ALTHOUGH the resolution offered in the Pennsylvania republican state convention calling for Blaine's nomination for the presidency next year was not adopted, its reception denoted that Blaine is the choice of the Pennsylvania republicans and that he will have the delegation from that state in the nominating convention in '92 unless he positively declines to stand.

THE MARQUETTE MINING JOURNAL says: "If Gov. Winans will name Peter White of this city to take Mr. Burt's place, the MINING JOURNAL feels sure that there can be \$50,000 raised in the upper peninsula counties to render the exhibit from this region one of which the whole state will have reason to be proud."

We still cherish the hope that Gov. Winans will rise equal to the opportunity afforded him by Mr. Burt's declination and appoint Mr. White. If he does the rest will follow easily.

This paper has received expressions of approval of the idea that it has advocated in relation to an independent upper peninsula exhibit at the World's Fair from a number of leading men of the peninsula, coupled with assurances that they will be "in it" if our people are driven to the necessity of going it alone.

AN OUTSIDE VIEW OF IT. The Superior Leader, Governor Swineford's paper, takes note of the failure of Governor Winans to recognize the upper peninsula in his original choice of a World's Fair commission for the state, and gives his excellency some sound advice bearing thereon in the appended article:

In appointing the World's fair commission provided for by an act of the state legislature, Gov. Winans, of Michigan, either intentionally or from oversight, entirely ignored the upper peninsula in which are located not only all the great iron and copper mines of the state, but other large and important interests and industries a proper representation of which would form by far the most interesting and valuable part of the state's exhibit.

A FLANK MOVEMENT. The sharp newspaper fellows who are keeping tab on the political managers in both parties claim to have discovered a deal that seriously menaces the chances of ex-President Cleveland for the presidential nomination on the democratic side next year.

As they relate it, Hill has decided not to be in the race himself, but he is none the less in Cleveland's way because of the determination not to personally engage in the contest for the nomination.

Meanwhile the influence of Hill and his gang will be thrown for Gorman in other states and a boom for him is to be set a-going by the methods of the political jugglers who are up in the art of creating sentiment to order in the party ranks.

There is some ground for the belief that such a conference has been held and compact has been entered into by Hill and Gorman. They are politicians of the same character and calibre.

With Gorman in the president's chair, should the democrats by any chance elect their candidate, Hill would be dictator in the matter of the distribution of federal patronage in New York, and that is an alluring stake to play for the higher one being confessedly out of his reach.

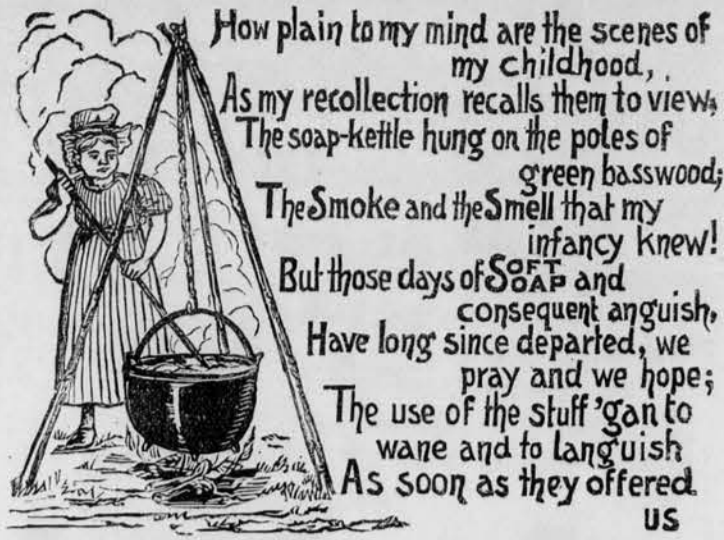
