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A MODEST FUNNY MAN.

A HUMORIST CLIMBED TO AN EMINENT PLACE.

Country Boys Who Have Become Famous in Journalism-Prominent Business Men Who First Saw Daylight in the Rural Districts-A Long List.

Whoever reads about a funny man sus ects fun in what he is reading, but no fun s intended when I say that Nye is modest. He is almost painfully so. He is himself the ast person he ever talks about—the last whom he tries to push along. It was in the minds of most men present on the evening when he was introduced to the guild he has himself distinguished, to regard him as in-teresting because he is an outsider come to New York. Not only that, because he has leaped from Wyoming territory over the heads of so many of us here and into a salary of \$5,000 a year. That is the broad fact about his life. The lesser details are known to few. Born in New England, he went west while young, but, like the typical American, was not so much either an eastern or a west ern man, but that he could strongly identify himself with other sections, as he did with Asheville, N. C. He is a lawyer, but disconnected newspaper work was his main reliance until one day he ceased serious writing, discovered his own humorous vein, founded a paper in Laramie City, Wy, T., named it The Boomerang, after a mule that he owned, and saw it fail for lack of subscribers, while every newspaper office in the country prized it and riddled it with shears. Then he had an offer of the position ne now occupies, and his success excites re mark among his co-laborers because, as they say, "he is a country boy who has climbed to ence over the shoulders of the New Yorkers."

Was there ever such nousense unnunished The very men who have made this remark o me are countrymen born and reared. In that room, listening to Nye, there was only ne born New Yorker-himself a curiosity in the profession on that account. In the little circle that Nye joined on that night are the managing editors of six daily newspapers, and not one of them is a New Yorker. There were leader writers, critics, city editors and reporters, and only one a New Yorker. Was here ever such a thing heard of? New York instructed, entertained, advised and inormed by countrymen manning every one

f its newspapers. And pray tell me in what walk of life in Gotham would Bill Nye be any more of an exception to the rule than he is in journal-sim? Wall street, ruled by Gould, who came with a headful of hayseed grown up the Hudson; or S. V. White, who is as country looking today as the obelisk in the park, and who hails from a farm; or Cyrus W. Field, of the little hamlet of Stockbridge, Mass. Would Bill Nye have broken the rule had he come here to practice law with Roscoe Conking, of Utica, who was a rank provincial in dress, habits and manners when he started anew at middle age in this city a few years ago, with Joseph G. Choate, who was a coun-try boy with Elihu Root, who hails from the Adirondack region, or William F. Howe, the English immigrant, or ninety-nine in a hundred other lawyers? Would Edgar Wilson Nye be a rarity if he had come here a clergyman with North of Ireland John Hall, Western Dr. Collyer, and all the others, among whom only two that I know of are city men? Here and there you will find in the roll of city doctors the born New York son of a dead and gone New Yorker, inherit-ing the father's business, but the leading docors and the mass of doctors are off the farms of the country. And pray where is it not the same, from our country born mayor to the last figurante in the last line of girls in

Rice's Burlesque company?
Our best policeman, Alex Williams, is a Nova Scotian; our pet and pride. Chauncey itchell Depewran barefooted over the rock of Westchester as a boy; our Harry Hill was a country bumpkin in England once; our Morosini, whom the boys irreverently call "the macaroni millionaire," was a country boy in Italy, and Russell Sage would not get over being "country" or swapping horses or wearing boots if he lived a thousand years. Erastus Wiman was born in Toronto, so that he is not a countryman, but neither is he a New Yorker. It is the same in the art world. The only New York born artist that I know of is Charles J. Taylor, of Puck. In politics there are several New Yorkers, though they form only a drop in the bucketful of country-men who rule this town.

But to turn the subject and view it from the other side, let us see whether any New Yorkers occur to the mind as having a fame softicient to the mind as having a fame sufficient to rank them in importance with the country boys who are forever pouring into town and shouldering every one before them and out of their way? Yes, there is Theodore Roosevelt and Henry Bergh and Berry Wall, the ex-monarch of dudedom; and William Waldorf Astor, and William Waldorf Astor, and, I think, Judge Hilton, the heir of A. T. Stewart, and James Gordon Bennett, Tony Pastor Pierre Lorill Pastor, Pierre Lorillard and Edward Harri-gan. Of those who were born here and are quite famous in town there are many of the beirs of old established business houses, among which Mr. Bennett and Mr. Lorillard belong, as do the Appletons and Harpers; but though their establishments are famous abroad in the land the individuals are mainly unknown outside the city. If you include the Knickerbockers and other landed families of long established residence here you will add possibly 2,000 men, women and children to the list, though not all the Knicker-bockers (by which is meant descendants of the Dutch) are city folks. Every one of the Vanderbilts of the first, second and third generations, dating forward from the old commodore, was born a countryman and farmer's son.—Julian Ralph's New York





THE CANALS OF MARS.

