Matrimony Measured.

In 1888 13 per cent, of all the men mar-ried in Pennsylvania married women older than themselves. Eighty per cent. married them younger than themselves, and the remaining 7 per cent. took wives their own ages. The average age of the men was 27 years, and of the women 23 years. More men are married at 23, and more women at 21. This seems the favorite time. A wom-an of 59 married a man of 31, and a girl of 23 took an old man of 74. The youngest couple who ventured into matrimony was a boy of 17 and a girl of 15.

One man of 54 married a girl of 18. His age was just three times hers; and a man of 48 took a girl of 17. Where the men are older, the difference in ages varies, but where the women are older, it rarely ex-ceeds five years. Two boys of 16 were nar-ried, and two graybeards of 80 tried the same thing, probably not for the first time.

The number of licenses issued for the year ending December 1, 1889, was 121, or 21 le-s than this year; the total amount collected was \$51,553.32, which shows an increase of \$7,941.71 for 1890.




