MICHIGAN MAN HONORED.

Judge Henry B. Brown Fills Supreme Court Vancancy Caused by Death of Justice Miller.

APPOINTMENT GIVES GENERAL SATIS-FACTION TO BOTH PARTIES.

Semceratic Detroit Papers Fraise His Fitness for That High Office-Some Sketch of the Jurist's Life.

AN EXCELLENT APPOINTMENT.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 .- The presiient to day sent to the senate the nomnation of Henry B. Brown of Michigan to be associate justice of the supreme ourt of the United States, vice Samuel F. Miller, deceased.

The appointment of Judge Brown meets with general favor at the capitol and hegis said to be a good man for the place. He is of Massachusetts birth and after graduation from college went to Detroit where he praticed law. He was frequently counsel in cases before the supreme court and was particularly supreme court and was particularly strong as an admiralty lawyer. He is a little above medium height, stock-ily built, smooth shaven with a full square face and resem-bles Representative McKinley in his general appearance. He is said to be a man of considerable means. In Detroit he married a lady of wealth. He has been United States district judge for many years and is well and favorably known to his future associ-

favorably known to his future associ-ates. The justices of the court were consulted in Judge Brown's appoint-ment and when asked for their advice commended him as a man well qualified for the office. Justice Blatchford it is said is an especially warm admirer of Judge Brown.

The lake companies have not yet official ly declared their new price, and in the meantime the market is in a state of suspense. Supplies are not lacking, however. On the contrary plenty of lake cooper is being offered in small and large quantities at 15% (@15% cents, and even somewhat less. But for export much lower prices have been accepted, and it said that some 400 to 500 tons have been sold, which will be shipped within the next four or six weeks. This is about all the business we have to report for the week, as the small sales made were entirely of a retail character. Arizona copper can be bought at 131/c., and casting brands at 13(@13), c., and it is quite evident that there is a considerable surplus of copper hanging over the market which it will not be easy to dispose of
