





quote the following statement, made under oath to the Ontario Mining commission, by Mr. W. J. Rattle, M. E., of Cleveland, O., an emine at iron expert.

Mr. Rattle says: "There is no question but that they have the true formation for iron ore bearing rocks in Darling township. We found specular ore in several places on the range; in one place we were shown a vein of magnetite 35 feet in width. At another place we saw hematite at least 15 feet wide and traced it 200 feet. I should judge it was a very good quality of ore. I am very well satisfied with the outlook for ore in Ontario, and judge the ores to be of good quality. I think the prospects are such as to justify reasonable development. This applies both to magnetic and hematite ores. We were on three magnetic ranges, one of which had a great deal of sulphur, the others had not. In one district I visited, I do not believe there is any sulphur in the ores. I believe you have a magnificent outlook for iron. I have been intimately connected with the smelting of iron since 1872. I think these Ontario ores would be easy to smelt, as much so as our ores from Lake Superior. 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



PARNELL'S DOWNFALL,

Finding of the Jury in the O'Shea Divorce Case Ends His Political Life.

GRAPHIC DESCRIPTION OF SCENE IN CONSULTING ROOM OF DR. CORNEL.

Jury in the Prize Fight Case Fails to Reach an Agreement-Help for the Barings-General Foreign.

ENGLAND.

LONDON, Nov. 17 .- The trial of the O'Shea divorce case was resumed in the division court this morning before Justice Butt and the special jury. The petitioner presented further evidence to prove the charges he makes against his wife and Mr. Parnell. The first witness called was a servant who had worked at the O'Shea house at Eltham, at the time Captain O'Shea charges that Mr. Parnell was paying clandestine visits to his wife. She testified that Mrs. O'Shea and Parnell were on one eccasion locked in the drawing room. MRS. O'SHEA AFTERWARD EXPLAINED that the locking of the door was essential to the safety of Mr. Parnell, as a work by a little table, one number of members of secret societies seated in a chair undressed and were prowling about the vicinity. 

The Japanese are past masters in the treatment of alloys both in texture and color, and no better guides exist. They achieve their grand results by the simplest means—a judicious blending of various metals, inlaying and pickling. Copper is the basis of their chief alloys, and by incorporating with it contain proportions of corporating with it certain proportions of gold and silver they obtain remarkable results in color through the pickling process.

But not only do they get striking effects from their alloys and pickling; their mode of working up the metals is a thing to be studied. For instance, they will take six or seven plates of different metals and al-loys, weld them together, and then by drilling, punching up and filing, get a sur-face in which all the metals show in a manner which is truly wonderful. By the range of tints at their command they can work out on a metal surface scenes of animal life, landscapes, etc., with effect never dreamed of by metal workers in the western world.—Jowelers' Review.
