

GARRICK AND DIBDIN.

The Former Knew the Value of Money and Did Disagreeable Things. In 1768 Dibdin transferred his services to matters. One would hardly be justified in applying the term "unscrupulous" to Garrick; but he undoubtedly knew the value of noney better than those who served him, and it was not his fault if he got the worst of a bargain. Dibdin signalized himself at Drury Lane by his writing of the music for "The Paddock," and yet for his share in the work he received only £45, while Bickerstaff, the

author of the words, got £1,700.

As he says himself, however, he was of an easy and credulous temper, and, as we may say for him, he was also extravagant and improvident, being indeed a kind of Gold-smith of his profession. He parted with most of his early writings without proper agreements, and in consequence got handsomely cheated. His renowned song, "The Waterman," he sold for two guineas; "Nothing Like Grog," for half a guinea, and so on Thus, while he was always working hard, hi existence for the greater part of his career was little better than the hand to mouth one

of the third rate professional. Garrick seems to have found him of signal service at the Stratford jubilee, as well as at Drury Lane, yet they do not appear to have at any time pulled well together. The young composer had become indebted to the actor to the extent of £50, and he tells us that Garrick made him slave at song writin or the Shakespeare celebration till "he had better gone to a Jew for the money." 


