Sending "Copy" Cheaply.
It is now possible, as most people know, to send an ordinary letter by train when one wishes to make a compromise between dispatching a telegram and forwarding a letter by the usual means. The same advantage has been enjoyed by newspapers, so far as "copy" is concerned, for many years. Old journalists can remember the time when telegraphing was so expensive and so uncertain that most of the news which appeared in the London press was received by train. In those days subeditors had only to wait for the last train, arriving soon after midnight, and they knew what they had to deal with. Now all that is changed. The London press at the present time receives nearly all its provincial news by telegraph and a good deal of "copy" arrives in the small hours of the morning.
Provincial newspapers, however, big and little, still make great use of the railway system for the transmission of news. Almost every express which starts from London between midday and evening carries a number of packages from the news agencies containing reports of markets, trials, Stock exchange information, and so forth. Many of these reports are in complete.
Part of a trial will, for example, be sent by a train starting long before it is over, and the remainder by telegraph. These parcels also contain little instructions for the subeditor or the printers which cannot be dispatched over wire at the press message rate of 100 words for one shilling. Sometimes leading articles and paragraphs of "London Letters" are sent in the same way.-London Tit-Bits.

DIED SUDDENLY.
 It is the MINING JOURNAL'S sad office this morning to chronicle the death of Mrs. Peter Fitzpatrick, wife of Alderman Fitzpatrick, which occurred quite suddenly last evening about twenty minutes past five o'clock, at the residence of Mr. Dan Sullivan, on Euclid street.
 Mrs. Fitzpatrick had been making a few social calls during the afternoon, and before reaching Mr. Sullivan's place she complained of weakness. When she entered the house she sank into a chair, and shortly afterward expired. Dr. Vandevanter was at once summoned but she was past human aid, and medical skill could do nothing for her. Her death resulted from heart disease, and the suddenness of her summons was a great shock to her many friends in the city.

Thinking there might have been a mistake in the name the MINING JOURNAL reported, it inquired if any man employed in the shops had decamped in the manner stated and was promptly informed that no one had done so. How the rumor originated no one seems able to explain.
Died in Infancy.
 The little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edmund Lemire, of this city, died Wednesday evening from some complaint peculiar to young children. The little one was five months and ten days old and was very dear to her parents, who feel their loss keenly. The funeral was held from the Catholic church at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, Rev. Father Boisseneau officiating.
 Intelligence was received here yesterday that Mr. and Mrs. Albert Verhagen, of Clarkburg, were mourning the loss of an infant child whose death occurred late Wednesday night. The funeral will be held today, with interment in the Clarkburg cemetery.
Reported Killed.
 Yesterday morning it was rumored that John Axel Hedman, a young man well known in this city, where he resided up to about two months ago, had been shot and killed at New Duluth, Minn. The MINING JOURNAL reporter called upon Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Johnson, of North Sixth street, relatives of Mr. Hedman, but found that they knew nothing of the matter, beyond having

heard the same report. They were not inclined to believe it, however, as they had just received a letter from Mr. Hedman, dated Aug. 26th, and in it he said he was in good health and doing well. The telegraph office was next visited and enquires made if any message had been received here or at Marquette in reference to the matter. The answer was in the negative and the only inference to be drawn from these facts is that there is no truth in the report.

