THE 27TH MICHIGAN INFANTRY.

Historical Account of Its Enrollment, Organization and Service During the War.

BY ONE OF ITS MEMBERS.

(Continued.)

On the 8th of July the regiment again took the front pits, moving into that portion of the line known as the "horse shoe," immediately in front of the rebel fort which was afterwards blown up. The duty performed here was hard on the men, obliging them to lie so close in their pits that they became terribly cramped and uncomfortable.

"WHISTLING MIKE." While here an episode occurred worth recording. In Co. A was a wild Irishman named Shuckero, generally known as "whistling Mike," from his abilities in that line. Mike was "a source of sorrow and a grief forever" to his officers.

PEEBLE FARM. For several weeks. During this time a large amount of ground was cleared off, and the new men were given a good deal of drilling. Many of the old fellows who had been away sick and wounded, principally wounded, returned, and the regiment commenced to show some proportions again.

At 4:30 A. M. July 30th, the fort directly in front of the "horse shoe," was blown up. The explosion was terrific. Thousands of shrapnel things were blown into the air in clouds of flame, smoke and dust.

THE MEDICAL STAFF. backed up by the sanitary and Christian commissions, did noble service, and to this cause may be ascribed the fact that so many severely wounded not only lived, but were enabled to return to duty in so short a time.

THE WELDON RAILROAD FIGHT. On the night of the 14th the troops retired and lay in reserve, resting up until the 19th, when, in accordance with orders received the night before, the regiment, under command of Captain D. G. Cash, accompanied its division several miles to the left, formed line of battle and charged the enemy, driving him back a distance of a mile and a half.

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gaged again, pushing the enemy so hard that he suddenly abandoned his enterprise, and the Weldon railroad was forever lost to the southern cause.

UNDER COMMAND OF A LIEUTENANT. The regimental loss had been so great by this time that its number had been reduced to 178, all told, and for convenience it was consolidated into five companies. For a time a first lieutenant was the ranking officer of the regiment, and actually had command.

POPULAR GROVE CHURCH. losing 11 wounded, one of whom, Lieut. Meade, died a few days afterward. Nearly all the month of October was spent in fortifying, picketing, etc.

THE SOUTH SIDE RAILROAD. At 3 A. M. October 27th, the regiment took part in the movement made by the 2nd, 5th, and 9th corps, swinging the left wing of the union army across the South Side railroad.

While the fighting was not so severe as it had been before, the position was very unpleasant, owing to the weather, the scarcity and poor quality of the food and exposure.

TAKE NOTICE.

To the Voters of Marquette City.

That by the act of the legislature of Michigan of 1889, granting power to the city of Marquette to purchase a water power and machinery for electric lighting and electric energy, it was provided in the said act, that the common council of the said city, should not be authorized to borrow for that purpose more than twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) by the issuing of bonds of the said city, unless the borrowing of a larger amount should be sanctioned by the vote of the people of the city, thus limiting the right to borrow by bonds to the amount of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for the purpose of such electric improvement, so far as this special act is concerned, without the sanction of the voters.

This is to notify all concerned, that by an ordinance of the city council it was provided, that at the coming spring election, to be held upon the 7th day of April next, there be submitted to the voters of this city, the question whether the common council of the said city, should be authorized to issue the bonds of this city for the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) in excess of the said twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) previously authorized by the act of the legislature and now issued without such vote, and you are hereby notified that at such election this matter will be submitted to the voters.

You are also further notified that the ordinance provides that the voters shall be notified of the object and the purpose of granting such authority to the council to raise the additional thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) of bonds, in excess of the said twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), by the further extension of the lighting plant or for furnishing other electric energy, and to such an extent as, in the judgment of the council, shall be for the interest of the city, but not in excess of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000).

You are hereby notified that the granting of this right, by the vote of the people, does not, of necessity, require the issuing of thirty thousand dollars of bonds, or any amount of bonds, beyond what shall be necessary, in the judgment of the council. If the council shall consider that no further extension or improvement in the electric plant is necessary or advisable, the power given to the council by the vote of the people, will not in any manner direct it to be done, but simply leave it in the discretion of the council to issue bonds or not, as in its best judgment is for the city's interest.

