Those interested in American prosperity are of the opinion that it remains to be seen whether the new tariff measure will result in stimulating native industries sufficiently to eventually com-pensate for the immediate loss they consider certain. #### THE ISLAND OF ANEGADA

A Place Noted for Its Steaming Fogs and Fresh Water Inundations

The island of Anegada is one of the strangest of all the strange places in the world. It lies near the northeastern angle of the main chain of the West Indies, and differs from all the other islands near it in being flat and low, the neighboring isles all being steep and mountainous. It is nine miles long and two miles across, and lies so low that in heavy gales the sea makes a clean breach over the lower por

makes a crean breach over the lower por-tions of it, whence its name, for anegady is the Spanish for "drowned island." In 1881 it had 719 inhabitants, of whom only three were white people. Its population is noted for idleness, and the main occupation for many years was wrecking-for an extensive and very dan-gerous coral reef surrounds the island and nce gave it a very melancholy notoriety But since the establishment of the light-house on the island of Sombrero (fortyseven miles to the eastward) there have been few, if any, wrecks on Anegada, since the main cause of the shipwrecks was the constant and swift current which sets upon the island from the east. Accordingly, the natives are now not often aroused by the cry of "a vessel on the reef," the only call in the old days which would arouse them from their almost perpetual inactivity. In fact they are about the laziest people in the West Indies, although that is saying a

great deal Anegada used to be covered with under-Anegada used to be covered with under-wood—notably of the kind called seaside grape, which here is particularly rich in the valuable gum called Jamaica kino. Anegada is the home of very numerous and singular tropical plants, but it is per-haps rather more noteworthy for its im-meanse number of measuring guilding as mense number of mosquitoes, gallinippers and scorpions, not to speak of venomous and other reptiles. The surrounding seas are rich in scale and shell fish of many kinds. Among its singular birds the flamingo is one of the most numerous species, and most of the ponds are the abode of ducks which, on the approach of man, rise and fill the air with their clangorus cries. It is not an easy matter to reach the island.

A few years ago an attempt was made to open mines upon it, but nothing came of the effort but disappointment and loss. Among the many disagreeable features of life in this hot and steaming climate is the presence of large salt ponds, which in the dry season give out an intolerable stench, and the same ponds in the wet season fill up with singular rapidity and flood a con-siderable part of the island. When Schomburgh was on Anegada many years ago there was one morning a great outcry that all the north part of the island was flooded, and so to all appearances it was, but on examination it was found that the supposed waves of the sea were in reality only a low lying fog which was rapidly sweep

ing along. Another curious thing is the aerial re fraction; and this often brings into view other islands, which lie below the horizon and which, according to the ordinary oper-ations of nature, ought to be invisible. A part of the surface is composed of sand lunes, but there is a considerable propor tion of calcareous or coral land, with belts of fertile loam, and if the soil were intelli-gently and faithfully cultivated it would

no doubt yield good returns. In ordinary seasons the fresh water supply appears to be ample On the northeast side of the island there

is a singular succession of very deep nat-ural wells of fresh water, some of them twenty-five feet across at the top. It would be hard to find anywhere a hotter, wetter, be hard to find anywhere a hotter, wetter, worse smelling or more generally disagree-able place to live in than Anegada; but singularly enough it appears to be for the most part a pretty healthy place—at least for the natives, of whom nearly all are black or colored. In the ante-colonial days the Indians used to come hither in their canoes, and they have left immense kitchen middens or heaps of shells; but no Indian could ever make a permanent home in Anegada with its steaming fogs, its squalls, its sea floods, its fresh water inundations, its strong smells and its dense swarms of insects.-American Notes and Queries.

An important step in the development of the wood-working industries of Marquette was taken Saturday afternoon when the Hager & Johnason Manufacturing company was organized. This corporation will succeeed to the business of the present well-known firm of Hager & Johnason. Its capital stock is \$75,000, all of which has been subscribed. The parties interested in the Hager & Johnason Manufacturing company are the same as the stockholders in the Michigan Polygonal Turning company, Messrs. Longyear, White, Kidder, Hager, Johnason, Skinner and others and the directors of the two companies are the same. Mr. George W. Hager has been elected general manager of both companies.

The firm of Hager & Johnason has built up a large and growing business both in furniture and in interior wood-work. That business the Hager & Johnason Manufacturing company, with increased and ample capital, will proceed to enlarge and develop. The organization of this second corporation makes a total of \$200,000 invested in wood-working plants in Marquette within the last sixty days.

The parties who organized the Mich-igan Polygonal Turning company early saw the advantages to be derived from the location beside their factory of a general plaaing mill and wood work a general planing init and wood work-ing shop. 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

#### Be Sure Your Chicken Is Dead.

Housekeepers do not always understand that a chicken, after the animal heat leaves the body, is not fit for food in less than twenty-four hours. During this time the muscles are stiffened by the rigor that succeeds directly after the departure of animal heat in all animals, and are tougher than they are at any time previous. In Virginia and many parts of the south cooks kill and dress poultry with great rapidity, and plunge the pieces of chicken while they are still warm with animal heat into the frying kettle. This secures the tender, succulent dishes of fried chick-en which are justly the pride of the old Virginia cook.

There is something repulsive to the northern housewife in serving up a fowl that was perhaps a few moments before strutting about, the pride of the yard. An equally good and tender dish of chicken may be attained by keeping the fowl till the muscles relax, and it is in prime condition for food. In fact only by the rapid proces of frying can a chicken be cooked done be fore the muscles stiffen. This the south-ern cook knows, and she never attempts to fricassee or roast a fowl that has not been hung at least twenty-four hours.-New York Tribune