TOLD BY A DETECTIVE.
PERILS IN BRINGING A GANG OF CRIMINALS TO JUSTICE.
As Hostler for the Leader of a Notorious Band of Horse Thieves and Robbers This Man Had Exceptional Facilities for Securing Evidence.
 Seated in the corridor of one of the hotels was a medium sized, pleasant looking man, well dressed and resembling in many respects a drummer. He was one of Major Carter's most trusted detectives, the man who captured the Orange county counterfeiters. "I suppose when old Sam Rivers, who is in jail for counterfeiting, is sent over this time," he remarked to a reporter, "it will end him. Well, Sam has had his day, and a right lively one it was too. Do you know that Sam is the last of a band of robbers who infested this state for years? The most complete gang ever organized. I was a member of it."
 "A member of a band of horse thieves?" exclaimed the reporter.
 "Yes," answered the secret service officer, with a smile. "I belonged to it until I got most of them behind stone walls."
 The reporter pressed the detective for a history of the criminals, and this remarkable romance in crime was related:
 "John T. Riley was born and raised in Hartford, of rich parents. He was a wild, reckless fellow, and shortly after becoming of age he forged his father's name for \$5,000 and fled to Philadelphia. Here he assumed the name of Thomas W. Foster, and engaged in the horse business, connecting himself with a lot of sharpers, whose business it was to fleece countrymen. He made considerable money and flew rather high.
 "One night at a theater he formed the acquaintance of a woman named McBride, whose husband was an alderman and quite wealthy. The flirtation was so marked that the husband was informed and he determined to watch his wife. This he did, and the information I secured of her life in Philadelphia society would make a startling book. As I was about to trap the guilty pair they eloped, and took with them several thousand dollars belonging to the alderman. I started after them; got traces of them at Cincinnati, where they bought tickets for St. Louis, and I went there.
 "I looked for them for months through the west, and finally gave up the chase. It seems instead of going to St. Louis they stopped off at Osgood, Ind., where Foster, with the money stolen by the woman, went into business, and while I was searching for them all over the west they were living very secluded lives at the little Indiana town.
 "FOSTER'S LIFE IN OSGOOD.
 "Foster had not been in Osgood a great while until he became acquainted with the notorious Missouri Rittenhouse and Isaac Levy and his family, all of whom were counterfeiters and crooks. The whole lot became quite intimate, and when Foster bought a livery stable and ostensibly did a legitimate business, his barn was only a 'fence' for stolen horses. He and Levy bought horses and passed counterfeit money, and, attending all the fairs and races, soon became acquainted with all the thieves and crooks of the country.
 "A great many horses were stolen, men robbed on the highway, stores plundered and men beaten nearly to death. Crime was rampant. The people raised a fund and I was employed to ferret out the marauders. When I got to Osgood I recognized my old friend Foster, and the alderman's wife, and made up my mind to be with the man I must cultivate. I could not get in with him, however, and he sold out and moved to Columbus, O.
 "There he and his wife moved in the best society, gave grand parties and were the associates of the most prominent people of the city. Two years of rapid living drained Foster's resources, and becoming heavily in debt he returned to Osgood. His wife deserted him and went to Washington, where she lives under an assumed name.
 "Foster handled crooked money and dealt in stolen horses, and on July 9, 1884, I became a hostler in his stable. I did not get a good 'pointer' until in the fall, when Sam Rivers hired a buggy at the stable and was driven to the country by young Sam Rittenhouse. That night a horse was stolen, and when young Sam was arrested my evidence cleared him, and I was looked upon as a 'saw' man. I became Foster's right hand man. He introduced me to Henry Underwood, Sam Rivers, Walter Hamilton, John Kelly, Hiram Kelly, William Wainwright, Frank Elder, Skinny Douglass, John Holloway and a number of others whose names I cannot recall just now. The thieves would average a horse each week, and in warm weather the animals were kept in a thick woods until a shipment was made.
 "JUMPED HIS BOND.
 "All this time I was in communication with the authorities, and turned up a good deal of the stolen property. I knew the stealing was going on, but I didn't have the evidence to commit the gang, and that was what my employers wanted. Henry Underwood stole a fine roan horse in Indianapolis, and two days after Foster got the animal. He sold it to a prominent whisky dealer of Aurora, Ind. The Indianapolis parties traced their horse to Aurora, and Foster paid the money back, claiming he bought the horse from a man named Howard, living in Ripley county. But the Marion county people were not satisfied. Foster was arrested, tried and sentenced to three years in state prison.
 "The supreme court reversed the finding, and he came back for another trial. As soon as he returned he was arrested on two indictments from Boone county, two from Dearborn county and three from Ripley county. He was put under \$5,000 bonds, his father-in-law (he having, after the alderman's wife deserted him, married the daughter of a Versailles druggist) becoming his surety. He jumped his bond and fled to Canada. He is now living in Hamilton.
 "Foster being out of the way, Missouri Rittenhouse became the leader of the gang. Strange to say, I was still unsuspected, and boarded with Mrs. Rittenhouse, sharing the fullest confidence of the thieves and crooks that made her house their headquarters.
 "My life there was one continuous adventure, and many times did I warn men who were to be robbed or their stores broken into. Night after night I would scout around and confer with the authorities, and as the gang one by one became entangled in the meshes of the law I was able to divert suspicion from myself. If they had thought me an officer I wouldn't be here now to tell the story."—Indianapolis News.