**DOWNER HAS CONFESSED.**

He Tells Marshal Cunningham the Story of the Murderous Assault Upon Thomas Lee.

**OPERA HOUSE COMPANY ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION FILED.**

Last Chance For Public-Spirited Men to Take Stock in a Paying Enterprise - General City News.

**Downer Confesses His Crime.**  
 Marshal Cunningham, of Negaunee, brought Anthony Downer and his wife, charged with the murder of Thomas Lee, to Marquette jail last night. The marshal was seen by a MINING JOURNAL reporter and confirmed the statement to be found on the Negaunee column, that the Downer woman had confessed her husband's guilt. He then said:

"We have more evidence than that of Downer's guilt. He himself has confessed the whole transaction. He made this confession to me at the Negaunee depot while we were waiting for the train and in the presence of witnesses. The whole affair is cleared up. The woman made a partial confession and with this we managed to call Downer to time. He admits that Lee and Stevens came around to the house, that he had a quarrel with them and a fight and that he struck Lee on the head with a club, felling him in the snow. He then went back into the house, climbed out through the sky-light and went for an officer, who found Lee in the snow as already described in the MINING JOURNAL."  
 Downer's confession to Marshal Cunningham probably settles the Lee case. The outcome of the affair now depends on whether Lee recovers or not. Downer will probably plead self-defense.

**Opera House Articles Filed.**  
 The articles of incorporation of the Marquette Opera House company were forwarded yesterday to the secretary of state at Lansing. As soon as they are returned the first installment of one dollar per share will be due from the subscribers and as soon as possible ground will be broken for the foundations. Marquette is to have her opera house at last.

The company is incorporated under an act passed by the last legislature whereby it obtains somewhat greater powers than are allowed to an ordinary building and loan association. The stock will be placed in the hands of a trustee until all the installments are paid in when the certificates will be delivered to the subscribers. Nearly the whole of the \$75,000 capital stock has been subscribed, including the pledges of certain gentlemen now absent from the city, but who have promised to take a certain number of shares. There are still a few shares left, however, and those business men of Marquette who have not yet come to the front now have an opportunity to come in out of the wet. If they miss this last opportunity they will lose the chance of an investment certain to return a fair profit and fail to do a thing public-spirited, enterprising and creditable to themselves.

Mr. M. E. Asire certainly deserves great credit for his energy and persistence in pushing this opera house enterprise to its present successful stage, especially as his labors have been without any immediate or certain recompense. By his energy, devotion and public spirit in this important enterprise Mr. Asire has added much to the deservedly high regard in which he is held by the people of Marquette. He should not be forgotten. Meanwhile the city is to be congratulated on the fact that it will at last and after these many years possess a suitable building for musical and dramatic entertainments. Not the least among the benefits to be derived from the opera house is that it will do much to dispel the impression that has gone abroad, whether justly or not need not here be discussed, that Marquette is a pretty place to live in but lacks enterprise and progressiveness. The possession of a suitable and beautiful temple of musical and dramatic art will do much advantageously to advertise Marquette and hence all citizens will reap a substantial benefit.

**Female Thief Sentenced.**

\$500 voted to the company by the council for its year's work was divided among the thirty members at the rate of \$15 per man. The remaining \$50 was placed in the company treasury for future contingencies. The Morse hose company has done good work during the past year and gives every promise of continuing in its past efficiency.

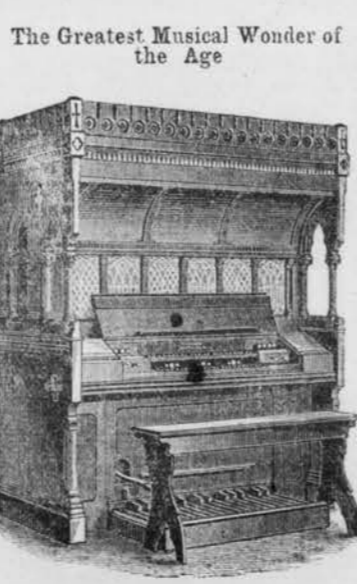
