















### SHRIEKS STIR THE NIGHT.

**Nelson Cota Probably Fatally Stabbed In an Affray During Small Hours Yesterday Morning.**

**GEORGE RICE IS ACCUSED OF THE CRIME AND HAS DECAMPED.**

**Festive Sneak Thieves Continue Their Work. Larger Police Force Needed—Program for First Summer Night Concert.**

**Stabbing Affray.**  
Nelson Cota, a half breed Indian well known in this city for his general quarrelsomeness and capacity for getting into trouble, was stabbed in the abdomen night before last, receiving a wound from which he may die. He now lies in the Emergency hospital in a critical condition and whether he will recover or not it is impossible to say.

About 1 o'clock yesterday morning the residents along Ohio street were awakened by a tumult of yells and shrieks apparently proceeding from the low grounds in the rear of J. M. Case's residence. A woman was shrieking as in deadly fear and a man's voice exclaimed several times: "I am stabbed to the heart. My God, I shall die! I shall die!"

It is alleged that Cota had been carrying on an intrigue with the wife of George Rice, another half-breed, and that the outraged husband had surprised the pair together and used his knife to revenge himself. Cota was taken two hours after the cutting occurred to the Emergency hospital. Dr. Thiell, after considerable difficulty, succeeded in replacing his protruding intestines and sewing up his wound. The operation was a delicate and dangerous one and should Cota recover will reflect no small credit on Dr. Thiell Rice, who Cota charges with stabbing him, has disappeared and at the time of writing no arrests had been made.

From the amount of noise made during the affray early yesterday morning it appeared to those who heard it as if there must be at least a dozen persons drunk and engaged in a free fight. No other wounded save Cota had turned up, however, up to a late hour last night.

Reports from the Emergency hospital late last evening say that it is doubtful if Cota lives until morning.

**More Sneak Thievery.**  
Certain sportive sneak thieves are still getting in their work about this town. Last night the residences of W. C. Foard and P. Werner were entered and provisions stolen. Mr. Haughton's horse was taken from his stable and driven hard on some unknown errand. There were probably other similar cases, but they have not yet been reported.

These cases only go to show the soundness of the *Mining Journal's* argument for an increase of the police force. This town is growing too large for three watchmen to guard it efficiently. Especially is this the case when one man is required in the semi-detached district of South Marquette, leaving only two men for the other four wards. One man must be kept on Front and Washington streets, and thus only one is left for the residence district. Marquette needs a larger police force and the council will do well to look into the matter at once.

**First Summer Night Concert.**  
The Marquette city band will give the first of its series of summer night concerts this evening on the stand near the Hotel Marquette. The program for the occasion is as follows:

**Notes From the Circuit Court.**  
The circuit court yesterday was occupied with the cases of the people against Andrew Saari, Gustav Krialy and Andrew Maki, charged with riot and affray. Four other Finlanders, against whom the same charge was made, were let go for lack of evidence. The defendants, with others, engaged in a free fight in an Ishpeming saloon. Testimony was concluded yesterday and the case will go to the jury to-day.  
The case of George Jankowski, charged by Lizzie Jerbeck with illegitimate parentage, was decided against the defendant by the jury. He paid the statutory \$350 and departed a poorer but wiser man.

In the civil suit of W. J. Brotherton and others against Michael Gleason and others judgment was rendered for the plaintiffs in the sum of \$467 and costs. In the suit of Daniel Nast and others against William Markert and others judgment was rendered for \$1275 and costs. The civil calendar will be taken up to-day as the Finish riot case now on trial practically concludes the criminal docket.

**Mr. Johnson's Organ Recital.**  
Mr. George L. Johnson, organist of St. Paul's church, has resigned that position and is now considering several offers from other congregations. It is possible that Mr. Johnson may go to Spokane Falls, Washington. Several

other offers are under consideration, among which is one from St. Peter's cathedral of this city. Mr. Johnson is a fine musician, and all music lovers of the city will hope that he may find it possible to remain here.

As a sort of farewell Mr. Johnson will give, next Wednesday evening, an organ recital at St. Paul's church. The Gooding quartette and Miss McDonald will sing and a fine musical entertainment is certain. The full program will be announced later.

**Progress of A. O. U. W.**  
C. M. Gooding, of this city, returned from Manistique yesterday. While there he instituted a lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, with twenty-seven charter members. Mr. Gooding is deputy grand master for the upper peninsula of that well-known beneficiary order. The members of the Manistique lodge are representative business men, and are determined to make it a success. The lodge starts out with much enthusiasm, and promises to become a pillar of the order in this region.

**Foresters' Celebration.**  
The courts of the Ancient Order of Foresters of the upper peninsula will hold a grand celebration at Ishpeming to-morrow. A fine program of athletic games has been prepared, the attendance promises to be very large and a jolly time is certain all round.

Chief Ranger Lang has issued an order to all members of Court Star of Marquette who intend going to the celebration to assemble at Knights of Pythis hall at 8 o'clock sharp on Saturday morning. Members who wish to take their families are requested to notify George Davidson, who will have a bus on hand to take them to the depot.
