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

### TERRIBLE BOILER EXPLOSION.

### One Man Blown to Atoms and the Heads of

Three Others Blown Off. COLUMBIA, S. C., Aug, 14 .- A special to the Daily Register, from Newberry, this state, says: News reached here to day of a terrible boiler explosion, which occurred this morning at a country saw mill 22 miles west of Newberry on Dr. Wm. 
