## ISHPEMING EVENTS.

A False Alarm of Fire Gives the Department a "Breather"—Beer and Beef for Christmas. It Blowed and it Snowed—More Power on the Hese Cart a Crying Need.

A False Alarm.  
During the height of the furious storm of Monday evening the ominous sound of a steam whistle sounding an alarm of fire was heard. It was at first thought that the alarm was from the Lake Angeline, but as there was none sent through the box, or by telephone, it was concluded that it came from the Salisbury, two miles out. The fire department started for that location at the best rate of speed that the city's horse-drawn fire engine could make. One horse cart and the hook and ladder truck went to Salisbury, and the firemen were somewhat disgusted, on arriving there, to find that there was no fire, and had been none. Some person saw the reflection of the electric light on the windows of the Salisbury school house, and turned in the alarm. The firemen are looking for the fellow who did it, and he will suffer if he is caught before their wrath moderates.

Meat and Drink for Ishpeming.  
Monday morning there arrived in the city a train over the Northwestern line. It was a freight train of five cars. The first, second, third and fourth cars were loaded with bottled and keg beer from Milwaukee, and the fifth and last was filled with dressed meat from Chicago. We are bound to celebrate Christmas in royal style this year, and if the beef doesn't hold out there is consolation in the thought that there will be no lack of beer.

Furious Storm.  
A severe windstorm, accompanied by a slight snow, set in Monday evening, and lasted without appreciable diminution of vigor until a late hour last night. No great damage was done, though the telegraph and telephone companies had a number of cases of broken wires.

A Suggested Improvement.  
The sight of one poor horse dragging a heavy hose cart, the reel loaded with a thousand feet or so of hose, and a dozen brawny firemen clinging to the sides and rear of the cart, is not one calculated to arouse pleasurable emotions. It is all that a strong horse can do to move the cart faster than a walk. It would be a decided improvement if the hills were taken from the cart, and a stout tongue put in their place. The city pays enough for the horses that haul the carts to fires to allow two horses to take the place of the one unfortunate beast that now performs that service. The increase in speed would be very noticeable if matters were arranged so that two horses instead of one could be had to haul the cart to fires.

It has been suggested that a hose station be established on Strawberry Hill. The value of the residence property in that district is very great, and at present fire protection is afforded from the Central station. The firemen labor under the disadvantage of having to haul their apparatus up a steep hill, and some time is lost. The cost of building a hose house and equipping it would be small, and if the people living in this part of the city really want a hose company of their own they can probably get it by petitioning the common council in sufficient number.

The American Biscuit and Manufacturing Company Locates in Marquette.

A WHOLESALE AND JOBBING CRACKER AND CONFECTIONERY HOUSE.

Will C. Brown, the Popular Pioneer Traveler From the Queen City, Manager of the New Business.

A Jobbing Concern Comes In.

Marquette's position as the natural distributing center for the whole northern peninsula of Michigan has again sold in her favor and the American Biscuit and Manufacturing Co. of Chicago, owning nearly all of the great cracker factories in the west, establishes its Lake Superior branch at Marquette with Mr. Will C. Brown, the pioneer traveling man of the city, as manager. The title of the establishment will be the American Biscuit and Mfg Co. of Marquette and for the winter the Armour building on Lake street has been leased; in the spring more suitable quarters will be secured.

The new establishment begins business immediately. The office furniture, several carloads of goods, and the delivery outfit are already on the way up from Chicago and by January 1st Mr. Brown will have everything in good shape for his regular trade. Everything known to the trade in the line of crackers, cakes, biscuits, etc., etc., and confections will be sent here regularly in carload lots and the entire upper peninsula trade, amounting to considerably over \$300,000 per year in these goods, will be reached from here. The merchants of the peninsula will greatly appreciate the new move as it will enable them to save a great deal of time and out-down freights greatly as well.

The house will have one traveling man resident here and Mr. E. E. Biting, formerly with A. S. Westlake, is now on the way here to accept the position. Four other traveling men will also come up into the territory, sending all their orders to Marquette to be filled.

