

The next republican state convention, to be held at Detroit on the 27th and 28th of next month, will consist of 944 delegate, if all the counties are represented. The apportionment, made according to the vote for Governor Luce in 1888, varies widely from the seven counties, which have only one vote apiece, to Wayne which has ninetysix. 
