Plaster Casts of Hallstones. Dr. David Genese sends for the city mu seum, seven casts of hailstones that fell on Sunday, April 29, 1890. They are nearly fac-similes as to size and shape, and show the peculiar irregular formation of the precipitated ice. The hailstones were place upon a slab of glass and a mixture of modeling plaster was poured upon them. Alum was mixed with the plaster to make it set quickly. Where the hailstone touched the glass a small aperture was left. As the hailstones melted the water ran out of this opening. A solution was then poured in to prevent adhesion, and freshly mixed plaster was poured into the mould thus prepared. When hardened the outer crust was broken away, leaving exact casts of the hailstones, except that the keener edges of the ice were lost slightly by rapid melt ing caused by the heat that was generated by the crystallization of the plaster. The models are neatly silvered. The largest is nearly two inches and five-eighths long.— Baltimore Sun.

Intelligence in Animals.

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

NO HOPE FOR THE POTTS.

Husband and Wife Hang to-day for the Murder of Old Man Fawcett

Elko, Nev., June 19.-Preparations are being made for the execution here to-morrow of Josiah Potts and his wife Elizabeth, for the murder of Miles Fawcett at Carlin, January 1, 1888. Fawcett who was about 70 years 6 age, lived on a ranch a few miles from Carlin, where he had some stock and several hundred dollars in money. Mrs. Potts did his washing and baking, and Fawcett lent them several hundred dolhis business. That was the last ever seen of Fawcett until his body was found, the following year. The Potts family stated that Fawcett had settled up all his business, had given Mrs. Potts a bill of sale for all his property,

and had left for parts unknown.
In September, 1888, the Potts family In September, 1888, the Potts family sold their property and that formerly belonging to Fawcett and removed to Rock Springs, Wyoming. In January, 1889, the body of Fawcett with the limbs severed from the trunk, the skull rushed in and the remains partly burned was found by the caving of a roof of a cellar attached to the house formerly occupied by the Potts. The Potts were brought back to Elko for trial. Circumstantial evidence went to show that Mrs. Potts struck Fawcett on show that Mrs. Potts struck Fawcett on the back of the head with an axe as he was lying in bed and also fully implicated Potts in the crime. The jury returned a verdict of murder in the first degree and the supreme court affirmed the decision.



Trees and Climate.

commerce.-St. Louis Republic

The effect of trees on climate has formed the subject of an article in Petermann's by an able Russian observer, M. Wocikoff. He maintains that the diminution of evaporation effected by forests is not due to the lower temperature known to exist under their shadow, but that the most important factor is the resistance to the winds by the trees. This causes the air of the forest to be changed more slowly, and thus the sat-urated air is not so largely replaced by dry air, and the moisture is less rapidly carried

away.

The vicinity of a forest increases the summer rainfall considerably, but has less effect in winter. The storage of rain water in the moss, fallen leaves and herbage of the woods affords a supply of vegetation during dry seasons. A striking illustra-tion of this is afforded by a forest on the western shore of the Caspian, where the vegetation is very luxuriant, although it rived yesterday. The Omaha, Drake, TeuM. 

Striking Trammers Intimidate Other Workmen by Threats of Violence Into Quitting Work Also.

MANAGEMENT ORDERS MINE STOPPED RATHER THAN YIELD.

Huns Are the Only Ones Who Have Interfered W .. Other Workmen-Sanguinary Ti . Sts Copper Country Notes.

One Thousand Men Are Idle. RED JACKET, June 19, 8 P .- | Special. ]-The eastern management of the Tamarack nine has telegraphed Assistant Superinendent Watson to close down the mine for the month. No details of the manage ment's purposes have yet been received, but it is evident that no submission will be made to the demands of the striking tram-

RED JACKET, June 19.-[Special]-The Hungarian trammers at the Tamar ack mine still hold the fort. They are the only employes of the company who have in any way interfered with the labor of other employes. This morning General Superintendent Watson told the men that he had work digging ditches for about thirty of them and those who wished to work should be on hand at 1 o'clock. At half past ten o'clock the Austrian trammers went to No. 2 engine house and or dered the engineer, who was leaning out of the window to see what was going on, not to hoist any cages or start his engine. From there they went to No. 1 auxiliary engine hoist and ordered the engineer not to hoist.

"If you do, we pull you out," one of them said to the engineer "you start engine, you

From there they went to No. 1 engine house which has lately been rebuilt after its destruction by fire. Assistant Superintendent Watson was there to meet them. They told the engineer not to start his engine. The engineer asked them what they would do about it if he did?

"We fix you, you ----," they answered They next went to the machine shop. About a dozen machinists were at their lathes. They ordered them to quit work. Some of the machinists told them they could not stop work as long as the engine was running so they began looking around the shop and finally spied the engine in the east end. The leaders of the strikers at once went to and began to examine it One of them spied a valve on one of the pipes. He twisted at it a while and found it would not stop the engine. He then saw the steam valve. He gave that a turn the wrong way when a second man came up and stopped him.

From the machine shop they went to the blacksmith shop. They entered and ordered the blacksmiths to quit work. The men, seeing resistance useless, quit. At each of the places visited the strikers left watchmen to see that no one worked. The strikers in their rounds carried clubs. One had an an old shovel across his shoulder. Sheriff Bawden and several deputies were on the grounds at the time the men were making the rounds.

Captain Quick went to the strikers and told them that it would be necessary to run the pumps. This they agreed to. Only one of them said: "Me don't care about water in mine." At noon the strikers and their watchmen all went to dinner with orders to be on hand at 1 o'clock.
