LAKE SHORE IRON WORKS.

One Hundred Thousand More for Manufacturing in the Queen City of Lake Superior.

THE IRON BAY SHOPS TO BE UTILIZED IMMEDIATELY.

Boys, You Can Come Home From Duluth, Marquette Wants You—The Boom Gets Another Big Boost.

ONE MORE STEP FORWARD.

The deal is closed at last and Marquette's great manufacturing shops are to enter upon a larger field of usefulness and under the most favorable auspices. On Thursday afternoon a meeting was held in Mayor Longyear's office at which the organization of the Lake Shore Iron Works was effected with John M. Longyear, Peter White, Charles Y. Osburn and Alfred Kidder, of Marquette, and Carlos D. Sheldon, of Houghton, as directors. The company was organized under the manufacturing law of Michigan, act of 1885, with a capital stock of \$100,000, of which \$70,000 is paid in, the extensive works of the Iron Bay Manufacturing company forming the nucleus. At a meeting of the directors held immediately after the organization was effected, John M. Longyear was elected president of the company, Peter White secretary and treasurer, and Seymour H. Holley general manager.

As there were some details to be perfected the MINING JOURNAL was not permitted to make public the organization of the company last week but everything was speedily arranged and on Saturday the general manager, Mr. Holley, left for Milwaukee and Chicago, armed with letters of credit, to purchase the machinery and equipment for the new concern. The boilers and engines are in shape for use at once. It is the intention to start up the works just as soon as the machinery can be placed in position and within two weeks it is expected that the company will be in the field for business. It will from the start turn out castings and machine work of every description and as soon as possible will branch out into the general manufacturing business for which its location, capital and equipment fit it. As far as the equipment is concerned Mr. Holley is determined that everything shall be of the latest and most approved pattern and that the shops shall be second to none in facilities for first class work and economy of management.

Ever since the expedition of the Iron Bay company to West Duluth in search of a bonus it has been the intention of the Marquette capitalists who immediately bought in the extensive works here, to start them up and they have been sorely impatient over the long delay, but are now satisfied that it was for the best as the main trouble all along has been to interest with them parties who thoroughly understood the business and could relieve the directors, all men of very large interests, of the burden of looking after the company's affairs. The men have been found in Messrs. Sheldon and Holley, both of whom have invested largely in the enterprise. Of the former it need only be said that his name is known the peninsula over as that of a thorough foundryman and manufacturer.

Of Mr. Holley it can be said that he has had twenty-two years' experience in the business and is entitled to the proud distinction of being "an old Lake Superior boy." He learned his trade with Mr. Sheldon at Hancock, has been with Allis, in Milwaukee, and Frazer & Chalmers, in Chicago, and in recent years has been with the famous Broken Hill silver mines in Australia at a large salary, resigning his position only because his health would no longer endure the hot climate. Mr. Holley has leased J. F. Carey's residence, corner of Michigan and Fourth streets, and will bring his family here at once from Shelbygan, Wis., where they are now visiting, having returned from Australia only a month or two ago.

The stockholders in the new company are all home capitalists with the exception of Mr. Sheldon and Mr. Holley. The list includes J. M. Longyear, Peter White, C. Y. Osburn, Alfred Kidder, Carlos D. Sheldon, Seymour H. Holley, Ferd. Bendig, F. O. Clark, John F. Mack, S. Kaufman, N. M. Kaufman, N. Barth, D. W. Powell and quite a number of others. It is known that the company has a splendid business field. The removal of the Iron Bay concern to West Duluth was postponed for nearly a full year because time could not be found for moving. The works were running day and night and finally orders had to be refused and a lot of work taken to the head of the lake to be finished. Since then big jobs from the mines, etc., have been sent away necessarily and even castings were often not obtainable nearer than Escanaba because the Lakeside works here were all along crowded beyond their capacity with work. This business will now remain in the county and in this way the starting up of the Lake Shore Iron Works becomes a matter of congratulation all along the Marquette range, as well as a move which will arouse the utmost enthusiasm on the part of every resident of the Queen city.

In The Circuit Court.

On Saturday in the circuit court Judge Stone signed the decree of divorce in the proceedings of Moore vs. Moore, the alimony being the same as already stated in the MINING JOURNAL.

In the case of Jacobs vs. Haughton and Thurber a judgement was rendered for the plaintiff for \$599.39.

In the case of Gillett vs. Haughton the jury was out until late at night and was finally dismissed, not being able to come to an agreement.

To-day the three jury cases in which J. M. Underwood is defendant will be taken up.

Winning Recognition.

Although the Marquette green houses are at the very commencement of their career, as yet, Mr. Stafford's belief in advertising has already brought them wide recognition. His home support

has been eminently satisfactory and his up-the-road patronage has also been surprisingly large while he has filled orders from places as far away as Menominee and Duluth, having filled a large order Friday which was received from the latter place by wire, the Duluth florists having been cleaned out and having to send here to complete orders. A good florist has long been wanted here and now that flowers can be secured right at home the young man about town will soon discover that it is not "the thing" to invite a young lady to a party without sending flowers for the occasion.

Hardwood Brings Cash.
Every day now team after team passes through the city with hardwood from the Chocoyay farms for the Hager & Johnson Mfg. Co. and the Michigan Polygonal Turning company. The farmers take their logs to the mill and then bring the lumber, cut from one to six inches thick, up to the city, unload it at the works, are paid in cash at the office and return home happy. The Fraser, Sambrooke, June and Joslin mills are all cutting hardwood now for these works and when they start up in March they will have between 500,000 and 1,000,000 feet of hardwoods in stock, including oak, maple, birch, ash and basswood. Already Marquette is beginning to feel the effect of the location here of these large wood working plants.

How They Do It.
If any Marquette people feel that they are having to "put up" rather heavily for the thorough improvements now under way under the direction of the water board they will be interested in the following West Superior note:

The Water, Light and Power company has laid twenty-eight miles of pipe during the past season. This is, of course, exclusive of the submarine pipe of twenty four inches diameter that is being extended across Superior bay and into Lake Superior, a distance of 8,500 feet from the pump station to the crib. In addition to this there were eleven miles of gas pipe laid. By the time the company has finished laying the great intake pipe \$300,000 will have been expended in this season.

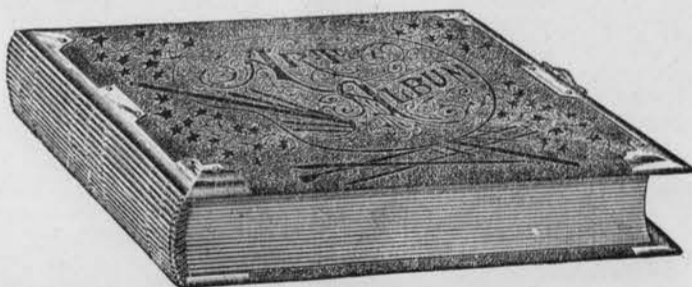
