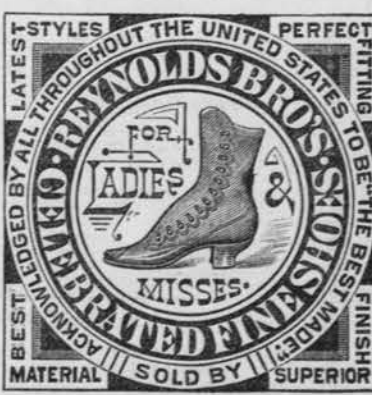
