IS IT VICTORY OR DEFEAT?

Hitherto Conquered Marquette Champions Will Cross Bats With Hancock's Husky Sluggers To-day.

JUDGE STONE PLEASES JURYMEN BY TURNING THEM OUT TO GRASS.

Special Council Meeting Held Last Evening. Knights Templar Go to Church To-morrow - Dynamiters Destroy Fish.

Chance To Win Back Lost Laurels.
Marquette has a chance to retrieve herself to-day and polish up her somewhat tarnished record upon the green diamond. The Hancock team, the champions of last year, will cross bats to-day with the Marquette sluggers. Hancock's defeat by Ishpeming yesterday should encourage the home team to do its level best. The positions and batting order of Marquette are as follows: Cross, ss; Scott, 3b; Craft, 2b; Shotts, p; Gleason, rf; Carney, lf; Allard, 1b; Welch, c; Sullivan, cf. The ten-day rule does not allow Marquette to put in its new battery, Wilder and Thorpe. From the work done by these two players elsewhere and in practice since coming here great things are expected of them. Game will be called at 3:15 sharp and a lively and interesting contest is certain, whatever the result.

Turned the Jury to Grass.
Judge Stone yesterday took pity on the unfortunate jury in the circuit court and turned it out to grass. The case pending was that of Hiram A. Burt as administrator of the estate of John Burt against William Ward. This is an ejectment suit involving certain lands a short distance south of this city but it is complicated with tax sales. The attorneys, Messrs. Ball, Clark and Hill, had a multitude of law points to present. The arguments were able and ingenious, but being addressed to the court only the jury grew restive. Observing this Judge Stone remarked: "Gentlemen of the jury, you may be excused for five or ten minutes if you wish, or until I send for you."

The jury proceeded down stairs and reclined on the green turf on the shady side of the building, smoking and telling stories for over an hour before the considerate judge disturbed their repose. The rest was a most welcome one to the jurymen on a warm and lazy day. The case will be concluded this morning.

In the Finnish affray case, from Ishpeming, the jury found Andrew Maki guilty and let the other three defendants go. Maki was sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 and the costs. He is still in jail, but expects his friends to raise the money in a day or two.

Special Council Meeting.
The common council held a special meeting last evening. In the absence of Mayor Longyear Alderman Mack presided. Ordinances were passed for the grading of Alger street from Fourth to Lee street and of Genesee street from Adams to Altamont streets. The street committee was directed to repair Bluff street, between Sixth and Seventh streets, so that storm water could escape. A numerously signed petition for more electric lights on Hewitt avenue, was referred to the electric board.

The council proposes to get after delinquents in the matter of personal property taxes. The city treasurer was directed to furnish the city attorney with a list of such for the two years past and ex-Mayor Clark was requested to make a report on the cases in his hands.

George Reichel was allowed \$500 on his Fourth street contract; Bergh & Hettig, were allowed \$300 on their Jackson street contract, \$1,100 on the trunk sewer and \$345.50 for extra work on the same. The opinion of City Attorney Hill on the matter of the election bills, furnished Mayor Longyear, was heard by the council as a matter of information. Mr. Hill seems to hold that the aldermen are, by the charter, entitled to only \$1 per year for all services, including those as inspectors of election.

Knights Templar Will Attend Church.
To-morrow being the nearest Sunday to the day of St. John the Baptist, June 24th, according to ancient custom the Knights Templar of Lake Superior commandery will attend divine service in a body. The knights will assemble at their asylum and march in full uniform to the church, where special services will begin at 3:30 o'clock. After the service, which includes the Lord's Prayer, Psalm 107, "Confitemini Domino," "Magnificat," "Benedictus," the Apostles' Creed and the Collects proper to the occasion an address will be made by Sir Knight Wyllys Hall, D. D., who is also Prelate of Lake Superior commandery. The service will be an elaborate and impressive one and the turnout of the knights brilliant as usual.

Fishing with Dynamite.
Within the past few days some unknown person has been trying the effect of dynamite upon the fish of Lake Superior. The result is that the surface of the lake north of Light House point and around Picnic Rocks is covered with dead fish, and the beach is strewn with their putrefying remains. Thousands of herring, lake trout, young white fish

and not a few brook trout have been destroyed by the wantonness of the dynamiters.

The state law is very severe against the use of dynamite in fishing, and should the person who has been ruffling the bosom of Superior with cartridges of giant powder be discovered it is likely to go hard with him. Such conduct merits the severest reprobation and due punishment. Merely to gratify a brutal desire of killing the persons who thus use dynamite destroy thousands of fish which might be valuable as a food supply.

New Boarders at the Pen.
An octette of new boarders has registered at Warden Tompkins' famous summer and winter resort. Three came from Mackinac county and the list is headed by William Smith, who will tarry for six years for holding up and making disgorge his valuables a fellow traveler upon the public highway. John Taylor will do a year's penance for larceny and Thomas Lawler will retreat from the world for the same time for receiving property of which others were feloniously deprived.

Cheboygan county contributes a trio of burglars, Frank Cardnell, Malcom Duvose and George Pursey. The former will tarry two years and the latter brace one year each. Matt Gormandy comes from the same classic bailiwick for sixty days for assault. Emmet county sends up Jerry Obenan who carried a gun in his clothes and will tarry ninety days.

Rice Still at Large.
Nelson Cota, the half-breed Indian alleged to have been stabbed early Thursday morning in a brawl with George Rice, was resting somewhat easier yesterday at the Emergency hospital and it is believed he has a chance of recovery.

George Rice, the other half-breed alleged to have done the cutting, is still at large. He will probably be bagged in due time unless he leaves the country altogether. Many persons think the community at large would have benefited had the two men stabbed each other on the edge of the dock and then fallen in. Both are known as tough citizens and Cota in particular has spent much of his time in jail for various offenses, chiefly of a brawling and fighting kind.

Will Celebrate the Fourth.
The people of the thriving little settlement of Shingleton propose, with a commendable spirit of enterprise, to have a Fourth of July celebration of their own. Quite a program of athletic sports has been arranged, including a ball-game with a team from An Train or Munising. There will be dancing day and night and a speech or two and the whole affair will wind up with a display of fireworks in the evening.