WHAT ASTRONOMER SCHIAPARELLI SAW THROUGH HIS TELESCOPE.

He Noted-Is Mars Inhabited?-Facts Which Seem to Call for an Affirma

It was in 1877 during a favorable conjune tion of Mars—that is to say, at the time when Mars was unusually near to the earth—that Schiaparelli first saw the canals. It will be recollected that in that same year Professor Hall discovered the two tiny moons of Mars with the great telescope at Washington instrument in comparison with which Schia-parelli's telescope is a pigmy, and yet, so far as we are aware, the canals were never seen with the Washington telescope. This fact, however, is by no means decisive, for in the first place Schiaparelli's telescope, though comparatively small, is of acknowledged great excellence; secondly, and more impor-tant, the skies of Milan are incomparably clearer and better suited to delicate telescopic observation than those of Washington; and lastly, Schiaparelli, who possesses exception-ally sharp vision, like the celebrated Dawes, of England, was engaged in the special study of the features of Mars' surface when he made the discovery. It may be added that last year three observers—M. Perrotin and M. Pollon, at Nice, and Mr. Denning, in Eng--succeeded in seeing the canals of Schiaparelli, and detecting some of the exceptional appearances which he noted. When Schiaparelli first saw the canals in 1877 they appeared as single lines, but subsequently he found them double. He even watched the process of doubling, which was a very curious phenomenon. But we will let him speak

or himself, as quoted by M. Flammarion:
"There are upon that planet great dark lines, traversing the continents, to which may be given the name of canals, although we do not yet know what they are. Various astronomers have already detected several of them, notably Dawes in 1864. During the last three oppositions I have made a special study of them and have recognized a considerable number, more than sixty. These lines run from one to another of the dark spots fined network over the light or continental regions. Their position appears to be inva-riable and permanent, at least according to the judgment I have been able to form by four and a half years of observation; nevertheless their aspect and their degree of visi-bility are not always the same, and depend upon circumstances which the present state of our knowledge does not yet permit us to discuss with certainty. In 1879 many were seen which were not visible in 1887, and in 1882 those that had already been seen were less those that had already been seen were detected again, accompanied by new ones. Several of these canals present themselves under the form of vague, shadowy lines, while others are clear and sharp, like a mark made by a pen. In general they are rectilinear, that is to say, drawn upon the sphere as lines of great circles. They cross one another obliquely, or at right angles. They are fully two degrees broad, or 120 kilometers, and a number extend over a distance of eighty and a number extend over a distance of eighty degrees or 4,800 kilometers.

These Shoes are just of Mars, but a trifle lighter. Every canal ends at its two extremities in a sea or in another canal; there is not a single example of one extremity ending in the middle of the solid land. That is not all. In certain sea-"This phenomenon appears to occur at a

fixed time, and is produced simultaneously over the whole extent of the continents of the planet. No indication of it was shown in 1877 during the weeks which preceded and followed the southern solstice of the world. On this same date, the 11th of January, another doubling manifested itself, that of the middle section of the Cyclops canal, on the side of the Elysee.

"Greater yet was my astonishment when, the 19th of January, I saw the canal of Jamuna, which was then in the center of the disk, divided very accurately into two straight, parallel lines traversing the space which separates the Niliaque lake from the Gulf of Aurora. At first I thought it to be an illusion, caused by fatigue to the eye and a sort of strabismus of a new kind but one a sort of strabismus of a new kind, but one must needs yield to the evidence. After the 19th of January I simply passed from one surprise to another: in succession the Orontes, the Euphrates, the Phison, the Ganges and more of the other canals showed themselves very clearly and incontestably split in two. There were not less than twenty examples of doubling.

"In certain cases it has been possible to ob serve some precursory symptoms which are not lacking in interest. Thus the 13th of January a light and ill defined shade extended along the Ganges; the 18th and 19th only a series of white spots was distinguishable there; the 20th the Ganges showed itself in the form of two indecisive parallel lines, and the 21st the doubling was perfectly clear, as I observed it up to the 23d of February. "These doublings are not an optical effect epending upon the increase of visual power, as happens in the observation of double stars, and neither is it the canal which divides itself in two lengthwise. Notice what it is that

appears: to the right or left of a pre-cristing line, without any change in the cours or position of that line, one sees another line produced equal and parallel to the first, at a distance varying generally from 6 to 12 degs. that is to say, from 350 to 700 kilometers there even seem to be some produced still nearer, but the telescope is not powerful enough to enable one to distinguish then with certainty. Their tint is a rather dark reddish brown. These twin canals are rectilinear or very slightly curved. There is nothing analogous in terrestrial geography. Everything points to the belief that it is a peculiar periodical phenomenon of the planet Mars, and intimately related to the course of

"Here, then, are observed facts; the in-crease in the distance of the planet and the prevalence of rains prevented the continua-tion of the observations after the end of February. It is difficult to decide quickly upon the nature of that geography, assuredly very different from that of our world."—New York Sun.
