The United States Express Company Absorbed By The Adams.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Oct. 21.-One of Milwaukee's largest wholesale shoe houses received official notice, yesterday, that shipments of goods that have heretofore gone by the Adams Express company and the United States company separately could hereafter be shipped by either company, and would arrive at their destination with as much certainty as when it was necessary to specify the right company in order to have them go safely. In other words the territory which has heretofore been controlled by one company is now open to both. This is the result of a consolidation of interests by the two companies which has long been under consideration, but which has only now been consummated. been consummated.

Of late negotiations to this end have been very active, and only a few days ago a western official of one of the companies, who had visited New York, reported that he had learned there of an inspection of all the United States company's offices by Adams company auditors. About the same time orders were issued to various parts of the country authorizing the doubling of the capacity of the Adams company's states. country authorizing the doubling of the capacity of the Adams company's stables and warehouses. In Chicago \$100,000 will be spent on the new stables. The two companies have agreed upon a consolidation which will be more in the nature of an absorption than anything else. Manager J. 



PAY OF WOMEN AND MEN.

UNEQUAL REMUNERATION OF IN-TELLECTUAL PURSUITS.

How the Wages of Educated People Have Increased in Forty Years-Difference in Salaries of Men and Women Who Are Doing the Same Work.

I remember well, more than thirty years ago, when the principal of one of the best academies in Massachusetts boasted to me that he had just offered to his first assistant a higher salary than had ever before been paid to a woman as teacher in that county. The amount thus offered and gratefully accepted was \$500. The salaries paid by endowed academies have usually gone above those offered in public schools, yet the paysparers have lately recorded tha the Cooley fire last Friday morning. The owner will confer a favor by returning it to the engine house.

The yet the newspapers have lately recorded the fact that two women have just been awarded salaries fixed respectively at \$1,800 and \$1,600 in Messachusetts as principals of public grammar schools; and the one woman on the board of school supervisors in Boston has, if I mistake not, a much higher compensation than this.
It is safe to say that salaries of \$1,000 for

women's services as teachers, clerks and bookkeepers are now much more common than were salaries of half that amount forty years ago, while the expenses of living have not increased in anything like that proportion. On the other hand, it is also true that to gain these higher salaries a far more expensive education is necessary than was needed for the lower ones, and that the number of women competing for employment is still much greater in these particular directions than is the case with

Our public libraries, for instance, are coming largely to be officered by women, simply from the fact that the salary which would only secure the services of one efficient man will commonly provide two equally well qualified women. Now in most of these cases the law of demand and supply governs. A school or a library can commonly only pay a certain amount, and must get the best it can for the money. It is only in especially difficult positions—as in the post of grammar school principal— that trustees are coming to be willing to pay what the services are intrinsically worth, without regard to the number of

competitors.
OCCUPATIONS IN WHICH BOTH ARE EQUAL. There are, as has before been pointed out in these columns, but two prominent occupations in which there seems no dis-tinction of sex as regards compensation. One of these is the stage (including the concert room) and the other is literature. Accordingly it is said in the newspapers that the two women of this generation who have earned the largest incomes are Ouida and Patti. Even on the stage I am told there is little difference in payment at the outset, and a "walking gentleman" receives little more than a "walking lady. It is also true that the expenses of an actress, in the direction of costumes, are so vastly greater than those of an actor that the equality of payment is more apparent

Here, as elsewhere, the path of literature has especial convenience for a woman; pens, ink and paper cost her no more than they would cost a man, nor does she re-quire a very expensive tollet to meet her publisher or her readers. In the first stages of journalism her regular pay may be less than if she were a man; but when she enters the domain of magazines and copy rights there is absolutely no difference. I is hard to say why the fact of sex consti-tutes no disadvantage in this sphere of industry, when it is otherwise in so many directions, but the fact is unquestionable. Nobody seems to ask, so long as a book is readable or an article available, whether it

is written by a man or a woman.

Mrs. Burnett is said to stand at the head of our authors just now in her literary earnings. The London Daily News says that she has received for her American rights on the play of "Little Lord Fauntleroy" no less than £17,000 (\$85,000), and that if we were to add her similar profits in England and the proceeds of the "enormous sales" of this novel the amount earned out of the book would be "quite startling." Almost as startling are the successes of women less conspicuous in literature. I know a lady who assures me that her first volume of poems yielded her \$1,000, whereas most poets of the other sex expect to make money, if at all, by their prose.

PROFITS OF SEVERAL MEN.
I know another lady who wrote, at a venture, a story of watering place life; it did not seem to me nor (I am happy to say) to the author a great production; but it went through twelve editions in six months. No doubt some men have equaled months. No doubt some men have equaled this success. The total sales of Mr. E. P. Roe's novels has amounted, it is said, to 2,027,000 copies. Mr. J. W. Buel's fourteen books have sold to a still greater extent, or 2,500,000 copies; one of them alone reaching more than half a million in two years. During 1888 his copyrights yielded \$33,000, and during 1889 \$50,000.

Mr. Albert Ross tells us that his first three novels sold to the extent of 300,000 copies in a year and a half. These successes were attained, it may be said, by men; but their being men had nothing to do with it; the successes, such as they were, lay in the books, such as they were; had these been written by women the result would have been the same.

If the point is now raised that these successful books are not necessarily of the highest grade we must simply answer that women, like men, must often make their choice between a cheaper success and one higher or more permanent. If they love literary work—and that person is to be pitied who engages in it while finding it unattractive-they will perhaps be will work a little higher.—Harper's Bazar.

As soon as it comes put it into the jars and tightly screw down the lids. Place them in a steamer over cold water, which should be heated gradually. Keep the jars steaming for not less than an hour, then screw the lids down and make them air tight. A student at one cal our colleges on commencement day pointed out to a visitor a row of young men sitting apart. "Those are our honor men," he said. "The rest of us are of no account. We won no prizes." The head of a famous school in New England once frankly said: "I confess that the

school is intended for lads of exceptional ability. We have no place for dull boys." Here are two different views of the question, and between them both the boy of average talent falls to the ground. Yet nine-tenths of the students in our schools

are not "honor men."
School contests are frequently cruel; the defeated majority are too often made to feel that they are inferior in their class, and will be so in the world.

They should remember that the prize or honor is a mere side issue of the subject: so is the success of their more able fellows. They have taken their brains to school to be trained as a workman sharpens his tools before beginning the day's labor, Let them look to their own tools and their sharpness. them.
They must consider, too, that outside of school there are prizes and honors to be won in other fields than scholarship. Here and there a man writes a book, or paints a picture, or leads a political movement with brilliant success, and becomes famous; but the world is as much concerned to know whether the slow, commonplace man is honest and energetic; whether he is kind to his wife and family, generous to his clerks, charitable in his judgment. It is, after all, he and his fellows who give character to a community or a race; who, in the long run, fight the battles of progress, and sustain civilization and Christianity.