Mr. Brown retires from the road to for once enjoy the comforts of home life. For years he has picked up his grips on January 1st and put them down only on December 31st. For the last seven years he has traveled for Woodard & Stone and in that time has sold hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of crackers, confectionery, etc., to upper peninsula merchants. His popularity is everywhere great and in every town on the peninsula there are many who will learn with pleasure of his advancement. For several years Mr. Brown was the only traveling man residing in Marquette—now there are thirty. After so long a connection with one house he naturally feels keenly the painfulness of a separation but feels also so that he has earned a rest, and such cessation from travel will be.

The advent of this wholesale and jobbing cracker house, handling everything baked in a cracker factory and also full lines of confectionery, is only the starter for Marquette. This city is destined to be the wholesaling center for the whole upper peninsula of Michigan. It is centrally located, has cheap water and rail transportation and is back up by a rich territory. One by one the enterprises come in, and now that outsiders are beginning to see all the advantages possessed by the city they are coming faster. The Standard Oil company, Ingersoll-Sergeant Rock Drill company, Thomson-Houston company, Falk, Jung & Borchert Brewing company, American Biscuit and Manufacturing company and the many general agencies here all testify directly to the advantages presented by Marquette as a point from which to handle the trade of the upper peninsula of Michigan. It will not be many moons before the MINING JOURNAL will have the pleasure of announcing the advent of other wholesale interests. Marquette is forging to the front as a business center, keep your mind fixed on that.

The Syndicate Feels It, Too.

Apparently the great German syndicate is no better off than the rest of the world and is feeling the tightness of the money market as badly as ordinary sinners. The impression is gained from the following from the Escanaba Calumet:

Notwithstanding Mr. Schlesinger's denial that his syndicate is financially embarrassed, the Calumet learns from what appears to be a most reliable and trustworthy source, that the company is in need of funds, and for this reason, if none other, many miners are being discharged. The Calumet knows positively that contractors working at North Escanaba are still unpaid, and that it is threatened to place matters in the hands of an attorney for collection. If the syndicate is able to liquidate its indebtedness as fast as accounts come due, as Mr. Schlesinger stated to a Milwaukee newspaper reporter a few days since, why is it that these men are not paid? A gentleman of this city recently visited several mines of the Schlesinger group, and states positively that miners are being discharged by the wholesale.

If the Schlesinger folks are short of funds as represented by our informant, then there is some ground for the belief that the Chicago & North Western has purchased—or are, at least, negotiating for—the Escanaba, Iron Mountain & Western road, as reported a few days since. The cause of the scarcity of ready money is said to be the failure of the German syndicate to hold up its end of the loan.

The air is now full of rumors in connection with the alleged transfer of the Schlesinger property to the C. & N. W. The latest report now in circulation is to the effect that the Canadian Pacific road is in treaty for the purchase of the Iron Mountain road. The report is submitted for what it is worth. Provided Escanaba has competing lines it makes little difference by whom they are controlled.

Midnight Services.

At midnight to-night pontifical high mass will be celebrated at St. Peter's cathedral by Rt. Rev. John Vertin, bishop of Marquette, assisted by Frs. Langan and Vernare and the theological students. People of all denominations are cordially invited to attend the service, and ushers will be on duty to see that all are seated suitably. The musical features of the service will be especially fine, the full choir being

present and the same mass being sung as at the consecration of the cathedral last summer.

To-morrow morning the usual services will be held at the cathedral, mass at 8 o'clock and high mass at 10 o'clock.

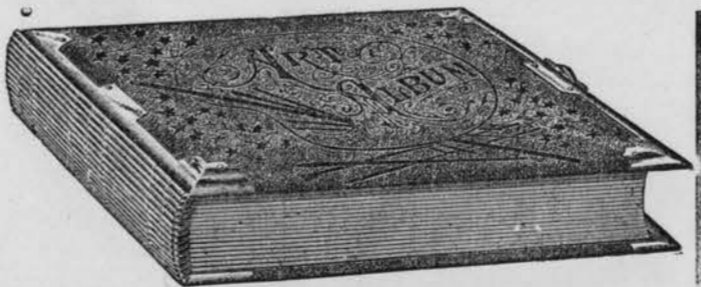