JUST FOUR HUNDRED GIRLS.

That's the Number Marquette's Big Knitting Mills Will Employ Next Year.

THE END OF A VERY PRETTY STILL HUNT AT HAND.

Marquette's Citizens' Association Has Been Busy Sawing Wood, as Usual. Another Deal Almost Closed.

WHY WE SMILE.

Marquette's Citizens' Association did not finish its labors with the publication of "Marquette Illustrated," although that little volume has taken first rank among similar publications in the state and is everywhere lavishly praised by the press. It has apparently been resting on its oars since the famous exposition of Marquette's beauties and advantages was offered to the world but it has been far from asleep and it is with much gratification that the MINING JOURNAL announces this morning that there is every probability that the association has secured for Marquette a manufacturing enterprise which in the number of hands employed will far out-rank any establishment now in the city.

Marquette has not been in the habit of counting her chickens before they were hatched or of inviting outsiders to come in and snatch the prize from her grasp by premature cackling. On this account nothing has been said in these columns of the negotiations which Secretary Asire and other officers of the Citizens' Association have been conducting for a couple of months to secure the removal to this city of one of the largest knitting mills in the state of Michigan. The negotiations are so nearly closed, however, that the main facts can now be made public. The mill is now a partnership concern and employs 400 hands six months in the year and 300 for the balance. Its equipment can be judged from the fact that it has one sixty horse power and two six horse power engines with plenty of boiler capacity, 218 round knitting machines, 214 Lamb machines, 20 seamers, 18 rimmers, 13 Lamb tufters, 5 steam presses, 6 winders and bobbins and a large amount of other machinery.

According to the arrangements entered into Marquette, capitalists are to buy out the silent member of the present partnership for \$1,500, securing a corresponding interest in the plant. The gentleman who has built up the works was in Marquette this week looking the city over and was perfectly satisfied with it as a location for his business. The Citizens' Association was negotiating with another and much smaller knitting concern when he learned of it and at once wrote up here stating that his sales were mostly in Northern Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota and that Marquette would be a much better distributing point than the city in which he was located and that he would like to move here. He is compelled to pay \$3,000 rent where he is for quarters and by coming here he secures cheaper rent, light and power and also lighter taxes. After he had expressed himself as perfectly satisfied with Marquette the association selected Mr. E. H. Towar to go down and look the business over thoroughly on Marquette's behalf and that gentleman left on that and other business of public importance Wednesday. On his return another representative may be sent down but it is highly probable that his report will close the deal at once. Yesterday afternoon one half of the \$15,000 was subscribed on the street and the rest will be subscribed today. On its removal to Marquette the works will be made a joint stock concern with the present management in actual charge. It can be seen at once what an acquisition this business will be to Marquette. Most of the hands employed are girls and they are paid entirely by the piece, making from \$5 to \$15 per week according to their experience and the character of the work upon which they are employed. There are probably one hundred girls now in the city to whom such work would be a god-send and the other three hundred wanted during the busy half of the year will be drawn to the city from outside. The establishment of the works here will undoubtedly mean an addition of 300 people to the population of the city.

Plans were outlined while the representative of the works was here for suitable quarters, power, etc., but until Mr. Towar's return and the meeting of the Marquette subscribers to stock any further announcement would be premature.

