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

MURDERER ALMY CAPTURED

Clamoring Crowd Forces the Officers to Show It the Murderer-Almy Never Left Vicinity of His Crime.

WOUNDS THAT SHOULD BE FATAL HANOVER, N. A., Aug. 20.-Frank C. Almy, who three weeks ago dragged Christie Warden from her sister's side and cruelly murdered the girl was found today concealed in Warden's barn. A posse was summoned and surrounded the building. An attempt to dislodge the murderer drew fifteen shots from Almy. A. Turner of Norwich was wounded.

were put up. The officers, recognizing the spirit of the almost violent crowd, removed the curtains.

Sheriff Bridgman was seen coming down from the hay mow with other officers, bringing the murdeaer. He was soon placed in the carriage, but the people were so massed in the front of the barn doors that it was a long time before they could be induced to move sufficiently to allow the team to pass out. Four officers with drawn revolvers were in the wagon and shouted to the people to stand back. Almy was so surrounded by officers that he was sourrounded by officers that he was scarcely visible and a rush was made for the carriage which promised for a minute to exercise in their efforts to produce rainfall by artificial means and all this region is rejoicing in a heavy and wide-spread rainstorm, which insures wither grass and averts the distress which a few weeks more of dry weather would have brought. This is the second heavy rain on the Morris ranch which has falled inside of eight days, besides several light showers and there seems to be no reasonable doubt but the rain-makers deserve much of the credit, especially for the copiousness of the fall. Ten days ago they began operations and they have kept up a continual "skirmish" since that time.

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
