PULLED IN OUT OF THE WET

Marquettes Win From Ishpeming in the Ninth Inning of a Rainy Game.

A HOMESTEADER SHOWS SOME VALUABLE IMPROVEMENTS.

Today's Great Base Ball Event—At the Teachers' Examination—League Standing—Other Local Notes.

MARKED BY KICKS, RAIN, HITS.

The Marquettes kicked, the Ishpeming kicked and the people kicked yesterday afternoon and still the game went on even in a pouring rain, nine full innings being played. The ground was wet and the ball wetter; the pitchers could do nothing, every man in both teams getting a hit, and the error columns tells how the fielders found the sphere. The game opened by Tanner being hit by Stellberger; Cull got a hit and stole second and then the two runs came in on Meister's fumble of Rathbun's hit and Wilbur's sacrifice to Adams. Craft struck out, Pedroes hit for a base and then Houseman went out from Meister to Morkin. A base on balls, a two-bagger and two singles with five errors by the Marquettes sent five men across the plate for the Ishpeming in their half and then the side was retired by a double from Wilbur to Cull on Rutter's line hit. Marquette 2, Ishpeming 5. In the second Adams' single followed by Morkin's hit over the fence gave Ishpeming two more and then the side was retired on Kirby's fly to Pedroes, Tray's hit to pitcher and Meister's fly which Rathbun gathered in by brilliant play. In the third Marquette got one, Craft getting a hit, making his usual steal of second and taking third on Roberts' error, scoring on Houseman's hit. Ishpeming went out in one, two, three order. Cull getting two assists, making a star play on Sheehan's hit, and Stellberger striking out. Marquette 3, Ishpeming 7.

In the fourth the Marquettes played hard for rain, the grounds being already very wet. The wet ball began to get in its work and on singles by Rathbun and Wilbur, Craft's double and two errors the home team made three runs with two men out. Ishpeming, on five singles, two bases on balls and two errors scored four men. Pedroes got an assist by a great throw to the home plate to catch Tray while Meister was caught off second by Ganss and done for by Cull and Rathbun. The last half of the inning was where the rain play came in and there was bushels of it. Marquette 6, Ishpeming 11.

The fifth and sixth innings were barren of results for both clubs, the features being Pedroes' great catch of Kirby's fly in the sixth and the double play from Wilbur to Cull to Tanner which retired the side.

In the seventh Marquette made a break for the game and the dismal outlook began to fade away. Pedroes struck out but Houseman hit for a base and got second on an error. Hughes sending him to third by a safe hit while Rutter's error in center field let him home and gave Ganss a life at first. Tanner's base on balls filled the bags and then Cull made another of those great hits into left center square for the fair buildings. Rutter was playing way out but before he could field the hit three men had scored and Cull was roosting quietly in third though many thought he could have made the plate safely. Rath flew to Kirby but Wilbur hit safely, scoring Tanner and tying the score. He stole second but was left by Craft's hit to short. For Ishpeming Sheehan struck out, Stellberger and Rutter walked to first, Cull's error gave Adams his base and then Stellberger scored on Morkin's sacrifice fly to left; Pedroes threw to Wilbur and Wilbur sent the ball in to Ganss to catch him but he beat it. Rutter tried to make second on the play and was nipped by a perfect throw. Marquette 11, Ishpeming 15.

In the eighth no one saw the plate but in the ninth the Marquettes picked up their wagon tongues and won the game. Ganss struck out for a starter, then Tanner hit for a base, Cull flew to right, Rathbun hammered out a single and Wilbur came to bat. He drove a hot one down the third base line. The ball struck on the line about half way out and bounded clear over third base. Corbett, who was umpiring behind the pitcher, called it a fair ball and it undoubtedly looked so from the pitcher's box, but a number of those in the grand stand say that when the ball bounded it went foul. Tray made a hard kick but the decision stood and the tying run was in. Craft's two-bagger sent another across the plate and then Pedroes, to even up matters for three strike outs, also pounded out a double, putting two more across the plate. In attempting to score from second on Houseman's single Pedroes was thrown out at the plate by Adams. For Ishpeming Rutter flew to right, Adams took first by being hit by a pitched ball, Morkin hit for a base and then Pedroes took revenge on Adams for nailing him at the plate by making exactly the same play on Tray's single to left, a perfect throw in cutting Adams off at the plate and ending the game.

The features were Pedroes' great fielding, three put-outs and two assists, Adams' fine work in the same garden, Houseman's execution in center field, Morkin's batting and Ganss' splendid work behind the bat, his fine throwing nailing every man who tried to steal second and catching two men off bases.

A Big Crop. A very peculiar contest was on hearing at the U. S. land office yesterday. It seems that 1865 William Papin, a fisherman, located on section 33, 54-32, north of Portage Entry. The land was covered by a selection by the M. H. & O. R. R. as indemnity land and was not subject to entry until 1887 when it was thrown open by the department. In 1888 Frank Foot and Mahlon Manger settled on the land and the contest now on is between these parties and Papin.

To substantiate his claim to the land, Papin, who married a half-breed, declares that in 1866 he built a good house on the claim and that in that house has raised a family of twelve children. The officers could not but acknowledge that the crop was a very fair one and unless they are given time it is difficult to determine how the fishermen's contestants are going to make as good a showing. Papin claims that they came upon the land while he was temporarily absent, but believes that his claim to permanent settlement is pretty well substantiated.
