Davies grabed a lemon knife lying on the bar, and dodging Hall's powerful fist lunged back at him with the knife, striking him in the throat and cutting a terrible gash from chin to ear on the right side

and narrowly missing the jugular vein.
"You've done me, Charlie, but stay
with me," exclaimed Hall, as the blood spurted in a horrible flow from the wound. The room after the fracas presented a gory appearance. Hall will recover. 





A CHINESE DELICATESSEN STORE.

cinating and Sold Very Cheap. Perfumed ducks, pickled oysters and beautifully roasted and powdered pigs, with pink ears and red nostrils, are the characteristic sights that ornament a Chinese delicatessen store. There is yet only one of these unique shops among the 10,000 Chinese of New York, but unless its enterprising owner can obtain a patent for the business there will probably be other places opened soon, as he is doing a rushing business both day and night. His trade is especially great in summer, because the Chinaman, like his American white cousins, will not cook a meal in hot

days unless he is actually forced to do so.

The Chinese delicatessen store is replete with the appetizing dishes of the Chinese household, and they are done up not only in better style but with much better ma-terials and more tasty than the average food of an ordinary Chinese family.

Everything is exposed to view in the most conspicuous manner possible. A whole pig, fat and juicy, baked in highly spiced liquor and then baked a crispy brown, while cooling in the air is slightly anointed on its back with a rich coat of see yo (vegetable oil) and salt. The ears and nose are dyed in vermilion; the entire carcass is made as attractive to the eye and as tempting to the appetite as possible. It is then hung by its little chubby tail upon a hook near the door in very much the same fashion as a Dutchman's butcher shop. When a customer comes in he is asked which part of the hog he wants. It is then chopped off at twenty-five cents per pound. The same price prevails throughout the entire pig.

The liver and entrails are cured separately from the rest of the body, and then are sold at half the rate of the body. On an average three pigs a day and a dozen or more of ducks and chickens are disposed of in quarter pound lots, besides other deli-

The present boss of this establishment is a favorite Chinese caterer, who ran once the big Chinese restaurant at 18 Mott street. He couldn't agree with his partners and he quietly retired to a neighbor-ing hallway, where he set up for himself in retailing Chinese portable dishes—the very dishes he used to make up for his guests at the Chinese Delmonico's. To the surprise and annoyance of his old partners, the old caterer took many of his pa-trons with him, who would rather eat his dishes cold than to eat them steaming hot at the restaurant.

The difference between a Caucasian and a Chinese delicatessen store is immense. The one always sells stale meat and rotten cheese; the other roasts live pigs (killed within an hour before they are prepared

for roasting) chickens and ducks in the same way. The one costs hundreds of dollars to start and makes little profits, while the Chinese delicatessen shop costs only the twenty dollars to buy the meats and makes

The sal ammoniac and lime are heated together in a retort or iron pot, and by the action of the salts employed are raised into vapor and condensed again into earthen receivers. The carbonic acid of the chalk unites with the sal ammoniae,

generating carbonate of ammonia A small quantity of this in the dough is acted on by the heat, and the gas thus lib-erated raises the mass so as to produce the light, fluffy, flaky appearance so desirable in bread and biscuit. When first produced, and so long as it is kept from the action of the air, carbonate of ammonia is in hard, white, translucent masses, crystalline in appearance, with a pungent smell and sharp taste. If air is allowed to reach it, it gradually falls into powder and loses strength. Some of the best bakers always allow it to "slack" before using it, claiming that in its original state it does not

work so satisfactory as after the action of the atmosphere upon it. It is frequently called "hartshorn," from the fact that an impure carbonate of ammonia is sometimes obtained by the destructive distillation of deer horns and kindred substances. Among English bakers the common name for it is "volatile," descriptive of one of its characteristics. In English recipes it is frequently abbreviated to "vol." It is now said to be largely produced from coal tar, and great quantities of it are made in the United States.—Bak-