The Long Looked For Contest.

At 2:30 o'clock this afternoon at the Fair avenue grounds will commence one of the most spirited and bloodthirsty contests ever witnessed on an upper peninsula ball field. Nine gentlemen of superabundant adipose tissue have taken the contract to mop the earth with nine animated lightning rods and they propose to do it if it takes all summer. On the other hand the lightning rod contingent declares that after it gets through with the fat men there won't be a grass spot left—they will have melted away to nothing.

A machine gun, two famous national league umpires, half a dozen scorers in relays of two each, six physicians and surgeons and an ambulance driver will officiate at the game and even the lame and the halt and the blind will be on hand to witness it.

At 2 o'clock the rival teams in full uniform will start from Superior street up Front headed by the Marquette City band and followed by the whole city. Business houses might as well be closed for the whole crowd is going to be at that game—the tickets already sold show that. Last night the Fats and several of the Leans tried on their uniforms at the Casino. Ross was a peach in Pedro's clothes and with the assistance of a piece of string Sparrow and Craft's pants got along quite well together.

Robbins got hold of Thorpe's uniform by mistake and it fitted to a T. He will be able to steal second in it without taking more than three reefs in his moccasins. Billy Coles had the good luck to draw Birmingham's suit and tied the trousers under his insteps while Shields McCarthy, after going into executive session for half an hour with the biggest pair of trousers in the lot, pieced out with half a bed quilt, finally decided that he was sufficiently shielded from the weather to make his bow to the grand stand though he has not yet fully decided whether to wear the bed quilt in front or behind. He will commence getting into those trousers at 10 o'clock today in order to get there in time for the game.

The admission to the grounds will be only 25 cents and if any man, woman or child doesn't have fun enough out of the investment to last them until next Fourth of July he or she will be allowed a free ride home in Marshall's ambulance. The game will be called at 2:30 sharp in order to allow a finish before dark.

We're Right In It.

Marquette is bound to be in the swim and is today fully prepared to contest with Detroit and Grand Rapids every claim to true metropolitan greatness—for the Queen City can now show up a street car strike with the best of them, the conductors and motor men on the Marquette City and Presque Isle railway laying up their cars at the power house at 1:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The action of the men was a complete surprise as no demand preceded it. The company announced yesterday that the scale of wages for motor men would be from \$1.50 to \$2 per day, according to the length of service, and it was this which precipitated the strike. The men claimed that they were working 13, 14 and 16 hours a day according to the run they happened to be on and wanted the scale from \$2.00 to \$2.50. The scale was raised for those who stayed to \$1.80 to \$2.25 per day. The reserve crew was called out and another crew was made up from the power house, the secretary of the company acting as conductor. Today the cars will all be running as usual with regular crews.

It is a general feeling that the men made a mistake in taking the course they did. The company is doing its best to handle a new enterprise in a manner satisfactory to the people and a strike undertaken without first making some attempt to reach an amicable understanding is not regarded as a "fair shake" on the part of the men and lost them the support they would have had for their cause in the board of directors.

Be that as it may there is no doubt about one thing and that is that from this time on Marquette is fully entitled to put on all the airs of a metropolitan city. We are no fly paper!

Married on Lake Superior.

The steamer Japan was in yesterday bound down with a large party of tourists on board and a merry party it was too. The following letter was mailed to the MINING JOURNAL by some one of the passengers whose modesty was too great to permit him or her to give a signature which would allow the paper to return it to them:

ON BOARD STEAMER JAPAN, August 27, 1891.

DEAR MINING JOURNAL: Knowing that you are "after" all lake news and being a witness, as a passenger on one of the finest steamers which sail the lakes, of a very interesting and unusual occurrence, the first of its kind, it is said, which ever took place on Lake Superior, I have made up my mind that you ought to have the particulars. Here goes:

Married—On board steamer Japan, Lake Superior Transit Company's Boat, August 26, 1891, by Rev. T. H. Gardner, D. D., of the Neb.
