

Indians Reported Quiet and Troops Rapidly CHICAGO, Dec. 7 .- Advices from the

Indian country were received at army headquarters to-night, stating that everything is reported quiet and that there has been no dancing since Wednesday last. At Fort Yates the thermometer registered ten degrees below zero to night. Full rations have been ordered for the Indians. The Seventh infantry from Fort Logan, Denver, Colo., is expeated to reach Fort Yates some time to-night. The Sixth cavalry is expected to reach Rapid City to-morrow. The First infantry should be near Rose Bud agency. There are nearly six thousand soldiers now in the nortowest Indian country where the excitement exists. General Brooke has under his command at Pine Ridge agency nearly fifteen hundred troops and about seven hun-

WRECK NARROWLY MISSED

Steamers Champagne and Libonese Collide Near Sandy Hook Without the Usual Fatal Results.

EACH CAPTAIN CONFIDENT THE OTHER IS WHOLLY TO BLAME.

Five Hundred Sleeping Passengers Have Very Close Call Without Knowing It-Stories of the Two Captains

STEAMSHIPS IN COLLISION.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 .- The French teamship Champagne, which sailed from this port for Havre at noon on Saturday, returned to her dock at the foot of Morton street today, having been in collision at 5:50 o'clock this morning with the freight steamer Libonese bound above the water line. The accident occurred about two miles south of Sandy Hook. The stem of the Champagne

struck the stern of the Libonese and both vessels escaped serious injury. No person was hurt. After the collision the Libonese proceeded to her dock in Brooklyn. Captain Boyer, of the Champagne, gave the following version

of the affair:

"We sailed at noon on Saturday with 449 cabin and steerage passengers. We had a pilot and the tug Assistance, Captain Parker, to lead us out to sea, because the weather was very foggy On the way out we passed the Etruria. matters. Lieutenant Gaston reports NEGRO LYNCHED BY NEGROES. We went on through the main channel and shortly after 5 o'clock this morning we sighted the Libonese coming toward us quite speedily. Her route lay through the south channel. We were going at half speed and had to keep going as the channel is but 20 feet wide and we would be washed a hore if we stowed. Considering the same subject editorially, the Review remarks:

At last, after a significant silence of several weeks, we have the aggregate shipents of iron ore by water from Lake Su perior iron mines up to the middle of last week. The total at date of latest report was 7,863,445 tons, with the prospect, according to upper lake authorities, of reaching 8,000, 00 tons by the end of the shipping season. The rail shipments also show a surprising acrease this year, reaching a total of about 100,000 tons; so that the grand total of production for 1890 will probably reach, say, 8, 100,000 tons. Last year the total production was 7,292,254 tons.

Just what the stocks of ore mined but un disposed of will amount to at the close of the season is not certain, but they are generally believed to be less than ordinary, indicating that there has been no over-pro

As to the prestige of largest production the Norrie mine, in the Gogebic district, easily leads with a probable output of 1, 000,000 tons, the largest single year's ship ent from any single mine in the world. So much for 1890. Now for 1891.
