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



Nothing of the kind in the world can surpass it, and no description can do justice to its exquisite character. It has a rare and richly delicate ecru tinted ground, on which is wrought a

scroll pattern of leaves and flowers, worked in all their natural colors, with every delicate shading. Every part of the work is of the highest degree of perfection. The "toile," or gimp, is of as fine texture as the most delicate cambric.

The raised edge of the pattern, or "cordont," is executed with the greatest precision and the flowing design which forms the out side edge of the lappet is enriched by an al-most endless variety of highly ornamented stitches, with a sort of quaterfoil diapered ground recalling the Mayflower and perdrix grounds of Sevres and Dresden porcelain. There is nothing equal to this in existence, It weighs eight ounces. Rub the Baby to Sleep.

A matron, who has an average of fifty babies in her care every year, advises rub-bing as a means of quieting a restless child and getting a nervous one to sleep. Her plan is to strip the morsel of humanity, sponge it off with tepid soapy water, dry it thoroughly

with a soft towel and, beginning at the little pink soles, rub it all over. At first there may be rebellion, but gradually it will sub-side, the youngster will begin to purr and "goo" with enjoyment, and under the sooth-ing influence of magnetism it will drop off to eep, rest well and wake up in the morning freshed and cheerful. The value of this operation can be varied by rubbing the little limbs and body up and down until the flesh becomes warm and pink one time and the next day having the motion rotary-that is, take the delicate ankle in one hand, wrapping the fingers as closely about it as possible and not hurt the child. In this way work up and down the legs and arms until the child becomes quiet. The body may be rubbed or stroked in the same way. This massag treatment of the tonsils, throat and chest with the hand moistened with camphorated oil or vaseline, will ward off the throat trouble or relieve a cold .- New York World

How to Sell Carpet Sweepers.


A man who sells carpet sweepers was asked how it was that in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred he never failed to make a sale.


