> INTERNAL REVENUE TAXES as well as by a full revision of the tariff, as promised the people by the democratic convention of 1884. The reduction provided for, in his bills, aggregated \$77,000, 000 on internal taxes. These taxes had always been the last to be levled and the first to be repealed when they were no onger necessary. The democratic convention of 1884 declared that the internal revenue tax was a war tax, and this declaration, taken in connection with the other declarations of the platform, clearly established the fact that the opinion of the convention was that some of the internal revenue taxes should first go and they should all go whenever a sufficient sum was realized from the custom house taxes to meet the expenses of the government economically administered. All are very handsomely finished in natural pine, with maple floors. The two main stairways are well arranged and are of oak. are 131 feet high. The high school takes up the entire front half of the second floor, the highschool room being 53x30 feet in size with a recitation room at each side 174x234 each having a fireplace and marble man tel. In the high-school room the seats all face the teacher's platform at the west end, while in the wing on the south side is the piano, making it a beautiful room. There are also two school rooms on this floor, 26x30 feet in size each, another 28x33 feet 8 inches and a fourth 30x33 feet 8 inches, making eleven school rooms and two recitation rooms in the building. Each room has two entrances, one through the wardrobe belonging to the room and having its numbered hooks, and pockets for rubbers and overshoes numbered to correspond. 





Description of the Elegant New School Which the Pupils and Teachers Will Occupy Monday

northern Michigan, and whose reputation is not confined to the Lake Superior region alone. It is 152x88 feet in ground dimensions, with the deck of the roof about 55 feet above grade. The material used was brick, with Portage Entry sandstone trimmings, slate roof with a tin roof for the deck, surrounded by fine iron cresting, while a light bell tower adds to the beauty and symmetry of the building architecturally

fine external appearance that the building attracts the most attention and praise The interior arrangement and finish is admirable, the stately edifice being so perfectly adapted to the use for which it was designed that every experienced teacher who visits it is struck with admiration at once. Mr. Sweatt has been singularly successful in this regard, and also in the perfect ventilation furnished. He himself declares that it is one of the best buildings he ever planned, and states that late Capt. Eddy, of Ishpeming, the suggestions made by Professor Davis, the superintendent of schools, were of great value to him. There are two main entrances, one for boys, the other for girls. Each has a double vestibule, floored with tile, and from each steps lead down to the large play-rooms in the basement of which there are two on each side. The furnace room is in the center of the basement and contains two Haxtun boilers, There are also two large coal rooms and

of heavy stone. On the first floor there are four school rooms, each 26x30 feet in size in the central part of the building, one 24x33 at the west end and another 21x26 at the east end, where is also the superintendent's office, $11x19\frac{1}{2}$, and the supply room. All are very handsomely finished in natural pine, with maple floors. The two main stairways are well arranged and are of oak. The rooms on this floor and that above are 131 feet high. The very finest kind of desks, etc., are all of the latest and most approved styles and make.

The high school takes up the entire front half of the second floor, the highschool room being 53x30 feet in size with a recitation room at each side 171x231 each having a fireplace and marble man tel. In the high-school room the seats all face the teacher's platform at the west end, while in the wing on the south side is the piano, making it a beautiful room. There are also two school rooms on this floor, 26x30 feet in size each, another 28x33 feet 8 inches and a fourth 30x33 feet 8 inches, making eleven school rooms and two recitation rooms in the building. Each room has two entrances, one through the wardrobe belonging to the room and having its numbered books, and pockets for rubbers and overshoes numbered to correspond. These wardrobes are shut off by half partitions, leaving the large halls of the building splendidly lighted. In fact the perfect manner in which the lighting is arranged is one of the features of the building, every school room having an abundance of light and no cross lights. Mr. Sweatt paid especial attention to the ventilation of the building, and his success has been marked, the ventilating arrangements providing for an abundant supply of pure air at all times. There are twelve ventilating flues extending from the basement to the roof, six 12x16 inches in size and six 8x16 inches. In addition to these flues there are a number of cold air intakes, so arranged as to take in the cold air and carry it up through the walls to each floor, the air entering the rooms through spaces provided in the base boards about the walls. The halls and rooms all have fine gas fixtures, while water is provided in all the halls.

Wahlman & Grip, of Ishpeming, were the general contractors on the building and have made a fine job of it. They sublet the brick work to Joseph Donahoe. The painting and interior oil finish is the work of Woolner & Elliott, of this city, and a finer job was never done on the peninsula in any public building, while probably only four or five residences on the peninsula will show a finer finish on the woodwork. Both are Negaunee boys. Mr. Sweatt should certainly be satisfied with those who worked out his plans. From the general contractors to the subcontractors, all did their work well.
